

Scientists Await Improved Weather

Atomic Test Site, Nev. —(AP)—American scientists waited impatiently today for the weather to improve so they can explode with safety the first nuclear device of an unusually long series of tests.

Unfavorable winds caused by a last-minute change in weather conditions led the Atomic Energy Commission to postpone for 24 hours the detonation of a nuclear device atop a 500-foot tower which had been scheduled for today.

The AEC explained that winds would have carried radioactive particles in dangerous quantities south of the firing area, sprinkling them upon newspapermen, the scientist themselves and military observers, including those from 13 NATO nations gathered to witness the tests.

Man Who Shot at Americans Arrested

Bangkok —(AP)—Police reported today the arrest of Perd Mahawat, 27, as the man who fired several shots at the U.S. attaché's launch on the Chao Phraya river last Friday. Two bullets narrowly missed Look magazine Publisher Gardner Cowles and nine other Americans.

Mahawat said he managed a log raft station and was angry because the American launch often sped past the station, causing the log rafts to break up. He said he wanted to scare the Americans away rather than to hurt or kill anyone.

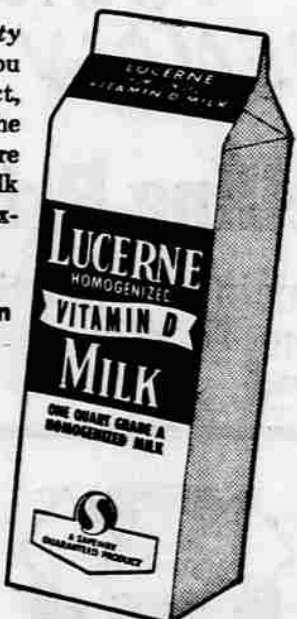

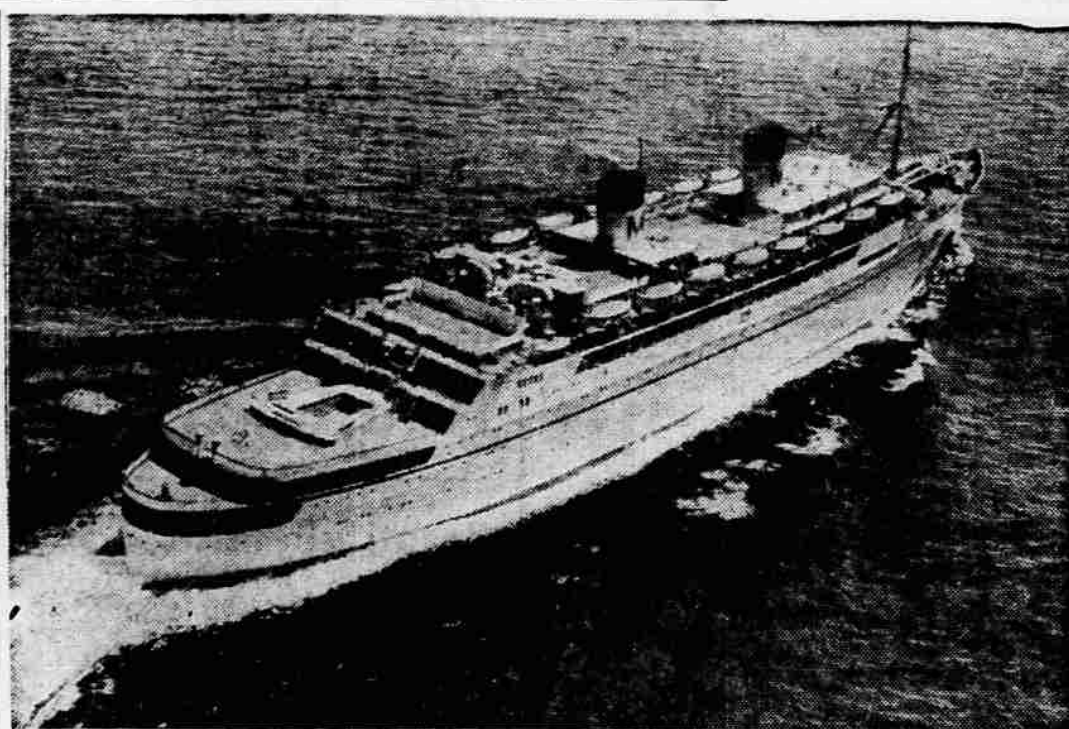

Sleepy Mexican Village May Be No. 1 Tourist Attraction

La Paz, Lower Calif. —(UP)—This sleepy, Mexican fishing town is rapidly coming to life, and residents predict that in 10 years it will become the No. 1 goal of tourists from the entire western section of the United States.

Long known as one of the world's finest sports fishing spots, La Paz is now expanding facilities to provide recreation for those who do not take to the rod and reel.

New resort-type hotels are being built and are being filled with an ever-increasing number of visitors.

All eyes are on the highway under construction to connect La Paz with the United States at Tijuana. Everyone admits, however, that it will be several

years before tourists can arrive by auto.

Felix F. Diaz Bonilla, editor of the newspaper Accion and a member of a three-man committee that discussed the new highway with President Ruiz Cortines, said there is little chance of speeding the work.

"The President explained that the amount of money involved for the 1,000 miles of highway was extremely great," he said. "The president said his administration was spending as much as possible on the project but that it would be up to the following administration to complete it."

By Air and Boat

Mayor Alberto Avarado A. said there was no question but that the highway would change the entire economy of La Paz.

"However," he said, "we are growing now. We now have between 25,000 and 28,000 residents."

There are only two ways to reach La Paz at this time—by air or by yacht. Each month shows additional thousands of tourists coming to enjoy the climate, the fishing, the recreation or just to rest—far away from telephones.

The airline Trans-Mar de Cortez has expanded its service from Tijuana to daily flights and Aeromexico flies daily from the mainland of Mexico. Flights are filled.

Guillermo Escudero Lujan, president of the local Chamber of Commerce, said the very fact that the town can not be reached easily makes living pleasant. He said the natives continue to be friendly to tourists and that thefts are virtually unknown.

"It's because we are just like living on an island," he said.

Robert Elias, manager of Los Arcos Hotel, has posted this notice in the rooms:

"Since our little hotel has been in operation, we've never had one case of theft from anyone or any room. As for locking your room every time you go out, you needn't bother because no one will touch anything. We are proud of our employees and can vouch for their honesty and integrity."

Hunting, Too

The swank hotel Los Cocos, located two miles out of La Paz, now has 19 rooms and 30 more under construction. There is not a lock on any room door.

In their efforts to entertain others besides fishermen the resort operators have begun to publicize swimming, shell collecting, hiking and—at one place—horseback riding.

Hunting is great in the hills around La Paz, but involves considerable red tape for the traveler from the United States. To obtain a gun permit it is necessary to belong to a gun club in the United States that is affiliated with one in Mexico. Then arrangements must be made weeks in advance.

But whatever else develops La Paz will still be notable for its fishing.

During the first week in April two San Diego, Calif., men were fishing with two lines out. A 200-pound dolphin took the bait and the second fisherman immediately set to pull in his line to get it out of the way. Before he could reel it in, the bait was taken by a marlin, which began to tangle the lines.

It took more than an hour but these skilled rodmen boated both fish and were back at their hotel for lunch. For their dinner, the hotel chef prepared the marlin.

Salem —(AP)—The House late Wednesday approved expenditure of \$76,000 to finance a study to help the rehabilitation of mental patients.

The federal government would provide \$149,000 to aid the study.

Holmes Gets Bill On TB Hospitals

Salem —(AP)—Senate bill 439 calling for a vote of the people on discontinuance of tuberculosis hospitals either at The Dalles or Portland passed the House late Wednesday and went to the governor for signature.

Rep. R. E. Schede, Gresham Democrat, said the bill would give the Board of Control power to use one or both of the hospitals for other purposes.

There are three TB hospitals in Oregon. The Salem hospital has 179 patients with a capacity of 270. The Dalles hospital has 92 patients with a capacity of 170 and the Portland hospital has 63 patients with a capacity of 80.

Schede said he doubted if either The Dalles or the Portland hospitals would be closed. He said one or the other probably would be shifted to care for mental patients or geriatric cases.

Rep. Katherine Musa, The Dalles Democrat, objected to the bill because it had no provision for closing the Salem hospital.

Corvallis Pilot Killed Off Japan

Tokyo —(AP)—The Marine Corps today identified the pilot of a jet fighter that crashed off Japan on Monday as 2nd Lt. Henry D. Mullins, 22, of Corvallis, Ore.

The Marine officer was killed when his AD-6 "skyraider" plunged into the sea 10 miles southwest of Matsuyama City off Shikoku island across the Japanese inland sea from Hiroshima. The plane sank in 100 feet of water and the body has not been recovered.

Mullins, whose parents are Mr. and Mrs. Henry D. Mullins of Corvallis, was stationed with the 1st Marine Aircraft Wing at Iwakuni Naval Air Station. He arrived there in January following his graduation from flight training school and an assignment at the Cherry Point, N.C., Marine Corps air station.

Annual Membership Enrollment Drive Is Scheduled at YMCA

The annual membership enrollment week will be launched by members of the Medford YMCA at a 7 a.m. breakfast tomorrow, Lou Cranston, membership chairman, announced today.

Purpose of the enrollment drive is to align persons with the organization to help in volunteer efforts in running programs for youth, to enlist members in active participation in programs, and to interpret the work of the YMCA in the community, Cranston said.

Goal for the week-long drive is 2,500 members, he added, increasing the present membership by about 300.

The YMCA, which started in 1944, has operated 12 years in Medford, and a wide variety of programs are available at the Y building at 522 West Sixth st.

Facilities Include

Facilities include a well-equipped gymnasium, a heated swimming pool, a handball court, weightlifting and special exercise room, a social hall and kitchen, a reading room with space for chess and checkers and a game room for lobby games, Cranston pointed out.

More than 800 persons learned to swim and 250 passed advanced swimming tests. Average attendance for week end social dancing for teenage members was between 250 and 350 on most week ends, he noted.

Instruction in weightlifting,

basketball, volleyball, boxing, wrestling, handball, badminton, trampoline, and square dancing led the list of activities last year.

The YMCA is affiliated with the council of churches, although independent in organization and free from any ecclesiastical control, Cranston pointed out.

Airline Sued For Crash Death

San Francisco —(AP)—A \$500,000 damage suit charging United Airlines with "negligently and carelessly operating" its aircraft has been filed by the widow of a man killed in the June 30, 1956, collision over Grand Canyon.

The suit was filed Wednesday by Mrs. Barbara Ashton, whose husband, Thomas Edward, was killed along with 127 others when a Transworld Airlines plane in which he was a passenger collided with a UAL plane.

The suit charged UAL with "so negligently and carelessly operating the aircraft under its control as to cause it to strike and collide" with the TWA plane.

Ashton, 38, was a clerk for TWA at Kansas City, Kan. Besides his widow, he is survived by two children, Thomas Edward III, 11, and Laura Jennifer, 8.

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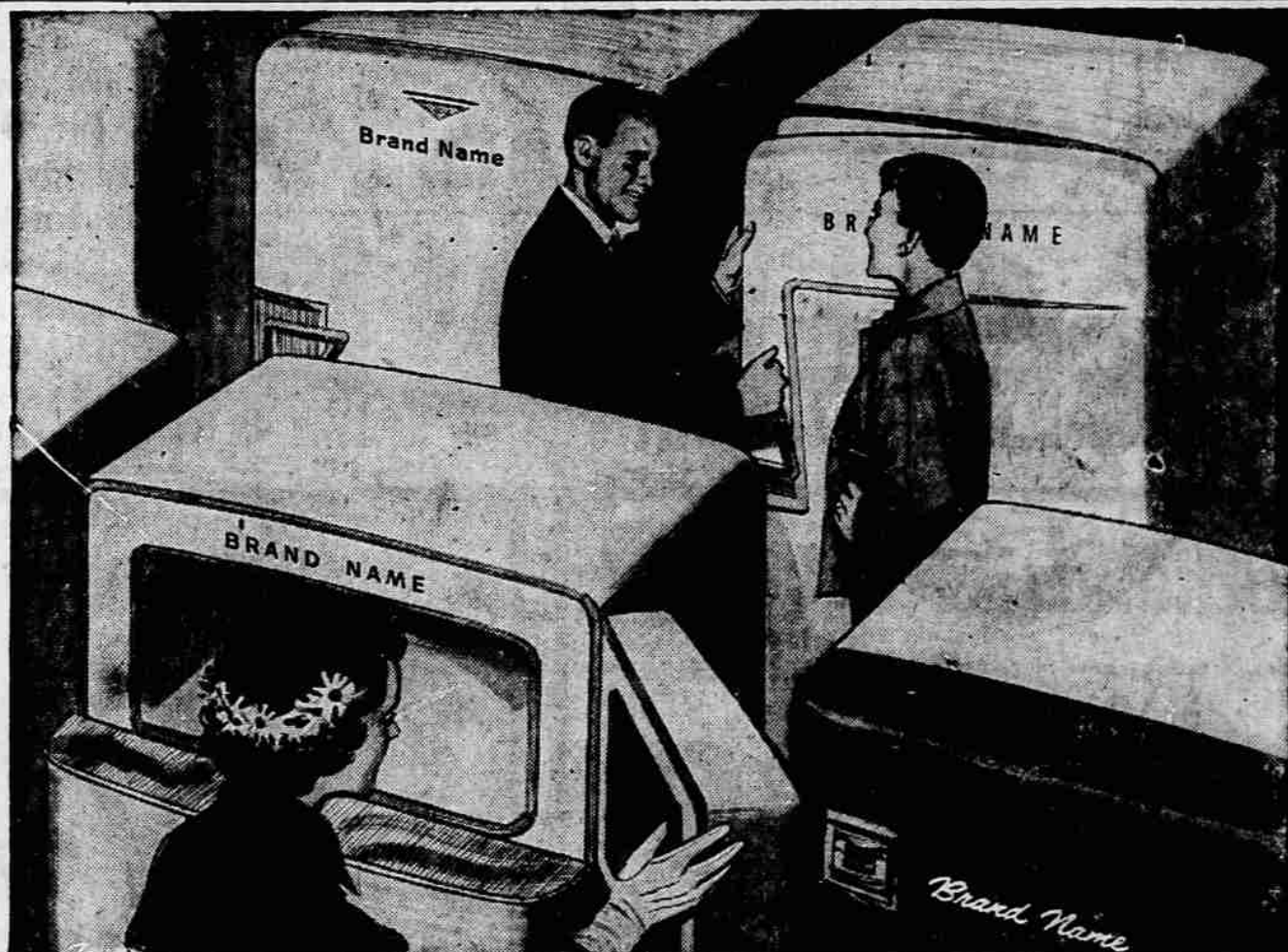
