

Wilson, Lawrence Score Fourth Wins

Jim Wilson, a strong, silent pipe-smoking type, wouldn't sit too well with Joe McCarthy, but the White Sox are sitting pretty in first place today because of his three shutouts and 1.04 earned run average, best among all pitchers in the majors.

McCarthy made no bones about his dislike for pipe-smokers. White Sox skipper Al Lopez, on the other hand, wouldn't care if the 35-year-old Wilson puffed on cornsilk as long as he pitches the way he did Wednesday night when he stopped the Senators on four hits, 5-0.

Wilson didn't allow a hit until the fifth and pitched his way out of bases-loaded jams in the eighth and ninth as he chalked up his fourth victory and ran his string of consecutive scoreless innings to 18. Walt Dropo homered off Washington southpaw Chuck Stobbs, who dropped his seventh straight game without a victory.

Major Clubs Cut To 25

You could field a fairly representative team from the list of players released Wednesday night when the 25-man roster limit went into effect in the major leagues.

For a pitching staff, you could take your pick of Karl Spooner of the Brooklyn Dodgers, Pete Burnside of the New York Giants, Bob Trowbridge of the Milwaukee Braves, and Dick Brodowski and Garland Shifflett of the Washington Senators. The catcher would be Haywood Sullivan of the Boston Red Sox.

Infielders released included first baseman Preston Ward of the Cleveland Indians, second baseman Woody Held of the New York Yankees, shortstop Billy Harrell of the Indians, and third baseman Rocky Bridges of the Cincinnati Reds.

The outfielders bounced were Neil Christy and Dick Tettelbach of the Senators, Wes Covington of the Braves, and Chuck King of the St. Louis Cardinals. With the exception of Bridges, Sporer, Brodowski and Tettelbach, all the players cut before the midnight deadline were released on options, which means they could be recalled during the current season.

Ted Throws Bat, May Be Disciplined

Boston — Red Sox slugger Ted Williams has been reported to American league headquarters for possible disciplinary action for tossing his bat in a temper tantrum during Wednesday's game against the Detroit Tigers, it was disclosed today.

Williams, angry at his failure to get a hit in his first appearance at the plate, threw his bat in disgust toward the Red Sox dugout.

First base umpire Frank Tabacchi said the incident was in violation of a recent directive from League President Will Harridge. The directive ordered umpires to report all bat flings by players.

Tabacchi said Williams could be fined or reprimanded. Williams had one hit in his four trips to the plate as the Red Sox beat the Tigers 11-8.

Williams followed up his bat flinging with an argument with newsmen in the Red Sox dressing room.

A pair of writers were talking with catcher Haywood Sullivan who had been cut from the Sox squad as the club reached the 25-player limit.

"Look out what you tell them," Williams said, as he combed his hair in front of a mirror. "They'll twist it around to foul it up."

Williams, according to the newsmen, started out from the club house, changed his mind and then approached one of the reporters.

"If you were 10 inches taller and 10 years younger, I'd belt the hell out of you," Williams was quoted. Williams snapped that newsmen should be barred from Fenway park.

Fishing for Trout Slow In Oregon

Portland — Trout fishing has slowed through many parts of Oregon, the state game commission said today in its weekly report.

Southwest: Central Douglas county streams slow for trout; fair catches made in North Umpqua area reservoirs; Umpqua river slow for salmon fishing; Ten-mile lake good to fair for trout.

Trout fishing in south fork of Coos river and tributaries of Williams river and Tioga creek good; Coquille river only fair; striped bass fishing in Coos river fair to good.

Northwest: North coast streams slow for trout; lakes fair; Tillamook streams still producing some planted rainbow trout; Willamette river in lower Tillamook bay; most streams slightly murky in central Willamette area; few spring chinook in lower North and South Santiam; Detroit reservoir poor to fair; Santiam and Little north for slow; Big and Little Luckiamune fair.

Central: Blue lake good on both trout and still fishing; Suttle lake fair; Metolus river fair to good; Deschutes below Bend slightly high and fishing only fair at best; Deschutes river in Warm Springs and Grandview areas high; Cove area on Crooked river poor; Deschutes above Bend; Wickiup reservoir fair to good; Lake of the Woods good; Sen river high and murky; Klamath river good.

Northeast: Most streams high and murky; Willamette reservoir low; rowed Gilliam counties have poor to fair fishing; Rowe Creek reservoir good in Wheeler county; Union and Wallawa county streams high; roads in Wallawa county poor; Wallawa lake good for rainbow and kokanee on trail; road to Indian crossing up the Inlow; Metolus river now open; Lick creek road still closed; Baker county creeks high.

Southeast: Owyhee reservoir in Malheur county fair to good for crappie and poor to fair for bass; Owyhee river high; Malheur reservoir mostly poor; Paulah reservoir mostly poor; Snake river poor to fair for both small-mouth bass and channel cats; Harney county streams mostly high and roily; Blitzen river still muddy.

Tornado Cinderman Seek 5th State Championship in Row

An unprecedented fifth consecutive state track and field championship for Medford High school was the high goal of Black Tornado scoundrels today as they headed for the Oregon State college at Corvallis to defend their A-1 mantle.

Some 400 A-1 and A-2 school athletes are expected to compete in the annual cinder classic with preliminaries on Friday and finals on Saturday.

A squad of nine athletes, qualified for 11 berths in 10 events, left for Corvallis intent on bringing the Medford coach to a triumphant close. Newland becomes vice principal at new North Eugene High school next.

In the A-2 division Phoenix high will have Charles Swingle in the half mile and Gary Simmonds in the half. Eagle Point has Jack Greb in the dashes and high jump; Wayne Christian in the discus and javelin; David Huffman in the pole vault and Normal Hooper in the shot put. Ken Lockhart is an Illinois Valley entrant in the shot.

Radio station KJYC and Home Appliance store will provide state meet service for southern Oregon fans. On Saturday afternoon KJYC will broadcast the meet with the store as sponsor.

Home Appliance will keep a complete tabulation in its window, enabling fans to keep up with progress of the meet. The tabulation will show the placings in each event and the progressive score.

Two From Phoenix
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Top Thinclads of Nation Vie in PCC Meet at Eugene

University of Oregon, Eugene — The nation's top 880, mile, two mile, and javelin men, plus the number two pole vaulter in the country, will all be on hand at Hayward field next Friday and Saturday for the annual PCC track and field championships.

Don Bowden of California has run the 880 in 1:49.7, UCLA's Bob Seaman has covered the mile in 4:05.6, Southern California's Max Truex has set a new two-mile record with an 8:55.0 clocking, Trojan Bob Voiles has a new javelin mark to his credit with a toss of 249.6, and USC's Ron Harris has cleared 15-2 1/2 in the pole vault to rank second among the collegians.

Voiles and Morris are both defending champions and are regarded as heavy favorites in their events. Hank Roldan of Stanford (227-4 1/2), Rafer Johnson of UCLA (228-1) and Ed Bingham of Oregon (226-9 1/2) are also well ranked nationally and could give the Trojan ace trouble if he has an off day.

Mile Feature

The battle behind Morris will be a good one with Oregon's Jack Burg (143-3 1/2), USC's Jerry Hren (14) and Ernie Bullard (14), Chuck Johnston (14), of UCLA, Cliff LaBounty of Washington (14), and Weebfoot Sam Whitney (13-9) all contenders.

The battle in the mile will be one of the features of the day if Bowden and Jim Bailey of Oregon, the defending champion, decide to challenge Seaman. Bailey has been slowed down by an injured foot and may stick to the 880, which is also the probable spot for Bowden. If these two do not run, USC's Sid Wing (4:09.2) and Bob Shankland (4:14.5), Oregon's sophomore, Jim Grelle (4:13.3), and Maynard Orme of California (4:13.7) will furnish the toughest opposition to Seaman.

In the 880 Bowden, Bailey (1:52.4) and Seaman will tangle again for Seaman's title with a real challenge from Trojans Tom Anderson (1:50.2), Wes McLeo (1:52.0) and Chuck Kirkby (1:53.4). Ken Thompson of UCLA (1:53.3) and Dave McCulloch of Washington (1:53.8), the third place winner last spring.

Truex apparently faces no real competition, and the battle for second will probably involve Cal's Bob House (9:03.9), Pete Rodriguez of UCLA (9:19.1) and Idaho's Ray Hatton (9:22.0).

Three New Champs
Three new champions will be crowned in the sprints.

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
