Portland Accused Of Discrimination

Portland — (U) — The city of Portland was accused here Wednesday of discrimination in enforcement of the city housing code.

Mrs. Mary Ristick, member of the city's Gypsy minority, filed suit in Federal Court for a preliminary injunction on grounds that the housing code enforcement has singled out Gypsy families.

Mrs. Ristick's family is one of 45 ordered to vacate store buildings converted into dwellings in the downtown business area. The city contends the stores fail to meet city housing and health standards. The Gypsies claim they are rebuffed each time they try to relocate in a new neighborhood.

Attorney Theodore Lachman said the Ristick suit does not attack the constitutionality of the housing code but rather the "arbitrary" manner of its enforcement.

Boy Arrested — A 14-year-old Medford boy was arrested Wednesday by city police on charges of assault with a deadly weapon. He was released to his mother with instructions to appear before county juvenile authorities.

Spurt in Rail Shares Give Market Incentive

New York — (U) — Railroad shares, lagging in a rising stock market, got into the act today to give the bull market a new incentive in its drive for a record high.

Industrial shares generated new activity and strength with chemicals again a big factor in their advance. Oils were strong, and steels produced some good gains, notably Lukens which at its top was up more than five points. Metals had gains running to two points.

Chemicals were up as much as 3 1/2 in Du Pont at a new high, oils as much as 2 1/2 in Amerada, also a new top, coppers as much as 2 in Magma, tires as much as 3 3/4 in General Tire at its best, and buildings as much as 2 1/4 in U. S. Gypsum.

Carrier Strikes Mysterious Object
Jacksonville, Fla. — (U) — Radar ships and planes today searched the shallow ocean area where the carrier Franklin D. Roosevelt struck a mysterious underwater water object, bringing an oil slick bubbling to the surface.
Navy spokesmen in Washington and at the carrier base at Mayport, near Jacksonville, vaguely but firmly discounted speculation the carrier might have struck a foreign submarine. There have been numerous unsubstantiated reports recently that Russian subs are lurking along the East Coast.
A spokesman in Washington theorized the Roosevelt might have struck a whale or a submerged wreck. The water where the ship was damaged is not very deep and is a graveyard for ships sunk by German submarines during World War II, the spokesman said.
The Roosevelt "shuddered" on impact with the object, according to its skipper, Capt. T. W. Hopkins. Damage was "apparently not too extreme," the Navy said.

Damascus — (U) — Syrian President Shukri El Kuwaty turned over a grant of two million Syrian pounds (\$520,000) Wednesday to a delegation of Algeria's "National Liberation Front," it was announced today.

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Stokowski Receives Ovation in Berlin
Berlin — (U) — American conductor Leopold Stokowski received a 10-minute standing ovation Wednesday night after directing a concert with the Berlin Philharmonic orchestra. It was the first time since World War II that the 75-year-old conductor had been in Berlin.

Democratic Tax Bill Sent To Gov. Holmes
Salem — (U) — The major Democratic tax bill re-passed the House 37-22 today after Senate amendments were accepted without a fight.
House Bill 1 repeals the surtax, sets new higher income tax rates and raises exemptions from \$500 to \$800.
Both the income tax bill and the corporation excise tax bill are now in the governor's hands.
Rep. Clarence Barton, Co-chairman of the House Taxation Committee, said Senate amendments to the bill were minor and desirable.

Greeters Committee Visits Camp White
About 20 industries of various types have sprung up in the White City area in the last eight years.
An estimated 700 to 1,000 people are directly employed at these industries and an estimated 25 per cent more find indirect employment from them through trucking, shipping or other related activities.
About 30 rail cars are loaded each day with products manufactured or processed in the area. During the month of April 850 cars were loaded and sent out of the White City area, according to John Loden of White City Realty company.
White City Realty company was host Thursday morning to the Jackson County Chamber of Commerce greeters committee coffee clatch. Purpose of the session was to introduce chamber members and representatives of industries in the White City Area.
About 35 people were present, representing about 20 business and industrial firms. Included in the industries represented were Medford Moulding company, W. H. Daugherty company, Columbia Utilities company, Carolina-Pacific Plywood, Beaver Lumber Sales, Burrill Lumber company, Cascade Wood Products, Industrial Lumber and Medford Metals.
Loden said the White City industrial area covers approximately 1,285 acres. About half of the area is being used by industries at the present time. Two-thirds of the property lies east of Highway 62 and the remainder is on the west side of the highway.
Provides Water
The White City Realty company provides water for fire protection in the area and also handles terminal switching and delivery of rail cars.
Loden explained that industrial facilities are installed as soon as funds are available when they are needed, without cost to the rest of Jackson county. He noted that there is no need in the area for costly elections and other procedures when new installations are required.
Discussion among industrial representatives emphasized need for "some concession" in view of the present tax situation in Oregon if additional industries are to settle here. Need for more diversified industries other than lumber was also pointed out. Electronics and plastics were named as examples of this type.
