Rights of NAACP Defended by Quakers

Portland — The American Friends Service committee spoke out today in defense of the rights of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, an organization under attack in many southern states.

In a statement endorsed by its Portland regional office, which serves Oregon, southern Idaho and Wyoming, the Quaker committee said, "We are concerned with the continued denial of the full privileges of a free society to many citizens because of their color."

"We strongly defend the right of the NAACP to work for justice within the law, to maintain interracial membership, to organize and to speak out for social change. To penalize the members of any organization in the exercise of such rights endangers them for all. The suppression of liberties is a violence in itself, which leads to counter-violence."

The statement related its concern to the testimonies of the Religious Society of Friends which respects the worth and dignity of every human being.

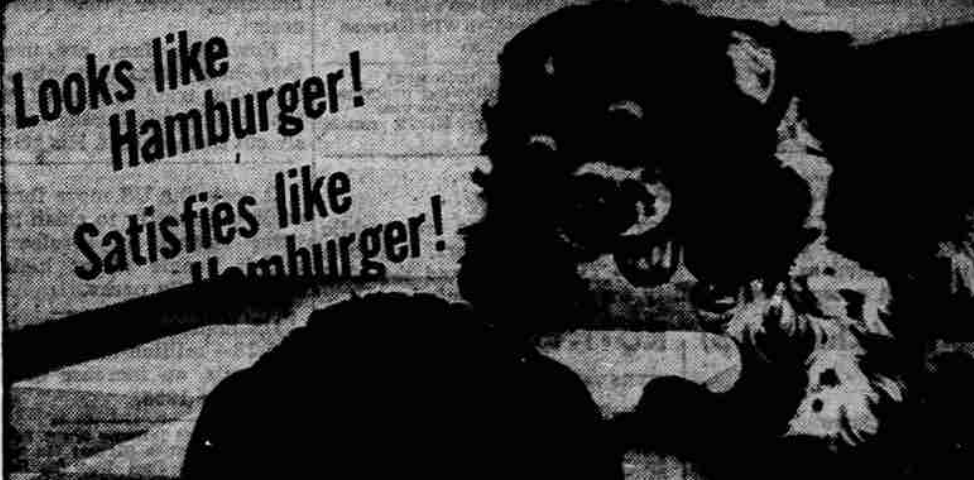
