

Kiwanis to Consider Financing Equipment For Dental Clinic

A Kiwanis committee will be organized next week to consider financing dental equipment for a dental clinic in the county courthouse where underprivileged Jackson county children could be treated, according to Dr. Abner Clark, Kiwanis president.

The county court recently agreed to make available to Kiwanians space now in the courthouse being used by the local chapter of the Red Cross. The room is on the first floor. New Red Cross facilities are being constructed on a site at 60 Hawthorne ave., Medford.

County Commissioner Chester Wendt said the Red Cross is expected to vacate their present offices about September 1, and the dental clinic should be established about that time.

The county is donating space for the dental clinic and also will finance a partition for the office as well as minor repairs, Wendt said.

Permanent Services

Dr. Clark indicated the dental clinic would make permanent services now offered by a mobile clinic, temporarily in Medford to benefit underprivileged children. It will leave Medford in

June after being here for a three-month period. It is located at Lincoln school.

About 27 local dentists have been contributing their time and funds to the mobile unit. Dr. Clark said the same dentists probably would be active in the proposed dental clinic when it is started this fall.

The mobile unit is now serving about 150 underprivileged school children in the greater Medford area. Students from Jacksonville, Phoenix, Central Point, Griffin Creek and Medford schools have been eligible for treatment, Dr. Clark said. Rogue River Academy, Lone Pine and Howard school students also have been treated.

Sponsored by Clubs

The mobile clinic is sponsored by the Medford and Central Point Lions clubs, the Medford Rotary and Kiwanis clubs, local members of the Oregon State Dental society and the Jackson county health department.

treatment has been conducted by the Medford public school system. The Jackson county health department will conduct screening for the proposed clinic in the courthouse, Dr. Clark said.

The Kiwanis clinic could treat all qualifying county students. The mobile unit treats only students in the greater Medford area.

Dulles Again Rapped For Red China Stand

New York—The magazine Editor & Publisher attacked Secretary of State John Foster Dulles today for placing foreign policy above freedom of the press.

The newspaper trade publication launched a two-pronged assault on the secretary's defense of his ban on the travel of American newsmen in Communist China.

In an editorial the magazine charged that Dulles "has gone too far in attempting to arrogate to himself the power of placing foreign policy above freedom of the press."

In a separate article it took Dulles to task for omitting relevant court opinions when the secretary stated at his news conference this week that the First Amendment of the Constitution

does not necessarily ensure the right to gather news.

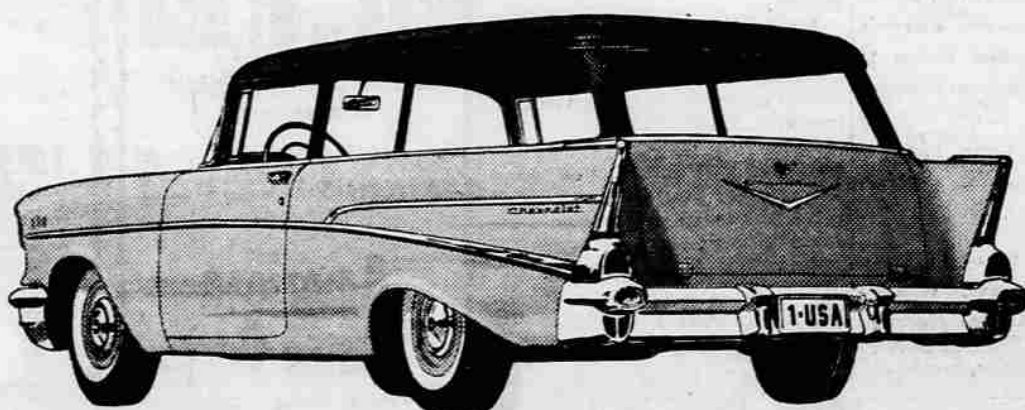
