Bills Tightening Workman's Compensation Go To Governor

Salem — Labor-backed bills to tighten workman's compensation provisions under industrial accident laws have passed the Senate and now go to the governor for signature.

The package of six bills increases the benefits for various types of disability and the benefits to widows and orphans of men killed in industrial accidents.

Labor's Vital Concern
George Brown, director of the political education department of the Oregon State Labor Council, said the measures represent one of labor's most vital concerns in the 1957 legislative session. He said features also are included to encourage greater safety practices in industry.

Three bills represent over-all increases of 20 per cent in benefits to workers covered by the industrial accident commission in four classifications:

- 1—Permanent partial injuries, such as the loss of one eye or one arm or one leg.
- 2—Temporary total injuries, or those resulting in time lost from work for a certain period, say a week or a month.
- 3—Permanent total injuries which mean the worker can never return to his job.
- 4—Fatal injuries.

Under these bills, which become effective July 1, a worker losing an arm would receive outright compensation of \$8,928; \$6,975 for loss of a leg; and \$4,650 for loss of one eye. It was explained that a worker who lost an eye could adjust himself to industrial work more quickly than one who lost a leg or an arm.

At the last meeting we discussed the functional parts of the electrical system of a tractor and what causes breakdowns in this area.

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Illinois Valley Rural Fire Budget Presented

Cave Junction — The Illinois Valley Rural Fire Protection district budget will again be within the 4 per cent limitation set up when the district was first formed three years ago, according to Hal Moore, chairman of the board of directors.

Moore said a bond issue is contemplated in order to buy a needed truck and to build fire houses, but if such a move is made he emphasizes the 4 mill quota will remain the same. Two mills will be used to repay the bond issue, while the remaining two will go for maintenance, repair and current expenses.

The district owns no fire houses at present. Trucks are kept in buildings which are either rented or whose use has been donated by private citizens.
