PTA Leaders Make Plans For Next Year's Program

Sixty-five parent-teacher association leaders, representing local PTA units throughout Jackson county, met in the YMCA social hall in Medford, May 15 to formulate plans for their work during the 1957-1958 school year.

The annual school of instruction is scheduled for September. Membership promotion week set for September 23 to October 6, with membership enrollment to continue through the entire month of October in the various units. There were 5,651 PTA members in the Jackson County council this year, and PTA leaders hope that there will be a substantial increase over this number.

Mrs. Leigh Gustison, first vice-president of the Oregon Congress of Parents and Teachers, reported to the council that four scholarships have been awarded this year to students in Jackson county.

The OCPPT scholarships are a four-year grant covering tuition and fees to those qualifying and majoring in elementary education. The scholarships are valid for Oregon State college, University of Oregon, Portland State college, Southern Oregon college, Eastern Oregon college, LaGrande, and Oregon College of Education at Monmouth.

This year scholarships have been awarded to Miss Grace Gail, Crater High school student; Miss Melva Gebhard, Medford High school student; Miss Barbara Johnson, Ashland High school and Mrs. Barbara Doolen, Medford, who will be a sophomore student in elementary education at Southern Oregon college next year.

Mrs. Inch Speaks

Mrs. Owen Kunkel, council president, introduced Mrs. Una Inch, assistant Superintendent of Jackson County Schools. Mrs. Inch spoke briefly to council members concerning the ex-

treme importance of an affirmative vote on the rural school budget, Monday, May 20, in all rural county districts. The rural school board equalizes the budgets of all schools within their jurisdiction, so that each district is assessed an equal amount to provide a good basic education program for each child in all those districts, Mrs. Inch explained.

She stated that not all districts are financially able to provide a basic education program for the children residing within the boundaries of their district, so this method of equalization is used outside of the first class districts, which are: Medford, Ashland, Phoenix, Central Point, and Eagle Point.

"Jackson County residents have always been far sighted in realizing the value of a good educational program to the area," Mrs. Inch said. "I do not think they will become quiescent and allow a false sense of economy to deprive the future citizens of our county of the necessary educational background to become productive, worthwhile adults."

Date Set For Annual Art Exhibit

The tenth annual southern Oregon art exhibit will be held in the Grants Pass High school library June 28, 29, and 30, according to the announcement made this week by Miss Yvonne Vibrans, chairman of arrangements. The show is sponsored by the American Association of University Women and is open to all artists in southern Oregon.

The requirements for entering works are as follows:

1—Southern Oregon artists may enter any work done in the last five years in any media including oil, watercolor, pastel, chalk, and ink. There will also be a division for sculpture.

2—Each artist may make as many as five entries.

3—Entries will be accepted in elementary, junior or senior high and adult.

4—An entry fee of \$1 for adults and 25 cents for artists under 19 years of age will be charged.

5—Oil paintings should be framed. Others should be matted. All must be ready for hanging.

—Each picture should be titled and accompanied by a statement of value for insurance purposes.

Entries will be received at the high school library June 23 and 24, where judging will take place.

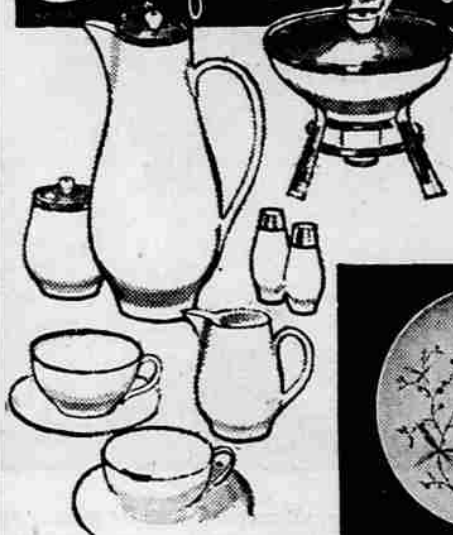
Young Arnold, a music major, was recently initiated into Phi Mu Alpha, men's national music honorary fraternity.

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
