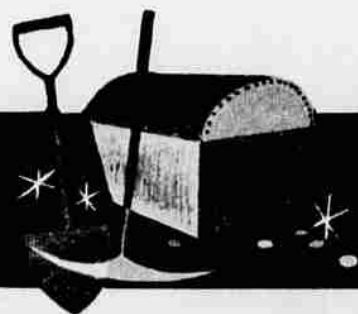

You and a friend can have a lot of fun getting this game ready. Then you can have even more fun playing it with others.

Gather up some old magazines with pictures of movie and television stars. Cut out the heads of those you recognize by sight. Now cut out some pictures of just anybody—babies, men, dancers, children. The faces in these pictures should be about the same size as those of the stars. Cut away the faces but not the hair of the babies, dancers, etc. Into the holes that are left, paste the face of a star. If you put, for instance, Roy Rogers' face in the

picture of a dancing lady or a baby, you will be surprised at how different—and how funny—he will look.

When you have made quite a few of these, ask your friends to try to guess who they are. Some of them will fail to guess even faces they know very well. (You might not remember yourself, so better write the name of the star on the back!) This game is fun any time, but especially at parties.

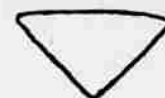
Marble Football

Lay a string on the floor, or draw some sort of a line (a line on the rug pattern will do) and start your game. Two of you can play, and you have two

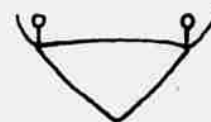
marbles each. The first one puts his marble on the line and the second says, "Kick your ball south," (or "west," "north," or "east," if he prefers). If the first player kicks his marble south he scores one point and has a chance for another kick. If he doesn't kick his marble in the direction he is told to kick it, he loses his turn and the second player scores a point. In continuing the game, the player places his second marble on the line and tries with his kick to make the second marble hit the first one. If he is able to hit the first marble, he wins two points and can kick again. He takes orders again as to the direction he is to kick and again, if he doesn't kick in that direction, he loses his turn.

We can have a lot of fun.

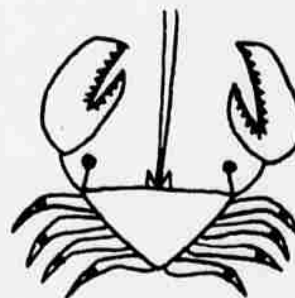


First at two corners sketch a
