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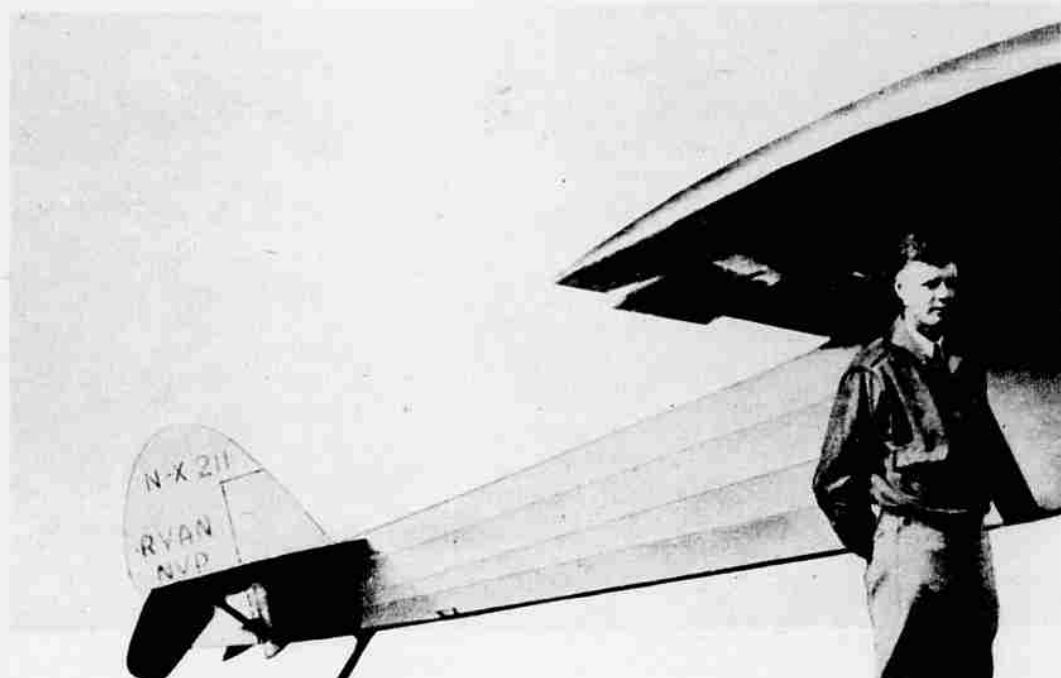

Jimmy Stewart Plays

Tomorrow marks the 30th anniversary of Charles A. Lindbergh's take-off from Roosevelt field, just outside New York City. He landed at Paris' LeBourget airport the next day as the world cheered his daring feat—the first solo flight across the Atlantic.

NO ONE BUT Jimmy Stewart could play the part of Charles A. Lindbergh in the new movie, "The Spirit of St. Louis."

After all, it was on Jimmy's 19th birthday—May 20, 1927—that Lindbergh lifted his silver monoplane off a New York airport for his historic flight across the Atlantic!

Aside from that, both men are more than six feet tall, weigh about 180 pounds, have a sort of shy, awkward, self-conscious manner, and have been crazy about planes all their lives. While the Lone Eagle made aviation his life work, Jimmy concentrated on acting but maintained a strong love for flying.

Jimmy saved up enough money working in his father's hardware store in Indiana, Pa., to pay \$10 for a 10-minute flight in a Jenny biplane in 1922—the same year 20-year-old Lindbergh left the University of Wisconsin engineering school to learn to fly. Incidentally, that type of plane—the famous Jenny—was the first one ever bought by Lindy.

After learning to fly, Lindbergh barnstormed around the country, flying his an-

cient Jenny and making parachute jumps. Later he flew the pioneer mail route between Chicago and St. Louis, all the while dreaming of making the first transatlantic solo flight.

Meanwhile, Jimmy Stewart was growing up and going to school. His flying mania was sidetracked while he attended Princeton and received a degree in architecture in 1932. It wasn't until Jimmy got to Hollywood that he took time to solo in 1935, later getting his commercial pilot's license.

Both men served in the Air Force—or its
