Miss Bergman Doubts Story That Husband Has Divorce Plans

Paris—**AP**—Actress Ingrid Bergman, who gave up her home, her family and her career to marry Roberto Rossellini, scoffed today at reports he planned to divorce her and wed the wife of an Indian film director.

"I think the whole thing is made up," she said. "Somebody started this whole thing and now it is blowing up out of all proportions. I think someone is trying to hurt my husband."

Ingrid Doubts Truth
Asked if reports were true that Rossellini is living in Bombay with Mrs. Sonali Das Gupta, a beautiful 27-year-old model and mother of two small boys, Miss Bergman said, "I don't think there is much truth to it."

She said she first heard the gossip from Rossellini himself during frequent telephone conversations with her 51-year-old husband who has been in India for some time. She said Roberto told her someone is trying to hurt him.

Miss Bergman, who is starring in the Paris production of the play "Tea and Sympathy," said, "You can see I'm not taking those reports very hard and I'm quite relaxed about it."

Dispatches from India said Mrs. Das Gupta had separated from her husband, Hari Das Gupta, who directed the movie "The Ribba." She is in Bombay where Rossellini is visiting and Das Gupta is in Calcutta.

Adjoining Rooms
The New York Daily News said in a copyrighted dispatch Mrs. Das Gupta and Rossellini were staying in adjoining rooms at the luxurious Hotel Taj Mahal and that she was expecting a baby, as Ingrid was almost eight years ago in her torrid Stromboli romance with Rossellini.

The News said Rossellini had been living for weeks with the beautiful wife of the Indian film director and was reported to have told her he plans to divorce Ingrid.

No Hazards Found In 218 Residences

City firemen noted no hazards in 218 residences last week during the first five days of their annual home inspection program.

They inspected 484 dwellings and made 427 recommendations for elimination of fire hazards. Firemen stopped at 917 homes. At 378 the occupants were not at home. Fifty-five residents refused the offer of inspection.

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One of Escapees From Missouri Jail Seized by Police

Kansas City, Mo.—**AP**—A half dozen police cars surrounded an apartment building here today and captured Isaac Sanders, 23, one of five men who escaped from the Jackson county jail Sunday.

Sanders, a federal prisoner who had been held on an alcoholic tax violation, was taken in a third floor apartment. Police rushed to the apartment after receiving word that a woman in a hysterical condition had escaped from the building where she reported that a man was armed.

Sheriff Arvid Owsley identified the two escapees still at large as Leroy Andrews, 28, a previous trouble maker who was awaiting transfer to serve a 20-year robbery sentence and Eugene (Indian Joe) Walker, 30, held for burglary, larceny and robbery.

Trustees Locked Up
The five prisoners locked up 18 deputies and trustees Sunday in their escape from the downtown jail.

Two of the escapees were captured about an hour after the break in a taxicab three miles from the jail. The pair, Robert LaVon Brewer, 20, sentenced for burglary, and Charles Beasley, 23, held for federal authorities on a bank burglary charge, offered no resistance although they were armed with pistols taken in the escape.

Red Cross Said Lacking in Funds

Washington—**AP**—The American Red Cross is in a "precarious financial position" because of funds it spent aiding disaster victims the past two years, National Chairman E. Roland Harriman said today.

Red Cross disaster funds are "completely gone" and total resources are sadly depleted, Harriman told the opening session of the organization's 32nd national convention.

Harriman said the Red Cross is being forced to cut down on its budget to the point where programs are being effected. He told the 5,000 delegates the Red Cross is in financial straits "primarily because we have spared no effort to do the job that the American people demand of the Red Cross."

President Eisenhower, honorary chairman of the Red Cross, planned to address the convention later today.

Man, 38, Confesses Slaying of Child

Bristol, Vonn.—**AP**—A 38-year-old man described as a known sex offender early today confessed he killed 9-year-old Brenda Doucette on her way to school.

Police said that James Davies, a toolsetter, admitted to them that he tricked the child into helping him fix a "flat tire" on his car, seized her and drove off with her on a lonely road.

He said he choked the girl because she screamed when he tried to molest her, police said. Then he flung her unconscious body to the ground and stabbed it 22 times.

The fully clothed body of the blue-eyed, blonde third-grader was found last Monday. Police said Davies admitted wrapping his sweater around Brenda's neck after the attack and leaving her body in the brush.

Bridge Across Youngs Bay Planned Next Year

Portland—**AP**—A four million dollar bridge across Youngs bay on Oregon Coast highway between Astoria and Warrenton may be started next year, provided federal funds are made available.

The State Highway commission told a delegation from Clatsop county here Friday that it may be possible to advance the starting date of the long-proposed project if money is allocated by the federal government. But the commission pointed out the full cost of the span would have to be available before construction is started.

New York—**AP**—Trading fell off sharply on the stock market today with prices edging higher.

Newmont Mining at its high was up five points. Gains of two to more than three points appeared in Lukens Steel, Universal Cylco Steel, Dana Corp., Plate Glass, Shell Oil, and National Lead.

International Business Machines ran up 10 points and Superior Oil of California 27.

Some profit taking developed. Industrials were set back when Du Pont fell. A loss of nearly a point in Panhandle Eastern Pipe Line helped offset a rise of more than a point in Consolidated Natural Gas in the Utilities. Ralls held firm, aided by several small gains.

Oils made the best showing in the major sections of the industrial list. Steels held steady. Motors were narrowly irregular.

Man's Body Found In Hobo Jungle

Vancouver, Wash.—**AP**—The body of an unidentified man was found in a hobo jungle here Saturday and police said he had been beaten to death.

The man had been bound hand and foot with a torn shirt. Three trousers discovered the body in the brush alongside the Northern Pacific railroad tracks on the outskirts of Vancouver.

A heavy cord bound the victim's hands and a cotton shirt was knotted around his ankles. Another shirt was stuffed in his mouth.

Police said no death weapon was found but severe wounds about his head indicated the man had been bludgeoned.
