Washington—President Eisenhower, on warning against further deep cuts in his foreign aid program:
"Refusal to give adequate support now for our crucial mutual security programs could hardly be more ill-advised or ill-timed... in this kind of gamble, American lives are just as much in the balance as American dollars."

Haitian Troops Patrol Streets

Port Au Prince—Haitian army troops patrolled the streets of Port Au Prince Tuesday night and today to enforce the curfew imposed by the military regime which took over control of Haiti Tuesday.

All persons with the exception of medical, diplomatic and military personnel and a handful of accredited correspondents were ordered to remain indoors between 9 p.m. and 4 a.m. Army patrols on foot and in vehicles made certain the orders were not violated.

The curfew was clamped on the country by the new military administration which deposed the "civilian junta" government. The army acted after the junta ordered Brig. Gen. Leon Cantave removed as chief of staff.

Cantave appeared in full control insofar as Port Au Prince was concerned. There was no immediate information here on the reaction from other sections of the republic.

Mickey Cohen at Graham Services

New York—Billy Graham Tuesday night preached a fiery sermon on the Ten Commandments—with emphasis on adultery and murder—before an audience of 17,500 that included former racketeer Mickey Cohen and two bodyguards.

Graham said before his sermon that although he knew Cohen was in the audience his words would not be directed specifically at the one-time czar of the West coast underworld. After the sermon, Cohen and Graham had a brief private meeting in Billy's office and then Cohen and his two bodyguards dashed off to catch a plane for Chicago.

An estimated 600 persons came forward to make "decisions for Christ" following what may have been the 38-year-old revivalist's most effective of seven Madison Square garden sermons to date.

In the first week of Graham's New York Crusade, 4,545 persons have come forward to "accept Jesus Christ." More than 117,500 have heard Graham in the first seven nights of his crusade.

Highway Use Shows Decline During April

Salem—The steady trend of increased highway use in Oregon was reversed for the first time last month. The State Highway Department reported that traffic counters in rural areas showed a decline of 1.6 per cent for the month.

The department said it was not yet certain whether the decreased use was indicative of a trend or was due to non-recurring factors. Principal exception to the slump was traffic on Oregon Highway 58 at Oakridge which enjoyed an 18.7 per cent increase.

New Delhi, India—The 35 pilgrim passengers of a bus were reported today to have died in a highway accident between Badrinath and Joshimath last Sunday.

Badrinath is a place of pilgrimage where devout Hindus flock for worship every summer. Heavy snows were reported in the area the past week.
