Central Point — Pitcher Fred Herrmann wrapped up his four-year Crater High school pitching career with a no-hit, no-run game yesterday as the Comets whipped Ashland 4 to 0 to finish in second place alone in Southern Oregon Conference baseball.

Crater also won the second game 2 to 1. It was a five-inning non-leaguer.

Herrmann struck out batters 13 times as he held the Grizzlies hitless. He issued two walks and hit one batter. Two fielders' options and three errors enabled other Ashland runners to get on base. Grizzlies twice got to third base. The Comets, themselves, got only four safeties off Ashland hurler Mark Fitch. They used them all to advantage, nevertheless.

Victory in the opener of the twinbill gave the Comets a final 8-3 standing in the circuit. Ashland wound up with 1-7.

In the second mix Crater collected only three hits off twirler Al McKinnis. Two were for extra bases, however, and the other was combined with walks as all three bingles figured in the scoring. Ashland was held to four hits by tosser Wayne Allen. Herrmann tallied both Crater runs.

Faced 27 Batters — Crater combined two miscues by Ashland, a base on balls and a single by Paul Beach in the first inning for two runs in the conference game. Two others came on a base on balls and singles by Stan Green, Ed Koch and Wayne Allen in the sixth inning.

No Comet player got more than one hit in the mix.

Herrmann faced a total of 27 batters over the seven inning route.

In the second inning of the second fracas Herrmann doubled and Neil Green tripled back to

back to manufacture a Crater run. Herrmann got his second hit of the mix in the fourth inning. He was pushed across for the winning run when McKinnis walked Neil Green, Stan Green and Koch.

Bill Maurer tripled and stole home in the third frame for Ashland's only run.

Allen recorded nine strikeouts and issued no walks during his five frames on the hill. McKinnis whiffed four and walked three.

The games wound up 1957 play for Coach Bill Piche's Crater nine.

UO Claims ND Title As Huskies Beat OSC

Seattle—UO—Oregon is the Northern Division baseball champion.

The Washington Huskies knocked off Oregon State twice here Tuesday, 5-2 and 9-7, assuring the Ducks of the title no matter what happens in their final series against the Beavers.

Oregon will meet California at Berkeley May 31 and June 1 for the PCC title and the right to play off with either Portland or San Diego State for a trip to the eight-team NCAA tourney at Omaha, Neb.

Washington got 13 hits in the first game, five in a three-run seventh inning which sewed up the game. Syl Johnson was the losing Beaver pitcher. Tom Hunt smacked a homer for the Beavers.

The Huskies scored nine runs on just eight hits in the second game with Dave Gambee taking the loss. Washington was trailing 7-2 in the bottom of the fifth when it scored three times and added four more in the sixth.

The first game defeat was enough to cost OSC its title chance.

Eagle Point Track Duo In AAU Meet

Eagle Point — Wayne Christian and Jack Greb, whose points gave Eagle Point the Oregon A-2 track and field championship last week end, will be entered in the Oregon AAU track meet next Saturday in Portland, Coach Stan Smith reported.

Christian will enter the javelin and discus and Greb the high jump and 220-yard dash. In the state meet Christian set a new spear record and with a throw better than the one which took A-1 honors. He also won the discus. Greb established a new high jump standard, was second in the 220 and fifth in the 100.

During the regular season Christian heaved the discus better than 160 feet in practice and had one meet cast of 158. His best javelin throw was 193-9. Both Eagle Pointers were district champions. Greb in three events with both sprints and the high jump.

In other games West Side nudged Roosevelt 10 to 9 and Washington bounced Lincoln 6 to 3 with the aid of Jim Allen's home run.

The Jeff run came in the bottom of the fifth and final inning. Jim Snodgrass walked and stole second base and Frank Toews got a base on balls. Snodgrass headed for third on a steal try. The base was overthrown on the attempt to nail the runner and he raced home to end the game. Jackson threatened with a man on third base three times despite

the fact that Mike Barnes tossed one-hit ball for Jefferson. Each pitchers struck out nine. Barnes walked two men while Glines walked three and hit two.

West Side lagged 2 to 8 after the Roosevelt third batting turn but picked up six markers to knot the game. Roosevelt went ahead with a run in the fourth frame.
