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Cutters of Budget Reckless Gamblers, President Declares

Washington—President Eisenhower charged Tuesday night that those who seek to cut his \$3,855,000,000 foreign aid program are "reckless" gamblers with the nation's safety.

In his most aggressive defense to date of his embattled budget, the President told the American people that cuts in what he called his "minimum" foreign aid figure would eventually mean a bigger army, bigger draft terms and more billions for defense spending.

Declaring any weakening of foreign aid would "vastly increase" the danger of war that would be paid for with "the lives of our youth," Eisenhower solemnly told budget-cutters: "The road to this disaster could easily be paved with the good intentions of those blindly striving to save the money that must be spent as the price of peace."

The President's tougher-talking defense of his foreign aid program was carried to the nation by major radio and TV networks. It followed his milder speech a week earlier supporting his overall spending budget for the next fiscal year.

There had been some criticism of the Chief Executive for not taking a firmer stand in last week's speech and his follow-up news conference the next day. High-ranking leaders of his own party in Congress said his previous speech had caused "not a ripple."

Eisenhower had another opportunity to plug his foreign aid program and budget at a news conference later today.

Secretary of State John Foster Dulles was scheduled to appear before the Senate Foreign Relations Committee to back up the new aid program and spell out its details.

First congressional reaction to Eisenhower's new defense of

his foreign aid program contained both in a message to Congress earlier Tuesday and his TV speech Tuesday night, showed some support for his stand but no clear sign he has cooled the budget-cutting fever.

Sen. Styles Bridges (R-N.H.), chairman of the Senate GOP Policy Committee who has attacked "global" spending, said he opposed "any effort to sabotage or cripple foreign aid" but thought the President's program could be cut another \$400 million. Others called for cuts up to \$1 billion.

Senate Democratic Leader Lyndon B. Johnson (Tex.) said the question of what constitutes a "minimum figure" can be determined "only after a searching scrutiny" of Eisenhower's proposals.

Sen. Theodore Francis Green (D-R.I.), chairman of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, said "if they can cut one-half billion dollars just like that, perhaps we'll start where they left off." This referred to the President's \$535,000,000 cut in his own foreign aid request, revealed in his message Tuesday although forecast earlier.

New York—Stocks followed Tuesday's course in today's session with an early decline followed by a recovery from the lows.

Many special stocks and selected issues of major groups registered wide gains.

Northern Pacific and Western Maryland were strong in a lower rail group; Pfizer was in demand in the drugs; Skelly and Mission in the oils; Kimberly Clark in the papers; American in the ship-buildings; and Curtiss-Wright in the aircrafts.

Leading steels held about steady. Autos eased. Metals held in a narrow area, mostly firm. Corn, up more than a point at a new high, featured the glass issues, and West Indies starred in the sugars.

Some issues lost two point or more, including Shell Oil and Thompson Products. International Business Machines plummeted 22 points and came back nine from the low.

Langley Statement Accuses Thornton

Portland—William Langley, ousted district attorney of Multnomah county, today filed a sworn statement in federal court here accusing Attorney General Robert Y. Thornton of conspiracy to obstruct federal justice.

K. C. Tanner, attorney for Langley, said a copy of the statement was sent to United States District Attorney C. E. Luckey in case the federal prosecutor wished to present it to a federal grand jury.

Thornton, when informed of the charge, promptly branded it as "eyewash" in an off-the-cuff reaction. When he learned that the statement was filed in a court proceedings he withheld further comment for the courts.
