

Johnny Klippstein Continues To Haunt Brooklyn; Red Sox Swat Four Homers in Inning

Johnny Klippstein, an ex-farm hand who never got a chance to make the grade in Brooklyn, has the Dodgers convinced today he's definitely "big league."

Klippstein, who was drafted out of the Dodgers' vast farm system back in 1950, has come back to haunt them with no less than eight victories in the last three years. He came through Wednesday night with a nifty five-hitter that gave the Cincinnati Redlegs an 8-1 triumph over the National league champions.

It was a key victory for the Redlegs because it snapped the Dodgers' five-game winning streak and dropped Brooklyn to third place. It enabled the Redlegs to retain their game and a half lead over the Milwaukee Braves, who scored a 4-3, 13-inning triumph over the Philadelphia Phillies.

The New York Giants edged out the Chicago Cubs, 4-3 in the only other National league activity. The Chicago White Sox made it two in a row over the New York Yankees, 8-4, the Boston Red Sox tied a league record of four homers in one inning as they routed the Cleveland Indians, 11-0, the Baltimore Orioles nipped the Detroit Tigers, 4-3, in 10 innings and the Kansas City Athletics whipped the Washington Senators, 8-6, in the American league.

Rain Delays Play
Klippstein, who had an 0-3 record and was kayoed in his four previous starts, turned in one of the best games by a Redleg pitcher this year. He yielded the Dodgers' run in the second inning but shut them out with two hits after play was halted by rain for an hour and 42 minutes in the middle of the fifth inning.

The Braves pulled out their game with the Phillies, after trailing 3-0, on the wings of a

three-run homer by Ed Mathews in the fifth and Chuck Tanner's first round-tripper of the year in the 13th. The blows, 11th and 12th homers off Robin Roberts this season, were backed up by strong Milwaukee relief pitching, which shut out the Phillies the last eight innings. Rookie Juan Pizarro, who took over in the 12th, won his second game while the loss was Roberts' fifth. He has three victories.

Red Schoendienst's ninth inning single following a double by Daryl Spencer gave the Giants their victory after a homer by Dale Long produced a 3-3 tie in the sixth. Relief pitcher Al Worthington won his third decision while Bob Rush suffered his fifth straight loss of the season.

Jim Wilson, 35-year-old right-hander, went the distance for his fifth win as the go-go White Sox took advantage of two errors by Billy Martin and a three-base miff by Mickey Mantle to score five unearned runs and stretch their winning streak to nine straight games. The victory stretched the White Sox' first-place lead to three games and dropped the slumping Yankees four games off the AL pace.

Gene Mauch, Ted Williams, Dick Gernert and Frank Malzone all homered in the sixth inning, tying the AL record for one inning and making it easy for Tom Brewer to breeze to his sixth win for the Red Sox. Cal McLish was the victim of the four homers — a major league mark for round-trippers off one pitcher in an inning.

Pinch-hitter Al Pilarcik's scratch hit scored Tito Francona with the winning run for the Orioles. George Zuverink gained the decision in relief while Frank Lary, appearing in relief for the first time this year, suffered his sixth loss compared to two wins.

Gus Zernial ended the Athletics' string of 29 consecutive scoreless innings with a two-run first-inning homer and paved the way for Alex Kellner to win his first game. Zernial also homered in the seventh for the Athletics and Vic Power connected for his third. Roy Sievers hit No. 9 and Jim Lemon No. 2 for the Senators.

Four of World's Top Milers in Coliseum Relays

Los Angeles — Since Roger Bannister first cracked four minutes for the mile on May 6, 1954, there have been 11 men who have broken that barrier and four of them will compete here Friday night in the "miracle mile" event of the Coliseum relays.

These select four who accept invitations to compete are Mervyn Lincoln of Australia, Derek Ibbotson and Brian Hewson of Great Britain and Laszlo Tabori of Hungary.

Lincoln is the latest of the "under four minute" milers, having raced the distance at Melbourne March 23 in 3:58.9. As the only one of the four to break four minutes this year, Lincoln was expected to be favored on the Coliseum track before some 40,000 track and field enthusiasts.

The Australian runner, protégé of the retired John Lundy, would only say that the race would be as good as the pace set by his competitors and would not guess what the possibilities were of breaking Landy's world record of 3:58.

Should the race, however, become one of tactics in which victory is the objective rather than breaking the record, then Jerome Walters of the Southern California Striders might well beat the select quartet.

The Black Tornado will be host to the conference champion Grants Pass nine. A seven inning league fracas is set for 2:30 p.m. with a five inning non-counter to follow.

While the Cavemen have long since tucked away the crown, the Tornado baseballers can salvage prestige by whipping the GP nine and earn a split in loop play with the champs and taking the extra fray. Grants Pass took the other loop encounter 3 to 0.

Medford will be working for a third spot share with Klamath Falls which has concluded its play with a 4-4 record. Crater is guaranteed of second with 5-3. Tornado players aim to improve an 3-4 mark.

Southern Cal, Idaho Fined For PCC Code Violations

Spokane — Southern California and Idaho were fined \$1,000 each yesterday for violations of the Pacific Coast Conference code.

Diamond Lake Fish Season Will Begin on Saturday; Rogue Good for Chinook

Portland — Beginning Saturday, all of Oregon will be open territory to anglers. Only limits on their excursions will be snow and bad roads leading to the high Cascade lakes and tributaries that will be opened to angling on that day.

The state game commission said some 1000 new fishing holes would become available in the Cascades and Paulina mountains.

Paulina lake is free of ice, but snow remains in many camp areas. East lake, however, should be clear for fishermen by the week end.

In the Deschutes area, Crane Prairie lakes are open to Gales and Robideaux landings and into Cow camp. Cultus is open via Cow camp, but the road is bad.

Elk lake is open via Fall River. Davis lake is accessible via Highway 58. Lava lakes are open and there is a chance of reaching Irish and Taylor lakes by the opening week end. Little Cultus, Sparks, Summit, Todd, and Waldo lakes are snowbound. Most of the high lakes in the Mt. Hood area are still snowbound.

Chains, Shovels Urged
Skyline road into Olallie lake will not be open until the latter part of June. Passable roads include the Austin Hot Springs, Badger creek at Bonny crossing, Harriet lake, Kingsley guard station, Larix mountain road, and the McCubbin gulch road.

In addition to fishing gear, the game commission strongly urged anglers to carry chains and shovels but to leave trailer houses behind if they are heading for Paulina and East lakes. Only parking spaces there are on the main road.

Bag limit for most of the lakes is 10 fish per day, not more than five of them over 12 inches long.

Contrary to other published reports, there was still plenty of room for trailers as of today at the Diamond lake campground. That was the word this morning from Larry Neely and Bill Cox, camp proprietors.

Fishing season opens Saturday at the lake and a horde of anglers are expected to try their luck.

Mrs. Neely told the Mail Tribune this morning that the campground is in the best shape she's seen it at this time of year with only slight patches of snow. She also stated that the road is in the best shape she's seen it at this time of year with only slight patches of snow. She also stated that the road is in better shape than at this stage of the season in past years.

While there was plenty of campground room, Mrs. Neely advised fishermen with trailers to get to the lake as early as possible since it's hard to predict what the situation will be in a day or two. About 20 trailers were already on the grounds. The camp provides tables, wood and water along with space for camping.

Cole Rivers, Grants Pass, game commission biologist and field man, said this morning that the fish and game agency anticipates good catches of Canadian rainbow trout up to 20 inches in length at Diamond lake. He reminded anglers of the limit of 10 fish per day with no more than five over 12 inches in length.

All Diamond lake tributaries are closed to angling. Rivers said. Currently closed also is the area in a 450-foot radius into the lake from the mouths of Silent and Short creeks. Roads are open along the south and east sides of the lake, Rivers reported.
