

First Concrete Results Produced In Disappearance of Eugene Man

Washington—A federal grand jury which has been in secret session for weeks has produced the first concrete results of the uproar caused by the disappearance of Eugene Man. The grand jury, which is composed of 12 members, has returned a 12-page indictment against Frank J. Trujillo, a 42-year-old former FBI agent, who is charged with the disappearance of Eugene Man.

On orders of the grand jury, a Trujillo agent operating in this country has been arrested for failing to register with the Justice Department, as the law requires of all foreign agents. The grand jury's investigation is continuing, which indicates that more evidence is being presented which may result in action against the Trujillo regime.

The arrested agent is a 42-year-old former FBI agent, John J. Frank, who also served with the Central Intelligence Agency, America's top secret worldwide network for gathering information about foreign governments.

Frank's trial in federal court here figures to be revealing of methods employed by Dominican agents, and especially how Frank allegedly operated with young Murphy in the sensational kidnapping of Dr. Jesus de Galindez, the Columbia University lecturer who was writing a book documenting the crimes of the Trujillo regime.

Two counts of the four count indictment against Frank charge that Frank collected information for and "solicited and accepted" compensation from the Trujillo government without registering as an agent. The other two counts

say he did the same with the dictator personally.

The indictment also charged that Frank "dispensed and disbursed" money for Trujillo and the Dominican government in Washington, D. C., and elsewhere in the United States.

Frank was also known as "John Kane" in his work as an agent. It has been reported that a man named "Kane" helped Murphy leave and pay for a private aircraft from a firm near New York. The plane was later flown by Murphy to the Dominican Republic in the Caribbean with a passenger believed to have been Dr. Galindez, who was unconscious in the guise of a cancer patient.

Nathan B. Levin, special attorney for the government who is making the investigation with the grand jury, says only that the case has international ramifications because of the nature of the charges against Frank. He said Frank maintained a home in the Dominican Republic and traveled frequently between there and Washington.

Each count in the indictment carries a penalty of five years and/or a \$10,000 fine.

Frank was a special agent for the FBI from 1941 until 1949. He subsequently worked for the CIA and has been in private law practice since 1953.

Two well known figures in Washington who served Trujillo have severed their connections since the Murphy case exploded several months ago. They are Franklin D. Roosevelt Jr., a New York attorney now, and Charles Patrick Clark, whose most prominent client in recent years has been General Francisco Franco of Spain. They both quit Trujillo Feb. 28. Roosevelt reportedly was getting \$30,000 annually for his services.

These are the only concrete results thus far of the furor touched off months ago by Rep. Charles O. Porter (D-Ore.) after Murphy disappeared. Thus far Porter has been unable to provoke a congressional investigation of the extent to which Trujillo has operated in this country and been aided by American funds given him under the foreign military and economic aid programs.

Prosecutors Named For Schunk Trial

Salem — Attorney General Robert Y. Thornton said today that Elliott B. Cummins of McMinnville and John W. Pickett of Coquille would handle the case for the prosecution in state vs. Terry D. Schunk, scheduled to start June 17.

Mayor Schunk of Portland was one of several indicted by the Multnomah county grand jury after an extended investigation of alleged vice conditions in Portland.

Cummins is former district attorney of Yamhill county and was chief prosecutor for the state in the recent trial of Multnomah County District Attorney William M. Langley.

Thornton said that the employment of Pickett, former Coos county district attorney, had been requested by Cummins and said he concurred wholeheartedly in Cummins' recommendation of Pickett.

Scientists Isolate Influenza Virus

Washington — U.S. scientists working around the clock for five days have succeeded in isolating the influenza virus now sweeping the Far East, the Army's Walter Reed Medical Center announced Wednesday night. The scientists discovered that the type of influenza which has plagued Singapore, Formosa, Hong Kong and the Philippines is an entirely new strain. Most afflicted areas in the Far East have reported the influenza attacks in the epidemic were "mild." But the Philippines is said to have had at least 31 fatalities among children.

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
