Billy Graham Will Enter Television; Has Ideas on Making Religious Shows

New York—Evangelist Billy Graham, riding the crest of one of his most successful crusades, will branch out to network TV starting next week.

Graham will face off against NBC-TV's Perry Como and CBS-TV's Jackie Gleason when he launches the first of a four-week 60-minute Saturday night series on ABC-TV this June 1. The competition doesn't seem to have him worried.

"We'll just take the left-overs," said Graham with the hint of a smile. "Maybe one or two people will switch over. Whatever time period you have, you're going to be up against something anyway. Originally, we were thinking in terms of Sunday night," continued Graham. "But that would have put us against Steve Allen and Ed Sullivan. We figured that might be too much."

Message Counts
The 38-year-old Graham, embarked on a campaign to whip up religious interest in New York, will beam his TV show right from Madison Square Garden, home base of his crusade.

"We're not going to change anything for TV," he said. "I'm just going to preach right at the camera. You might say I have an advantage over other show people because it's not the speaker that counts, it's what the speaker is saying. And this is a message people are hungry for."

Graham, who had a syndicated TV show of his own for three

years, was critical of religious programs on TV.

"I don't think the church has properly utilized TV," said Graham. "TV is the greatest medium for getting a message across, but the church is failing miserably in getting its message over. The TV programs I've seen are of inferior caliber."

Father on Trial For Beating Daughter
Portland—Glen Denessen, 35, went on trial in Circuit Court today on a charge of assault and battery in connection with the beating of his daughter Janet, 13.

Selection of a jury in the court of Judge Alfred T. Sulmonetti began today.

Denessen also faces charges of contributing to the delinquency of a minor and his wife, Dorothy, 31, has been charged with assault and battery.

Plastic Tube To Be Used To Gather Syrup
Ithaca, N. Y.—Researchers seeking cheaper ways to gather maple syrup plan to use a network of plastic tubing linking 300 trees.

The College of Agriculture at Cornell University has tried the tubing with 55 trees and will expand the network next fall.

The quarter-inch tubing runs downhill and is connected to a main line running to a collecting can.

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
