

New Phase For Score

Cleveland—P—Cleveland Indian pitcher Herb Score today begins a "new phase of readjustment" which eye specialist Dr. Charles Thomas believes will result in his return to the mound.

Thomas, who has treated the southpaw since he was struck in the right eye by a batted ball May 7, said Thursday night, "I am certain Herb will regain his vision."

Thomas offset his optimism, however, by refusing to predict when he thought Score could return to the mound.

He said that would depend on how the eye, bandaged since the accident, readjusts to full light. Since the accident, measures have been taken to keep almost all light out of the eye. Now steps will be taken to accustom the eye to full light.

During a limited press conference Thursday, Score said, "I can see motion now but details are hazy and cloudy." He added, "It's gotten much better—but it's better than seeing blackness, I'll tell you."

Bob Rosburg Heads Open

Kansas City, Mo.—P—Bob Rosburg, San Francisco professional regarded as one of golf's putting artists, held a one stroke edge today as the second round started in the \$22,000 Kansas City Open.

The 30-year-old Californian, known for his baseball grip, mastered the Hillcrest Country club's fast, rolling greens for a 5 under par 67 in Thursday's opening round.

Rosburg dropped birdie putts from 1 to 20 feet and was never over par, finishing with a 15-footer on No. 18. He began poorly.

Former U.S. Open champion Lloyd Mangrum, Apple Valley, Calif., was just a stroke off Rosburg's performance while Ed Furgol, St. Andrew, Ill., had a 70.

Defending champion Bob Wingard, Odessa, Tex., also cut two strokes off Hillcrest's par-72 as did Al Bessellink, Grossingers, N.Y.; Billy Maxwell, Odessa, Tex.; Pat Schwab, Dayton; Tom Nieporte, Cincinnati and Gary Player, Johannesburg, South Africa.

Secession From PCC Discussed at UCLA

Spokane, Wash.—P—The Pacific Coast conference had a new aid to athletes policy today along with the same old bugaboo of secession which has plagued the group since last year's disclosure of illegal pay-offs.

Even while the conference's faculty members were loosening the lid Thursday on the amount of money an athlete can receive, alumni representatives of penalized UCLA were preparing to go before the regents today in Westwood and discuss the school's relationship with the conference.

A move to have next fall's crop of banned seniors at UCLA and Southern California play for half the season as was the case last year was beaten down Wednesday by the PCC by a vote of 5-4.

Trying To Be Sensible

"We haven't decided what is the right thing to do yet," Alumni Association Director Harry J. Longway said. "If withdrawal is the right thing, then that's what we might do. We're trying to be sensible about the whole matter."

Meanwhile, back at the meeting, the following changes were made:

Under a new plan, which will apply only to football and basketball players, an athlete will be able to receive twice the going rate of \$2 per hour for a maximum amount of six hours per week when his sport is in season. Thus he could work for \$4 per hour for a total of \$24 per week.

At the same time, he still could not earn more than the present ceiling of \$100 per month.

May Reject

An athlete may reject this plan in favor of another job which might pay more in the long run but he could not change his mind later in the year when his sport opened.

This plan replaced another one in which aid would have been based on the cost of living at various schools.

Dr. Glenn Seaborg, conference spokesman, said he voted against the new policy because it contained a "hidden subsidy" stemming from the basic scale of \$2 per hour. But Conference Commissioner Victor O. Schmidt described it as a "more realistic

way of compensating an athlete."

The faculty representatives also ruled that, starting in September of 1960, prospective athletes must have had a 2.5 C-plus average in preparatory subjects at high school in order to play in college sports.

This new policy has to be ratified by the PCC President's council.

Other Action:

Tackle Dick Enright of Southern California was granted permission to play in five games this year. He was among seniors granted a half-season of eligibility last year but could not play because of injuries.

Changed this year's conference baseball playoffs between California and Oregon to May 30-31.

Scheduled a conference cross country meet for UCLA on Nov. 9. Also slated May 23-24, 1958, for PCC track meet at California, golf meet at Stanford and tennis at Washington or Oregon State.

Pilots Bill Pepperdine

Portland—P—University of Portland's opponent for an NCAA playoff berth against the PCC baseball champion will be Pepperdine of Los Angeles.

The Pilots will meet Pepperdine in a best two-out-of-three series next week end at Multnomah stadium.

The winners meets the Oregon-California winner June 4-5 on the PCC champ's home diamond for a berth in the quarter-finals starting at Omaha June 8.

Camp White Practice Set

Camp White team of the Rogue Valley league will hold a practice session on Saturday.

Manager Keith Johnson has called for a 2 p.m. workout on the senior high school field here.

The Whitties will have the Veterans Administration domiciliary field as their home and will have their first tussle on that diamond in a non-league with the Medford Cheney Studs on Thursday, May 30, Memorial day.

Is That So?

What's the most dangerous mammal? When excited, a domestic bull can be downright dangerous. A tiger that has once tasted human flesh, is certainly no house pet. A king cobra is a killer. All of these are dangerous.

But when you define the animal as being enormously powerful, mean-tempered and aggressive, then that is a different matter. A bull will not harm a man, usually, unless he has been molested. A tiger, unless he is hungry.

But for downright cussedness, power and fierceness, big game hunters tell me that nothing will surpass the black buffalo of South Africa.

This mammal, found from the Cape of Good Hope to the Congo, often known as the "Cape" buffalo, is exceedingly powerful—and this power is backed up with enormous muscles, massive head and horns almost as strong as steel. He is never in good temper and will charge at almost anything that is alive. The only way to escape certain death is to get out of his path as quickly as possible. And adds, Jerome S. Meyer, in his book of Amazing Facts (World, N. Y.) "more hunters have been killed by the Cape Buffalo than by any other anywhere in the world."

To go back to the cobra, the king cobra of Siam is the most poisonous living thing in the world. Its glands are larger and its fangs can deliver more deadly venom than any other animal or insect. In most instances, the bite of the king cobra proves fatal within three hours and often death occurs in less than 60 minutes.

There is an instance on record in which a comparatively small Antarctic killer whale, in an attempt to attack some sleigh dogs stranded on an ice floe, dived deeply under the floe and swam very swiftly upward with such force that the ice which was nearly five feet thick, was splintered into tiny fragments.

In another record, Captain Nelson tells that while on a whaling expedition off the Siberian coast when his boat made fast to a giant blue whale, the animal pulled the boat for seven hours at a speed never less than eight knots (about ten miles per hour) although the boat's engines were pushing it full speed in the opposite direction.

Young 25 Feet Long
The young of the blue whale, incidentally can be 25 feet long at birth and weigh up to 14,280 pounds.

As for the largest land animal, that distinction goes to the bull African elephant which stands 11 feet at the shoulder and may exceed 14,000 pounds in weight. (In the U.S. the largest wild land animal is the bison, which if my memory serves me has weighed up to 3,000 pounds.)

Yet, for its size—the smallest of all mammals, the shrew, is a deadly killer. And not to be overlooked, the tiniest of warm-blooded animals, the fairy hummingbird of Cuba. It weighs less than 1/200 of an ounce! Yet despite its tiny size—hardly ever more than 2 1/4 inches—it will fight birds four and five times its size and frequently rout them.

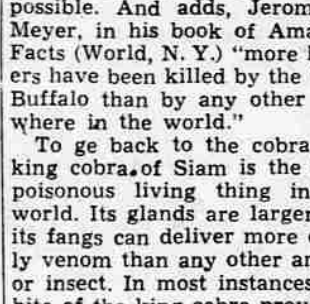
Columbus Eyes First Division
