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Ike Commits U.S. To Proposals for Easing War Threat

Stassen Ordered To Return To Conference

Washington — President Eisenhower committed the United States Saturday to a series of concrete proposals for easing the threat of atomic war.

He ordered disarmament negotiator Harold E. Stassen to return to London Sunday with "flexible" offers to lay before Russia, Britain, France and Canada in arms reduction talks resuming Monday.

The proposals were not officially revealed but guarded statements by Secretary of State John Foster Dulles and other sources after a final White House meeting included:

Worldwide Agreement

—A bid for voluntary worldwide agreement to limit possession of atomic weapons to the three present "nuclear powers"—the United States, U.S.S.R. and Britain.

—Eisenhower's "open skies" aerial inspection plan, over large areas of Soviet, U.S. and allied territory as Russian will accept, and on an equitable basis.

—Reduction of present weapons stockpiles by padlocking of equal amounts of Soviet, U.S. and other nations' munitions in depots controlled by international inspectors.

Dulles said the proposals "will safeguard the vital interests of the United States."

Opportunity for Progress

"On the other hand," he added, "they should afford a real opportunity for substantial progress to be made in the way of establishing safeguards against sudden armed attack and in moving in the direction of limitations of armament, both nuclear and conventional."

He said it was "implicit" in his guarded announcement that the United States would press for international agreement to "restrict the spread of these (nuclear) weapons where they are now."

Dulles refused to specify what areas the United States would propose for inclusion in the U.S.-Soviet aerial inspections to guard against surprise attacks. Previously, however, he has indicated willingness to start the plan on a test basis with Soviet flights over Alaska and part of Canada and U.S. flights over eastern Siberia.

Dynamite Blast Heard in Medford

A full ton of dynamite, amounting to about 40 cases, was discharged Friday about 3 p.m. at a granite pit north of Jacksonville. It was reported that the blast was heard in downtown Medford.

The charge was set off by Virgil O. Anderson construction company to loosen an estimated 5,000 to 10,000 yards of rock and fill work. Cost of the dynamite used in the blast was in the neighborhood of \$500, according to Anderson. Another \$400 was spent in drilling the three six-inch holes for the charge, which varied in depth from 35 to 50 feet, he said.

Israel Security Forces

Kill 4 Arab Marauders

Jerusalem, Israel — Israeli security forces killed four Arab marauders in the Negev desert Saturday, the Israeli army announced.

Army spokesman Col. Nehemiah Brosh said an Israeli patrol flushed the Arabs from a river bed, west of Meiri settlement near the Gaza strip, and opened fire on them when they ignored challenges and attempted to flee.

Nationalist China Cabinet Offers To Quit as Gesture

Taipei, Formosa — The Nationalist Chinese government was reported to have offered to resign Saturday as an apologetic gesture to the United States in the wake of anti-American riots which swept Taipei. But the proffered resignation was rejected by President Chiang Kai-shek.

A few hours later, a midnight to 5 a.m. curfew was imposed. Traffic was brought to a standstill and the deserted streets gave Taipei a war-like atmosphere with troops at every intersection. The suddenness of the move also brought confusion, with many Chinese cars and buses halted in the first hour for inspection.

About 3,000 Hear Governor Dedicate New Guard Armory

A crowd estimated at some 3,000 persons last night heard Gov. Robert D. Holmes dedicate Medford's new National Guard armory.

The "widest possible use" for military and civic activities over the years to come.

The near-capacity audience, seated on the floor and balconies of the gleaming new \$376,930 structure, which was completed only last week, also toured the classrooms and other facilities before and after the formal ceremonies, and many of them stayed for dancing later in the evening.

Concert, military and dance music was furnished by Portland's 234 Oregon National Guard band.

Colorful military ceremonies, commanded by officers in full dress blue and gold uniforms featured the hour-long program. An honor guard of members of the two Medford National Guard companies, Company A and Headquarters company, both of the 1st battalion, 186th Infantry regiment, lined one aisle. Guests and dignitaries were escorted to their reserved seats in the front part of the spacious auditorium.

Governor Holmes, in his dedicatory address, emphasized the varied purposes of the National Guard, both in wartime and in peacetime emergency service, citing their assistance to the people of eastern Oregon only last January during floods.

Beck Not To Seek Reelection as Teamster Chief

Pressure Expected To Force Resignation

Washington — Teamsters President Dave Beck, accused of using his union position to enrich himself and his family, announced Saturday night he will not run for reelection at the union's convention this September.

The 62-year-old Beck already is under heavy fire within the union to resign as president. The move led to speculation that he not running for reelection he hopes to keep his post until September.

To Call Meeting

Beck also disclosed he will call a meeting of the Teamsters' executive board sometime next month. Informal sources have predicted heavy pressure will be put on him at the next board meeting to resign.

There have been reports that a majority of the board will try to force his resignation if he refuses.

Teamsters vice president James R. Hoffa, one of the union's strongest leaders, may be a front-runner in the scramble for Beck's post.

Faces Indictments

He was regarded as Beck's logical successor until recently. But he now has two federal indictments hanging over him—one for alleged bribery in connection with the senate investigation of labor racketeering and the other for alleged wire-tapping at Detroit.

Another Teamsters vice president, John T. O'Brien of Chicago, is the only announced candidate for the top post so far. He has the support of Teamsters secretary-treasurer John F. English, who this week received the blessing of the AFL-CIO leadership for a Teamsters "clean-up" campaign.

Einar Mohn, executive vice president under Beck, also has been talked about as a possible candidate by his associates.

Ike and Adenauer To Talk Disarmament

Washington — President Eisenhower and West German Chancellor Konrad Adenauer will begin discussions today on the role of the federal republic in new western disarmament plans.

The two leaders will start three days of formal talks in Washington next week after a Sunday luncheon at the president's Gettysburg farm.

Adenauer arrived in New York Friday. He is spending the week end with friends in Connecticut.

Adenauer is eager to obtain renewed assurances that the United States will not go beyond a "first step" disarmament plan without insisting that some progress be made toward German unification.

In addition the Chancellor hopes that some of Eisenhower's election "magic" will rub off on him. He faces a stiff fight with the Social Democrats for control of the German parliament in the Sept. 15 elections. He will be trying for all the political mileage he can get from his talks here.

Atomic Test Blast Postponed 11th Time

Las Vegas, Nev. — Unfavorable winds which would distribute radioactive fallout on populated areas resulted in the 11th consecutive postponement Saturday of firing of the first atomic device of the 1957 test series by the atomic energy commission on the southern Nevada desert.

Actually, the AEC scientists have two devices ready for testing and will fire whichever one can be safely detonated at the first opportunity. One was the equivalent violence of 10,000 tons of TNT and the other is considerably smaller.

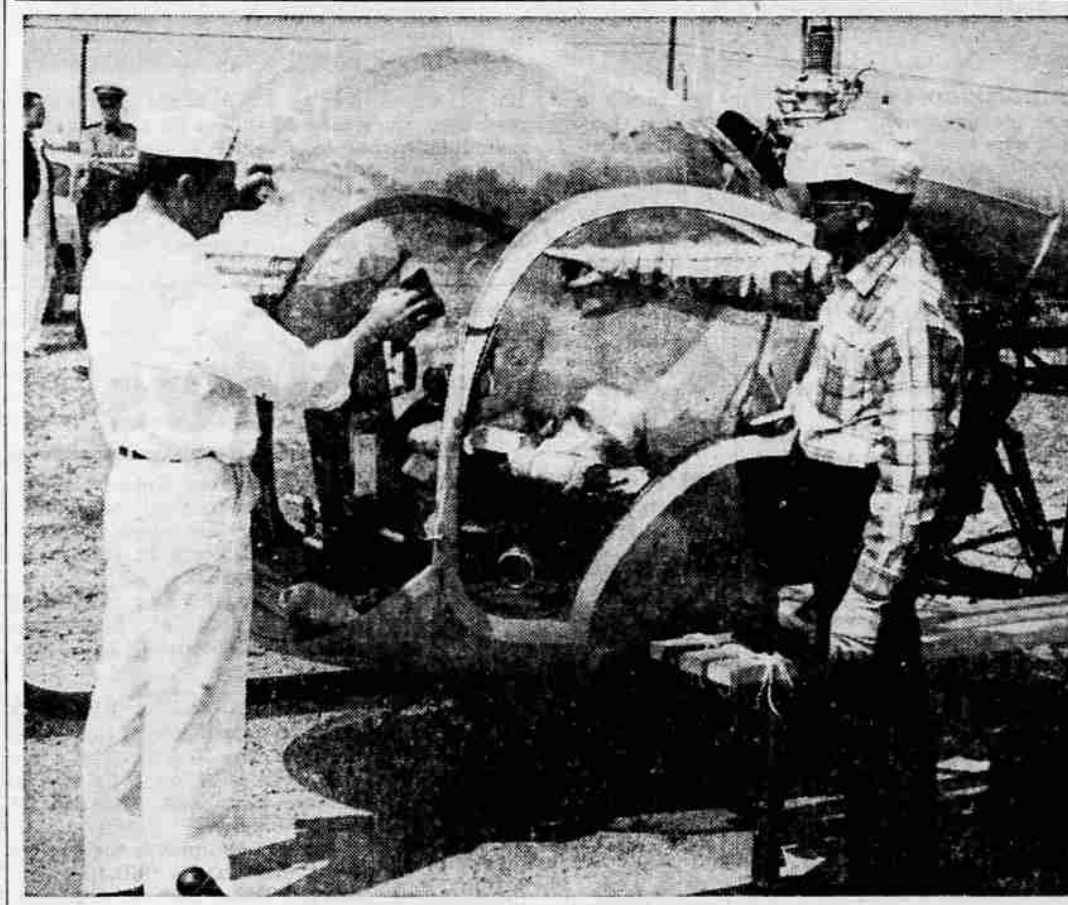

Search Continued For Body of Man In Rogue River

Dragging operations were continuing late last night in an effort to recover the body of Darrell Winter, route 1, box 174A, Rogue River, who drowned in the Rogue river Saturday evening when he fell into the water while water skiing, according to state police.

Officers reported the man was water skiing on the Rogue near Chuck and Monty's boat dock, about a mile south of the Josephine county line, when he accidentally lost his balance and fell into the water.

Dozens of search crews, composed of Jackson and Josephine county sheriff's deputies, state police, volunteer fishermen and other week end sportsmen, were dragging the river in boats and along both banks in an effort to locate the body.

State police said he fell into the water about 7:37 p.m. Saturday and was not seen since. Names of his family and those who were with him yesterday were not known by police.

Death of Medford Youth Brings Suit

Portland — Trans-World and United Airlines Friday were named defendants in a \$317,000 civil damage suit in Federal Court here for the death of Stephen Bishop, 19, of Medford in the Grand Canyon mid-air collision last June.

Crash of airliners of the two lines claimed 128 lives, including that of the Medford youth who was an employee of TWA. The suit brought by James Everett Bishop, administrator of the youth's estate, claims the two lines were guilty of "concurrent negligence."

Bishop, son of Mr. and Mrs. James E. Bishop, formerly of Jacksonville, was an office employee for TWA and made his home in Kansas City, Mo. He graduated from Jacksonville High school and attended Lincoln school in Medford for several years.

He was born in Minnesota and moved with his family to Medford in 1942. The family later moved to Jacksonville. While in Medford, Bishop was active in Boy Scout work.

Oxnard, Calif. — Members of Local 20875, United Sugar Workers of America, will return to work Monday, ending a month-old strike at the American Crystal Sugar Co. plant.

Huntington, Ore. — Oregon state police reported Saturday that Jim Alexander, 34, Weiser, Idaho, drowned in the Snake river four miles from here while fishing.

Civil War in Haiti As Military Forces Battle Insurgents

Port au Prince, Haiti — Civil war broke out in Haiti Saturday.

Forces supporting Brig. Gen. Leon Contave, chief of staff of the army and head of the military government, and insurgents supporting Col. Pierre Armand, former Port au Prince police chief, staged a one-hour artillery duel in the heart of Port au Prince at midday.

The firing took place directly in front of the U.S. embassy, and at least three rifle bullets hit the embassy building.

Gun Blows Up — Four followers of Armand were killed when a 75-millimeter field gun blew up during the battle. Two civilians were killed by rifle fire.

Two United Press reporters came under fire.

The bloodshed climaxed a five-month political crisis that began when former president Paul Magloir tried to extend his term of office last December. His effort was thwarted by a nationwide general strike and he fled into exile.

Since then, two provisional presidents chosen in the regular constitutional order of succession were forced to step down by political strikes on the grounds they were favoring one or another of the many candidates for president in pending elections.

Early in April the warring factions agreed on a 10-man council to govern until the elections. Three supporters of candidate Francois Duvalier later quit, charging the election machinery was being rigged against him.

Diamond Lake Jammed by Fishermen On Opening Day of High Cascade Season

Diamond lake, as anticipated, was the Mecca for thousands of fishermen as trout season opened in high Cascade lakes yesterday but angling proved poor for the majority who tried their luck in the early part of the day.

Congestion at Lake — Heavy congestion both on the shores and on the lake was indicated in an afternoon telephone communique from the Diamond lake resort. An estimated 7,000 to 10,000 people were in the Diamond lake area and guesses on the number of boats on the fishery ranged from 1,500 to 3,000.

Game commission personnel estimated 1,500 to 2,000 craft and the state police figure was higher, 2,500 to 3,000.

While a few limit catches were

reported, trout takes were reported generally poor during the morning and early afternoon. Luck was improving by mid-afternoon and numbers of the more expert anglers were said to be heading out to test the appetite of Canadian rainbow trout for artificial flies.

Size of the trout ranged from 15 to 20 inches.

Rumors Rampant — Rumors concerning opening day at Diamond were running rampant in Medford yesterday and a good share of them were shown to be unfounded. Stories that the forest service employees and state police were turning people back from the lake and not letting them put boats on the lake, just weren't true, officers stated. The resort was placing no restrictions on put-

ting boats on the lake but did say that the congestion did make launching somewhat hard to manage. Fishermen were getting their craft into the water.

Trotting was still being permitted on the lake but was difficult because of the large number of boats.

Police were checking cars for live bait, since its use is not allowed.

Accommodations Filled — Campground and resort accommodations were reported filled up yesterday. The resort reported that it did, however, have openings for tonight. The same situation was seen likely for the campground.

Fishermen were reported to be parking their cars on the summer home road. Fishing was also being done from the bank.

Water Running Roof-Top Deep as River Leaves Banks

Worst Yet To Come, Forecasters Claim

Dallas, Tex. — Heavy floods battered water-weary Fort Worth and Dallas Saturday night leaving 4,000 persons homeless in Fort Worth and the worst was yet to come.

Water ran rooftop deep in new brick houses completed only two months ago in Fort Worth was the West and Clear forks of the Trinity river went out of their banks from cloudbursts of nearly six inches.

A flood stage of 40 feet was predicted on the Trinity in Dallas for late Sunday. The Trinity hit a crest of 39.7 feet exactly a month ago to the day, chasing 2,500 persons from their homes and causing \$6,500,000 in damages.

Projects Prevent Disaster

The Trinity at Dallas has been running at or near flood stage of 28 feet for more than a month of intermittent cloudbursts.

Rep. Jim Wright (D-Tex.) toured the flooded Fort Worth area in a motor boat. Wright is a member of the House Public Works committee.

"Flood control projects have saved Fort Worth from a very terrible disaster," Wright said. "If we had had more dams, some of these floods would have been prevented. I'm resentful to hear of these barrels of projects tagged 'pork barrel.'"

United Press correspondent Carl Freund said the flooded forks of the Trinity spilled out where they meet north of the courthouse at Fort Worth and had begun to spill into lowlands of the east side.

10 Feet Over Spillway — Freund described the situation thus:

Lake Bridgeport, high above Fort Worth, was running 10 feet over its spillway, spilling water into Eagle Mountain lake which in turn dumped 8.6 feet of water into Lake Worth which in turn was running five feet over its spillway into the West fork of the Trinity.

Freund said the crest on the West fork is not expected until tomorrow.

He said a house had been washed into the west fork and was hanging against a bridge on a highway leading into Carswell Air Force base.

Freund said 70 homes in the Sundown addition were under water. Other additions under flood waters were Sunset acres, Sky acres and McGee additions. In the McGee addition water was running 12 feet deep.

Freund said about 3,400 persons were homeless in Fort Worth proper. Some 600 more were driven out from the shores of Eagle Mountain lake and from the fashionable Richland Hills suburb, northeast of the city.

Child Feared Drowned

There were no reports of flood deaths or injuries in Fort Worth or Dallas, but at Weatherford where a cloudburst dumped 5.68 inches of rain, a child was reported and feared drowned, police dispatcher Dick Yandell said.

Yandell said two houses were under water at Weatherford.
