

News About Books From the Library

Patrons of the Multnomah County library (Portland Public Library) are currently being given leaflets explaining the library's remodeling and reorganization, now nearing completion. To help them find their way to new departments and services an outline and plans are included in the leaflet.

At the same time readers are asked for their help on the tremendous problem of book losses. "More than 1,000 books were carried away from the library absent-mindedly in 1955, or were stolen. This meant that we could buy 1,000 fewer new books for your pleasure and profit from our book funds. We are seeking the cooperation of all our readers in this problem. The few who willfully take from their fellow readers can be frustrated if all other readers make a practice of stopping at the charge out desk to show all books and the contents of brief cases and bags as they go out."

"Many libraries have had to install turnstiles or employ uniformed guards at the doors. The cooperation of all our readers will enable us to avoid such measures and their costs," the leaflet goes on to explain.

The request made by the Medford Public Library, that notebooks and textbooks—all books not belonging to the library's collection—be placed on checking shelves at the door as a reader enters, is made with the same purpose and in the same spirit as this plea of the Portland Library association.

Our situation differs in that we cannot employ enough staff so that there will always be someone waiting at the desk to check your books. We wish to spend our time and effort, not in guarding exits, but in assisting you. We want to spend our book funds, not in replacing stolen volumes, but in building up a better collection of new books for you.

COURT RULING FUTILE

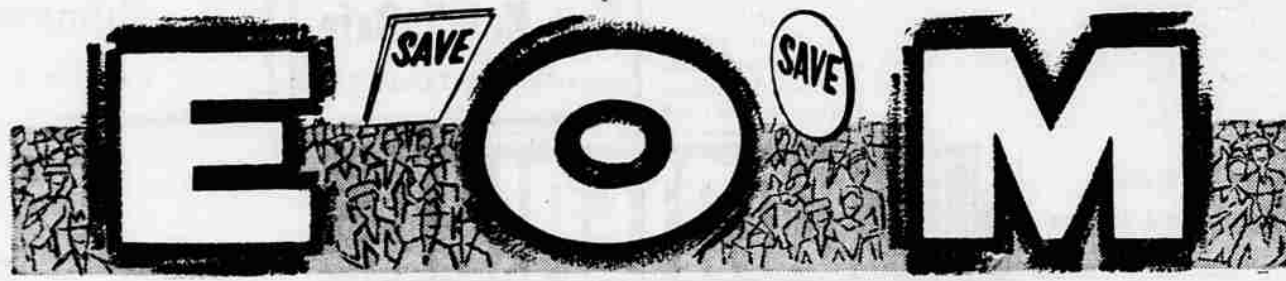
Mrs. Gay Hyacinth Pestka, 2407 Buckshot rd., Medford, was cited for permitting an unauthorized person to operate a motor vehicle in connection with the accident.

According to police, the Johnson boy and his passenger, Donald Ralph Pestka, 14, rode out of a driveway at the Pestka residence and into the path of the pick-up truck, which was operated by Mrs. Bernice Garrett, 33, Foothills rd., Medford.

The Johnson boy reportedly suffered a broken foot in the accident and was taken to a local doctor's office by a neighbor. There were no other injuries.

The scooter was reported extensively damaged and the pick-up truck received minor damage. The accident occurred at 2 p.m.
