### Extension Specialist Advises Parents on Proper Food Habits

Fargo, N.D. — "Don't resort to pleading, bribery or strong arm tactics to force a child to eat," says Ruth Dawson, extension nutritionist, North Dakota Agricultural college.

"Good food offered in a friendly, matter of fact way without urging, helps children develop good eating habits early in life," Miss Dawson said.

By the time boys and girls are 10 years old, their protein needs equal those of a grown man, she said. "That's why it is vitally important your children develop good eating habits

Lou Cranston, membership chairman, said that if this program is to be expanded under the leadership of these young people it is necessary that all present Y members participate in the programs and many new ones will be needed.

"During the membership drive interested citizens are urged to take out a basic membership for themselves and for some young friend," Cranston said. He added that the basic membership fee is \$2.

"The social programs that build character and moral fiber have long been desired by many local parents and citizens," Cranston stressed.

The board of directors said that if activities other than those to be offered in the program are desired by some of the youth they will be available for a small fee charged for the various activities and instruction.

During the past year between 250 and 350 teenagers enrolled in the social dancing, weightlifting, basketball, volleyball, boxing, swimming, wrestling, trampoline, square dancing and badminton classes.
