Surface Rights on Mining Claims to Be Determined

The Medford district of the bureau of land management will publish a formal public notice on the determination of surface rights on mining claims in the Elliott creek area, located in the Applegate river watershed in northern California.

Publication of the notice, which was requested by the forest service, will appear in local newspapers for nine consecutive weeks.

Owner of a mining claim located prior to July 23, 1955, will have 150 days after the first publication to assert surface rights.

If a claimant ignores the notice, rights to the surface are waived, although original mining rights are maintained, according to forest service officials. The claimant will have his claim examined by mineral examiners asserting surface rights.

If the claimants rights are considered valid, the forest service will recognize such rights and not attempt to control the surface resources under the new multiple-use mining law of July 23, 1955.

Claims of questionable validity will be considered before a hearing officer of the bureau of land management who will make the final decision.

Both the claimant and the forest service will present their testimony at the hearing. Whatever the decision, the claimant will retain mineral rights, forest service officials said. If the decision is in the claimant's favor, he also retains all surface rights.

Copies of the new law are available for inspection at the forest supervisor's office, Medford.

New Plywood Plant Slated at Roseburg

Roseburg — A new plywood plant will bolster Roseburg economy within a year's time. U.S. Plywood Corp. announced it would build the new plant to employ about 250 men and turn out 150,000 board feet of plywood in an eight hour shift. Manager George French said surveys had already been started.

Father, Son Taken; To Start Sentences

Grants Pass — William Clarence Schleigh, 54, and his 28-year-old son William Lester, both of Wolf Creek, were taken to the state penitentiary Thursday to begin sentences for setting fire on forest land.

They were arrested on Sept. 6, 1944, near the scene of a series of fires which they were charged with starting along Coyote Creek rd., near Wolf Creek. They were convicted by a circuit jury in November, 1955, and each sentenced to an 18-month prison term.

The two men had been free on bail pending outcome of their appeal to the state supreme court. The supreme court upheld the convictions in April.

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
