

DROTT WHIFFS 15 BATTERS AS CUBS SUBDUE BRAVES; REDLEGS, DODGERS WIN

Rookie Dick Drott is making good for the Chicago Cubs but he couldn't be a bigger hero in his native Cincinnati today if he had just discovered a magic cure-all for Ted Kluszewski's ailing back.

The 20-year-old Drott struck out a season single-game high of 15 batters Sunday to beat the Milwaukee Braves, 7-5, and the Cubs made it a clean sweep when Ernie Banks' ninth-inning single produced a 5-4 victory in the nightcap. Drott's performance came within two of Dizzy Dean's National league strike-out mark and within three of Bob Feller's major league record.

The two defeats were a bitter blow to the Braves, who dropped into third place as the front running Redlegs downed the St. Louis Cardinals, 7-6 on pitcher Hal Jeffcoat's eighth-inning homer and Clem Labine's close-out relief pitching enabled the Brooklyn Dodgers to beat the New York Giants, 5-3, and take over second. The Philadelphia Phillies bounced back from a 13-5 loss to whip the Pittsburgh Pirates, 6-3, in the other National league games.

Retain First Place

The Chicago White Sox retained their three-game grip on first place in the American league when they split with the Cleveland Indians while the New York Yankees and Washington Senators outdistanced Bud Daley for a 1-0 White Sox victory before relief ace Ray Narleski stopped Chicago 4-3, and the Yankees downed the Senators, 7-6, after suffering a 9-7 setback.

The Boston Red Sox swept the Baltimore Orioles, 9-0 and 5-4 and the Kansas City Athletics beat the Detroit Tigers, 3-1 in the other American league activity.

Drott, a slim fireballer, fanned Hank Aaron and Bill Bruton three times each and walked only one batter in his brilliant performance. The Cubs won the nightcap with a two-run ninth-inning rally capped by Banks' single to give them four wins in seven games with the

Jeffcoat's homer broke a 6-6 tie produced when Stan Musial hit his second homer of the game and the eighth grand slam of his career for the Cardinals.

26 Yankees In British Am Tourney

Formby, England.—The British Amateur golf championship, a six-day grand in which the weather always provides the stiffest competition, began today on Formby's 6,803-yard course with 26 Yanks in the field of 187.

Dale Morey of Indianapolis, Ind.; Gene Andrews of Pacific Palisades, Calif.; Richard Ross Jr., of San Francisco; Jim McHale of Philadelphia and Frank Strafaci of Garden City, N.Y., and Miami Beach, Fla., head the weakest U.S. threat in recent years.

But past United States showings in the tournament have been so strong that Morey is favored with Joe Carr of Ireland and South Africa's Arthur Walker at 5-1. Yanks have won six of 11 renewals since World War II and last year was the first time a U.S. player failed to reach the finals during the stretch.

Morey, a 36-year-old former golf and basketball professional, and Ross will play Arthur Sinclair of England Tuesday in the second round.

Britain's legalized bookmakers don't believe John Beharrell, 19, of England, can become the fourth player to win the championship twice in a row. Beharrell, then 18, became the youngest player over to win the title when he scored a 5 and 4 victory over Scotland's Leslie Taylor in the 1956 final.

National Loop Shift Proposal on Agenda

New York.—A three-club shift which would send the Brooklyn Dodgers to Los Angeles, the New York Giants to San Francisco and transfer the Cincinnati Redlegs to New York will be proposed at Tuesday's National league meeting in Chicago, it was learned today.

Contracts covering such matters as television and broadcasting rights for the three clubs in their new sites already have been drawn up and approved.

It also was understood that proof will be submitted at the meeting guaranteeing the type of new parks which the Dodgers and Giants desire in Los Angeles and San Francisco.

The shifts, if approved by the National league, would become effective for the 1958 season.

An authoritative base ball source told the United Press that he had seen all the papers which already have been drawn up and approved by the three clubs.

Unanimous Vote

It would take a unanimous vote by the eight National league club owners to bring about the shifts.

When National league President Warren Giles last week called for Tuesday's meeting, he refused to discuss the agenda for the session. He merely said the meeting was being held in Chicago Tuesday rather than before the annual major league all-star game at St. Louis July 9.

Mile Taken By Ibbotson

Modesto, Calif.—The touring foreign mile stars move on to Stockton, Calif., this week end for the regional AAU meet—with the prospect that brains may prove more important than brawn in the battles for victory.

With such great sub-four minute milers as Merv Lincoln of Australia and Brian Hewson and Derek Ibbotson of England on hand to overshadow the best that the United States has to offer, the races have boiled down to an all-foreign competition.

Pacing and Outwitting

But off their performances in the California Relays here Saturday night, the little matter of pacing and outwitting the foe appears to be the important item—not the four-minute mile.

The event here was won by Ibbotson—with a last 100-yard sprint that edged Lincoln in the very ordinary time of 4:06.4.

"I guess you might say that Ibbotson outfoxed me," said Lincoln after the slow performance. "We both stayed back and let the Americans set the pace during the first three-quarters."

"But I couldn't wait and went to the front to start the final lap. But even while running it in about 55 seconds, I couldn't stand off the better man in the last yards."

Oregon Eyes PCC Tussles

Eugene.—Oregon's Ducks prepared today for the PCC playoff series against California at Berkeley opening Thursday after downing Oregon State 4-1 in their final Northern division baseball game at Corvallis Saturday.

Right-hander Stan Dmochowsky outdueled OSC's Syl Johnson before 2000 fans.

The victory gave Oregon an 11-3 conference record while Oregon State was second with 8-7.

Entries in Yacht Race Total 31

Los Angeles.—Thirty-one racing yachts from the United States, England and Honolulu have entered the July 4 trans-Pacific yacht race from Los Angeles harbor to Honolulu.

Frank H. Person, chairman of the race committee, said Sunday the entries in the 2,225-mile classic includes some of the fastest yachts in the world.

England will be represented by the Kochab, a 40-foot yawl due here from the South Pacific sometime next month. The Esprit, a 40-foot cutter, will represent Honolulu.

Score Discharge Slated Tuesday

Cleveland.—Cleveland Indians' pitcher Herb Score will be discharged from Lakeside Hospital Tuesday but will have several more weeks of recuperation from a severe eye injury, Dr. Charles I. Thomas said today.

Score was hospitalized May 7 after he was hit on the right eye by a line drive.

"Herb's vision is clearing gradually and I'm sure he'll be all right," the eye specialist said.

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
