

Jockey Runs TV Looft To \$106,000

New York — Billy Pearson, jockey and art authority from Pasadena, Calif., Sunday night boosted his television quiz show winnings to \$106,000.

Appearing on CBS' "The \$64,000 Challenge," Pearson defeated noted lecturer and art dealer Charles J. Duveen and tied Larry Rivers, a 33-year-old artist from Southampton, N.Y.

After topping Duveen on a "17th and 18th century" art question worth \$4,000, Pearson tied Rivers at \$8,000 in the "modern art" category. They will return next week to try to answer the \$16,000 question.

To date, Pearson has won the top prize on "The \$64,000 Question," split the same amount with actor Vincent Price on "The \$64,000 Challenge," and won \$6,000 against two challengers on the latter show, in addition to Sunday night's winnings.

"Even my fan mail is different, more adult," the more grown-up Piper smiled. "And my friends? I'd be stupid if I said they knew I could do it all along — maybe I knew I could do worthwhile parts, but nobody else did."

Pacific Storm No Immediate Threat

The weather bureau said today that the next Pacific storm was some 1800 miles off the coast and did not pose an immediate threat to good weather prevailing over most of Oregon.

Rising afternoon temperatures through Tuesday are forecast with possible thundershowers in southern portions of the state.

Medford had the state's high temperature Sunday with 82, only rainfall in the state reported during the 24-hour period ending early today was .02 of an inch at Astoria.

The Willamette and Columbia rivers in the Portland area dropped slightly again. The Columbia was down 1.1 feet from its high of last week but remained about seven feet over the flood stage. It may rise slightly again after the next day or two and remain over flood stage for the next several days to two weeks.

Juan Peron Escapes Assassination Plot

Caracas, Venezuela — Former Argentine Dictator Juan D. Peron escaped an assassination plot Saturday when two bombs exploded in his automobile. He was not in the car at the time.

Peron's aide and chauffeur, Isaac Gilaberti, had parked the car and left it in downtown Caracas just four blocks from security police headquarters when the bombs went off.

Police said the two bombs had been tied with wire, one to the engine and the other to the car's trunk. They added the explosives probably were put in place last night.

The car was heavily damaged. The attempt to kill Peron was the first made against his life since he fled Argentina in September, 1955, following the overthrow of his regime.
