Good Time for Outdoor Barbecue

Memorial Day or the following week-end seems like a good time to inaugurate this year's outdoor barbecuing. Weather permitting, of course. Otherwise it is just as easy to use your oven broiler, but true, it isn't nearly as festive nor as much fun.

When shopping at your local market for your barbecue supplies, remember to pick up a supply of those indispensable, disposable paper napkins, plates and cups for convenient outdoor use. A supply of metal foil is also a good idea.

Molasses Barbecued Spareribs

Take Ready to Out-of-Doors

Spareribs are an easily prepared fun food. Children particularly love them because they can pick them up in their fingers and gnaw to their heart's content. Perfect outdoor food for barbecuing on the spot or baking in a moderate oven and taking to the picnic site. Actually, we recommend that the cooking be started at home then completed over the grill so the aroma of the meat can waft its charcoal invitation.

4 tablespoons unsulphured molasses

2 tablespoons vinegar or lemon juice

4 tablespoons prepared mustard

2 tablespoons Worcestershire sauce

1/4 teaspoon tabasco

1/2 teaspoon onion bouquet

For Indoor Baking

Have spareribs cut in serving-size pieces. Place in shallow pan. Combine remaining ingredients. Brush spareribs. Bake in moderate oven.

Mussels, Uncleaned Clams Said Unsafe

Portland—A warning not to eat marine mussels or uncleaned clams taken from Oregon coastal waters this spring and summer has been issued here by Dr. Harold M. Erickson, state health officer.

The warning explained that it is unsafe to eat "any portion" of the mussels this time of the year because they may contain a strong alkaloid poison similar to strychnine.

"Reputable commercial packers are aware of the danger and do not permit any of the harmful seafood to enter the open market," Erickson said.

The doctor emphasized that the black portions should be destroyed completely and should never be fed to animals or domestic fowl, which are also susceptible to the poison.

Pleven Has Trouble Organizing Cabinet

Paris—Leading French political parties refused Saturday to make concessions that would permit ex-Premier Rene Pleven to set up a new cabinet. Sources close to Pleven said he had made little progress in his efforts to bridge differences among the nation's 14 bickering political groups.

Pleven was given a "mission of information" by President Rene Coty Friday. His task was to sound out political leaders on the chances of forming a new government to replace that of Premier Guy Mollet, which fell or a lost vote of confidence over taxes last Tuesday.

But despite long discussions with a variety of political leaders, informants said Pleven found them still wide apart in their views.

Juvenile Judge Demands Respect By Young Offenders

Chardon, Ohio — Juvenile Court Judge Robert B. Ford won't have any "bums" in his courtroom. Youths who appear before him must toe the mark so far as personal appearance is concerned.

"Slovenly clothes, a slouchy posture and an arrogant manner denote to me a sloppy, stupid mind and a disrespect for the law," said Ford.

For boys, the judge bans Levi-type pants, black leather jackets studded with metal buttons and emblems, engineers' boots, peg pants or "any adolescent variations of said items."

He prohibits girls from appearing in court wearing jeans, low necklines or revealing blouses.

He's also particular about haircuts. New Yorker Pachuco, Balboa, duck-cut and Elvis Presley styles are out.

Parents Warned

Judge Ford's pet peeves are spelled out in mimeographed forms which are handed to teenage offenders and their parents before their day in court.

If the rules for dress are ignored, the case is continued and parents are warned they may be held in contempt if it happens again.

"I consider a court hearing something out of the ordinary for a youngster," the judge said. "Therefore, when they appear before me, I insist they come in clothes other than those they wear to grease the jalopy, clean the barn or go on a picnic."

Ford, a balding 35, worked out the rules with his chief probation officer, G. Gordon Hann.

"The policy has had a salutary effect and has served to straighten out some parents," Hann said. "Youngsters who appear here looking like bums usually have 'zeros' for parents."
