

Anti-American Riots in Taipeh Believed Politically Inspired

Taipeh, Formosa.—United States officials said today the anti-American riots in Taipeh were "definitely organized," possibly by political forces anxious to make a deal with the Chinese Communists.

Communists throughout Asia seized on the riots in an all out effort to discredit American activities in the Far East. A threat of new anti-American riots in Manila caused the U.S. Embassy there today to order precautions. The Americans said they believed no top government officials had any part in the widespread destruction last Friday but they did blame inaction by the government on the completeness of the destruction.

Code Room Attacked
American officials pinned some of their suspicion on the deliberate attack on the embassy code room, an attack which compromised some of the codes used by the embassy.

The demonstrators entered the embassy armed with heavy tools and set to work on a heavy iron door guarding the code room. When they failed to make a dent they began digging through the six-inch concrete wall.

Ordinary demonstrators inflamed by some momentary anger probably would have passed on to some easier target, American officials said.

U. S. Ambassador Karl Rankin said the code room destruction meant some "readjustment" of American codes. He would not elaborate.

Internal Political Reasons
The American sources said Chinese elements in Taipeh might have had internal political reasons for ordering the attack which wrecked the interior of the embassy and other American buildings here.

Meanwhile, Foreign Minister George Yeh denied that any "government agency or political organization" had directed or instigated last week's anti-American riots.

He told a news conference the riots were "not an expression of general anti-American feeling" of the Chinese people and said the government was not considering withdrawal of the diplomatic immunity now granted U.S. military personnel here.

No Intentional Delay
Yeh also denied any "intentional delay" in sending policemen to protect the U.S. Embassy which was wrecked by rioters and said the police force in Taipeh was small and that all reserves were dispatched to the scene as quickly as possible. News dispatches at the time said police took no action when the rioters were destroying the American property.

U.S. military activities were returning to normal, and Americans circulated through the streets of Taipeh without incident. The city was still under a strict curfew and the Chinese army posted armored halftracks at strategic places in the city.

Non-Agricultural Employment Less Than Year Ago

Salem.—Non-agricultural employment in Oregon was estimated at 478,000 in mid-April compared with 467,000 a month before and 480,000 a year ago, the State Unemployment Compensation Commission has reported.

The commission said seasonal operations were picking up but had so far failed to recover the ground lost early this spring.

Unemployment claims declined noticeably to about the same level as 1954, but there was still an undue number of construction and lumber workers seeking unemployment benefits.

More than 6,000 loggers and sawmill workers returned to work last month to bring the total in this basic industry to 54,000, still some 7,000 short of last year. Construction firms reported 22,000 jobs last month compared with 20,000 in March and 22,500 a year ago.

Average monthly earnings of Oregon's 110,000 production workers was slightly higher in April than in March at \$87.50, but this was still \$5.48 under a year ago.

Paper Distributing Firm Plans Building

Portland.—Plans were announced today for construction of a new office and warehouse building for the Portland division of Blake, Moffitt & Towne, pioneer Pacific Coast paper distributing firm. The one-story concrete building, providing some 125,000 square feet of space, is scheduled for completion in early 1958. It will be built on a five-acre tract at N.E. 55th ave. and N.E. Hassalo st.

Blind School Schedules Institute for Parents

Salem.—The State Blind School will hold its ninth annual institute for parents June 5-9. The meetings are sponsored by the school and the Oregon Lions Club Auxiliary to acquaint parents with the institution's procedures and facilities.

Scientists Hope To Test Bomb Tuesday

Las Vegas, Nev.—Atomic Energy Commission scientists hoped today that 13 would be their lucky number for the start of the often-delayed spring-summer series of A-tests at the Nevada test site.

The latest attempt to test one of two relatively small nuclear devices, scheduled at 4:55 a.m. (p.d.t) today, was called off for 24 hours Sunday night for the 12th consecutive time because of wind conditions.

Try No. 13 was scheduled for Tuesday morning at the same time.

Coastal Delegation To Witness Signing

Salem.—A delegation of officials from seven Oregon coastal counties will be on hand here Tuesday afternoon when Gov. Robert Holmes is scheduled to sign into law a measure authorizing \$12,600,000 in bonds for highway improvements.

Scheduled for improvement is the 37-mile stretch on the southern Oregon coast between Brookings and Gold Beach.

Don Malarkey, president of the Oregon Coast Association, said Gov. Holmes has been asked to use seven pens in the 2:30 p.m. ceremony.
