Battle Expected For Election of Teamster Leader

Washington — (AP) — A pitched battle for the throne of the giant Teamsters union seemed likely today as James R. (Jimmy) Hoffa seeks the presidency soon to be vacated by Dave Beck.

Beck, under fire on charges of having used teamsters funds to enrich himself and his family, announced Saturday that he would not run for reelection to another five-year term next September.

Hoffa under fire
Teamsters sources said they "would not be surprised" if the dapper Hoffa, ninth vice president of the union in Detroit, decides to try for the top spot.

However, Hoffa is under two federal indictments and can be expected to meet opposition inside the giant labor organization. The United Press learned that Beck met secretly in Seattle Saturday with Hoffa, Einar Mohn, Beck's executive assistant and Teamsters Vice President Frank Brewster before announcing his decision.

Sources close to the union here, however, said they doubted published reports that Beck offered at the Seattle meeting to resign immediately if Mohn were named his successor.

Mohn is under indictment for contempt of Congress for refusing to answer questions before the predecessor committee of the Senate Rackets committee.

Hoffa has been indicted for allegedly attempting to plant an informer on the Senate Rackets committee and is scheduled to go on trial here June 17. He also is under indictment for wiretapping in Detroit.

Another teamsters vice-president, John T. O'Brien, of Chicago, is the only announced candidate so far. He has the support of the teamsters treasurer, John F. English.

Laughs of the Day . . . Court Reverses Convictions of Grunewald, Others

South Bend, Ind. — (AP) — A deputy sheriff stopped a "suspicious" car at a blockade set up after a bank robbery.

"Whatcha got in the trunk?" he asked the two occupants.

"Tents," the driver replied. The deputy saw a bag in the back seat and asked what was in it.

"Stakes."

"Whatcha trying to be — Boy Scouts?" asked the deputy.

The men explained they were Boy Scout executives on their way to a camp with equipment.

Hartford, Conn. — (AP) — A forecaster broadcasting a prediction of showers for the Hartford-Springfield area got carried away and said the forecast was for "Hartford-Sprinkles."

Huron, S.D. — (AP) — John Moore jumped out of bed to close the windows when he thought he heard an early-morning thunder storm. The "thunder" turned out to be only a woodpecker hammering away on Moore's aluminum television antenna.

Hometown, Pa. — (AP) — For many years Hugh Pendexter Jr. was a newspaperman and publicist in Philadelphia. Mrs. Pendexter raised dogs as a hobby. Recently they brought a country store here. Their advertisements read: "Pendexter Country Store—From Poodles to Noodles."

Denver, Tenn. — (AP) — It wasn't her granddaughter Mrs. Johnnie Corbett found rattling around in the child's playpen one night. It was a baby opossum which had come into the

house and started playing with the child's toys.

New Hartford, Conn. — (AP) — Volunteer firemen in the Pine Meadows section were chided when New Hartford volunteers beat them to a fire at the rear of the Pine Meadows fire station. However, the Pine Meadows chief, George Gronden, informed the New Hartford visitors—after they fought the blaze for an hour—that it was an underground dump fire that has burned for 17 years and probably will do so for 17 more.

Tupper Lake, N.Y. — (AP) — Sounding the fire department siren as a 10 p.m. curfew proved too much for residents of this village. Their complaint: the noise woke up the children.

Washington — (AP) — The Supreme Court refused today to shorten the jail sentences of gambler Frank Costello and others who challenged a quirk in the 1939 internal revenue code.

Others whose cases are governed by today's opinion include rubber magnate Poncet Davis, Akron, Ohio; L. B. Binion, Dallas, Tex.; and Thomas W. Banks, Minneapolis gambler.

The 7 to 2 decision came in the case of Sam Achilli, Chicago automobile dealer.

Justice Felix Frankfurter spoke for the majority. Dissenters were Justices William O. Douglas and Hugo L. Black.

The legal point was which of two tax laws should control the sentence of persons convicted under the 1939 code of filing false returns with intent to evade their income tax.

Chicago — (AP) — Dr. Ruth McClintock told the Federation of American Societies for Experimental Biology that hereditary obese rodents were found to use up more energy than thinner mice, even though the fatter mice were less active. The rodent's energy output was measured by use of water made from both heavy hydrogen and heavy oxygen.

Los Angeles — (AP) — Mickey Cohen, talkative little ex-gambler who is never at a loss for something to say, today refused to take back a word he said about Los Angeles city officials on a nationwide television program.

Cohen stood by remarks about Police Chief William H. Parker, former Mayor Fletcher Bowron and the Los Angeles Police Commission even after the American Broadcasting Co. aired a nationwide apology to local city officials Sunday night for remarks made on the Mike Wallace show May 19.

"Any retractions made by persons in regard to the television show I appeared on with Mike Wallace on the ABC network do not go for me," Cohen declared.

Corvallis — (AP) — The Corvallis school board has prepared a new budget for the fiscal year 1957-58 for presentation to voters June 17.

The new budget is \$82,329 less than one defeated May 21. Also being resubmitted is a proposed bond issue which is \$110,000 less than the original.

The new budget totals \$1,945,725 and calls for a new tax levy of \$734,413 outside the six per cent limitation. The bond issue was cut mainly by eliminating a maintenance building. The new figure is \$100,000.

Laughs of the Day . . . Court Reverses Convictions of Grunewald, Others

Washington — (AP) — The Supreme Court today reversed the conviction of Henry (The Dutchman) Grunewald and two others in a \$160,000 tax fix case and ordered a new trial for all three.

Besides Grunewald, Washington influence man and wire-puller, the court's unanimous ruling applied to former Internal Revenue official Daniel A. Bolich and Max Halperin, a New York lawyer.

The action was announced in a 33-page opinion written by Justice John Marshall Harlan.

Reversal of the 1955 conviction of the three men was based on an improper charge to the jury by the trial judge.

Free On Bond
The charges related to a 1948 government investigation of possible tax fraud by Pattullo Modes, Inc., a clothing firm, and the Gotham Beef Co., both of New York.

Grunewald was convicted with the other two of conspiracy to defraud the government. Each drew a five-year jail term but all three have been free on bond.

The trial testimony was that Halperin sought help from Grunewald to get the Pattullo and Gotham prosecutions dropped. Bolich withheld prosecution and Grunewald was paid \$100,000 for the Pattullo cases; \$60,000 for the other.

In addition Halperin was convicted for corruptly attempting to influence Gotham Beef officials in what they would say before a 1952 Brooklyn Grand Jury. He drew an additional two years on these counts and a \$1,000 fine. Under today's opinion he gets a new trial on this charge, too.
