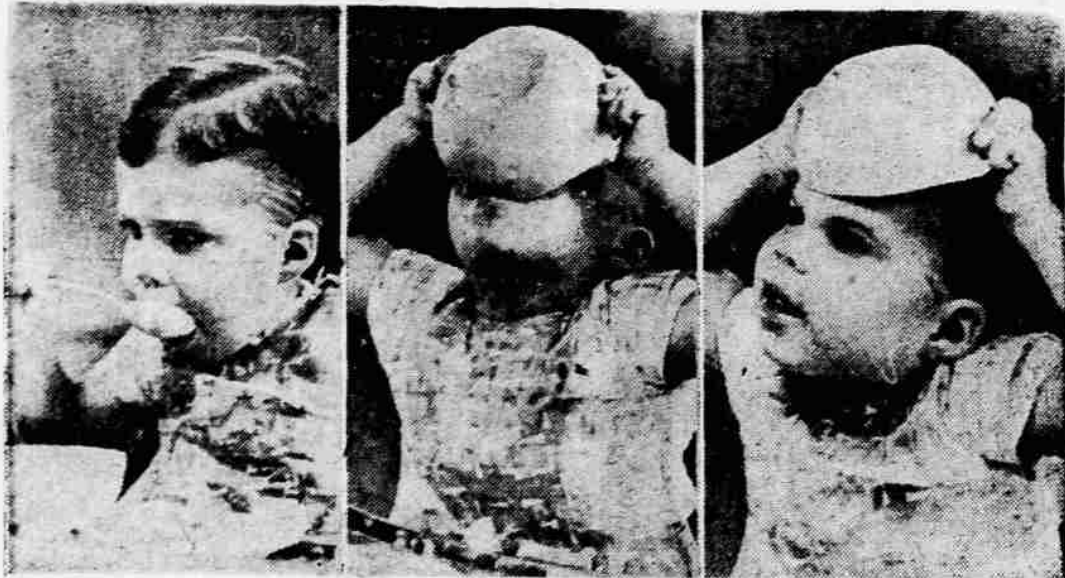

Oregon City Still Seized by Officers

Oregon City — Hundreds of gallons of moonshine whiskey, 16 barrels of mash, and an elaborate stainless steel distillery were seized by Clackamas county sheriff's officers late Monday. The operation was described as one of the most elaborate ever seized in Oregon.

Arrested in the raid were John Everett Lee, 55, Ray Tansill, and Everett W. Kruckman, 57. The "still" was found about 26 miles east of Brightwood by Farrell Blum, a Portland policeman working in the area in his off-duty hours.

Officers said the "still" had been in operation since April. Finished whiskey was stored and distributed in a tavern which Sheriff Joe Shobe did not identify.

Graham Preaches on '10 Commandments,' 529 'Make Decision'

New York — Evangelist Billy Graham preached the first of a series of sermons on "The Ten Commandments" in Madison Square Garden Monday night and 529 persons responded to his magnetic and impassioned plea to "come forward and make a decision for Christ."

From every corner of the huge sports arena in the heart of Manhattan they came forward—from the loges, the balconies and the floor. The weeping, the joyful, the very young and the very old made their way down escalators and crowded aisles to the front of the auditorium.

Graham stood grimly in the pulpit, arms folded, hand on chin, waiting pensively as the "inquirers" filed down the long aisles to take their places in the open space in front of the speaker's platform.

Occasionally, as he has done for the past 13 nights, Graham urged in soft tones that the timid, the nearly-decided "cast off hesitation" and come forward to make "the fateful decision."

His urging did not go unheeded. Still the "inquirers" came forward—little ladies in black, a youth in a wheelchair pushed by his mother, duck-tailed kids in leather jackets and high school girls in frilly summer cottons, all anxious to "accept Jesus Christ."

Total Reaches 8,242
Monday night's 529 conversions brought Graham's New York Crusade total to 8,242 in the first two weeks of the revival. Nearly 225,000 have heard the 38-year-old Baptist minister's sermons so far.

The decision-makers were joined by members of Graham's staff of 500 volunteer counselors, who led them to a conference room in the basement of the Garden to "give them guidance in reading the Bible and following a Christian life."

Cemetery No Place To Deliver Mail

Dead Letter Office Union, N.J. — Mail carrier Albert Mueller is in trouble with postal officials because he turned a cemetery into a dead letter office.

Postal inspectors investigating complaints that residents failed to receive expected letters found quantities of mail in Hollywood Cemetery.

Authorities said Mueller confessed dumping the mail but "only on days when it was too heavy."

Johannesburg, South Africa — Seven mine workers plunged to their deaths down a gold mine shaft Monday when a platform tipped over, it was announced today.

10 Plywood Firms Indicted by Jury

Detroit — Georgia Pacific Corporation, Portland, Ore., and nine other wholesale plywood companies were indicted Monday by a federal Grand Jury charging price fixing in violation of the Sherman anti-trust law.

The indictment said the firms sold about 13 million dollars worth of Douglas fir plywood for building in Southeastern Michigan in 1954.

Named as defendants were United States Plywood Corp., New York; Roddis Plywood of Michigan, Inc., Dearborn; Georgia-Pacific Corp.; Kochton Plywood Co., Detroit; Ken Lester Plywoods Co., Detroit; Henry Fahlgquist Sales Co., Birmingham, Mich.; Patterson-Buck Plywood Co., Dearborn; Robert J. Linneburg, Detroit; of U. S. Plywood; William B. Gilbert, Detroit; of Midwest; Edward M. Magarian, New York, formerly with Roddis here; Ken Lester, Ashburg Park, Mich.; Henry M. Dahlquist, Birmingham; John Bugg, Detroit; of Kochton; and Robert T. Giffin, Detroit, of Georgia-Pacific.

The indictment charged that fixed prices and quantity discount rates from 1949 to 1954 practically eliminated price competition.

Free Drinks For Legislators Told

Raleigh, N. C. — The Raleigh News and Observer said today that it had uncovered a service distributing free liquor to legislators at a downtown hotel.

The newspaper's first edition, complete with pictures of the liquor being delivered to the Sir Walter Hotel, hit the streets just as the Monday night legislative session ended.

There were angry mutterings from legislators as they gathered in the Capitol corridors and hotel lobbies to read the story. None would comment for publication but one said "That's going a little too far. Everybody is entitled to a toddy now and then."

Many of the legislators expressed interest in the list of names of the 33 persons the paper said had shared in the liquor distribution. The News and Observer said, however, it was withholding the names pending a check to determine whether the legislators actually were living in the rooms registered in their names.

Liquor is sold legally only in state stores in North Carolina and possession by an individual of more than one gallon is prima facie evidence of possession for the purpose of sale.

President To Spend Week End at White House

Washington — Press Secretary James C. Hagerty said today that President Eisenhower will spend Memorial Day week end at the White House instead of going to his farm at Gettysburg, Pa.

The chief executive originally was expected to spend Thursday through Sunday at Gettysburg but decided instead to remain here.

Rhinoceros Milked At Frankfurt Zoo

Frankfurt, Germany — Zoo officials said today that for the first time in history a rhinoceros held still long enough to be milked.

The huge animals generally are short-tempered, but the Frankfurt zoo had an advantage. A rhino named Catherine the Great apparently was grateful to the veterinarians who helped her through a serious illness. She became virtually tame and had no objections to being milked. The milk had a butterfat content of .27 per cent compared with 3 or 4 per cent for cow's milk.

Court Martial of Marine To Resume

Camp Pendleton, Calif. — The court martial of Marine Private Peter H. Green, 18, on charges of failing to draw his rifle from a supply sergeant last March 18 was scheduled to resume today.

Trial of the young Evansville, Ind., serviceman was continued last week after Defense Attorney William Daubney moved for a mistrial on grounds that a member of the court had discussed the case in public.

Green reportedly refused an order to draw his rifle because he is a conscientious objector.

Vancouver Starting Salk Vaccine Program

Vancouver, Wash. — Polio prevention in the Vancouver area was started in a new vein last night.

Members of the Clark County Medical society started administering the serum without charge to persons between the ages of 20 and 40.

With 90 per cent of the population of Clark county under 20 years old already inoculated, enough Salk polio vaccine is available for 9000 adults.

Policemen Interfere With Four-Minute Mile

Madison, Wis. — Bernard Crompton, 41, was hauled into court on a drunkenness charge Monday when police caught him running around Capital Square in his shorts.

Crompton told the judge he "was trying to run a four-minute mile" but didn't make it because he kept "getting stopped by policemen." He forfeited \$10 bail.

Indictment of Crosby Set Aside by Judge

Portland — An indictment charging Teamster leader Clyde Crosby with false swearing was set aside Monday by Circuit Judge Charles W. Redding. The judge said all the witnesses against Crosby were not named in the indictment. He directed Attorney General Robert Y. Thornton to resubmit the case.

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
