cal people can learn more about their plans. He said, "There have been many rumors but nothing concrete. I want time to think it out."

Two Other Stores — Planning Commissioner Don Root asked Goldy how much of the 28 acres of Phipps property Sears Roebuck planned to use for themselves. Goldy said he had not been specifically informed, but suggested Safeway and W. T. Grant general merchandise store might join Sears Roebuck there. Goldy, a local realtor, emphasized that he is not involved in a real estate sale with the company but is "trying to keep a group of businesses in the city of Medford as close to the downtown area as possible."

Paul Selby, member of the commission, said Sears would offset one or two classrooms a year in the city's tax structure. He noted vast increases in the city's population, but said the business area has not expanded correspondingly. Commissioner Hugh Coleman voiced agreement with Selby and stated, "We haven't taken care of our customers and haven't provided adequate parking because we're too crowded." Both indicated that businesses would eventually be built in other than downtown areas whether or not Sears Roebuck company is allowed to build in their chosen site now. **Questions Asked** — Several questions were asked as to the type of store the company would build and the general plan for development of the area. Goldy said, "Sears doesn't generally put in peanut stands. They have always built first class stores in keeping with the community. Whether they build a \$100,000 store or a \$750,000 store, I want them in the city."

In recommending that the area be rezoned, the commission pointed out that the city council would also have to hold a hearing on the matter. They indicated enough time would elapse before the council hearing to give others in the area a chance to learn more about the company's plans. Goldy said he would try to obtain a plan from the company for presentation to the city council.

Relatively Rare Type Disease Reported

One case of Iceland disease, was reported this week by the Jackson county health department and a second case was unofficially reported to have been diagnosed.

The local victim of the obscure and relatively communicable illness was said to be a young woman. Further details were unavailable.

Continuation of the high measles rate also was reported, with Medford showing 56 cases; Gold Hill, 19; Ashland, 18; Phoenix and Central Point, 4; Shady Cove 2; and Trail, 1.

Identified Recently
Icelandic disease was identified only in recent years. It was named after an outbreak in Akureyri, Iceland, in 1948-49, although it had been detected earlier, in 1934, in Los Angeles.

Its cause is still unknown, and no virus has yet been associated definitely with it. Scientifically it has been labeled epidemic neuromyasthenia, because it involves weakness of the muscles caused by nerve involvement.

Rarely Fatal
Rarely, if ever fatal, it can be temporarily disabling and uncomfortable. There is little

scientific literature on the subject, but symptoms have been described as a tired feeling, increasingly severe headaches, pains in the neck and elsewhere in the body, numbness, shakiness and temporary loss of memory and manual skills. Later it involves dizziness, nausea and vomiting, and some cases have suffered nightmares, a pounding pulse, difficulty swallowing and depression.

It can last for a period of several months, but usually affects only those over 12 years of age and under 60, with hospital personnel particularly susceptible.

The most recent severe outbreak in the U. S. was in Punta Gorda, Fla., a year ago, where it reached epidemic proportions, although some dozens of cases have been reported from Alaska to Australia.

Also in the health department's weekly communicable diseases report were four influenza cases, one amoebic dysentery, one tuberculosis and two German measles in Medford; two trench mouth in Medford and one in Gold Hill; three chicken pox in Ashland, two in Medford and one each in Eagle Point and Jacksonville.

New Fee Schedules Reported for Records

New fee schedules for certified copies of birth, death, marriage and divorce records have been announced by state registrar, Deane Huxtable.

An amendment by the 1957 legislature of ORS 432.145 increases fees for a full certified copy of a vital statistics record from \$1 to \$2. The fee for an abbreviated birth certificate is \$1.

Full certified copies are generally necessary to establish parentage and for obtaining passports, social security, inheritance and other purposes. New application forms may be obtained from county health department or the state board of health.

First Cherry Fruit Fly Spraying Due

The first spray for control of the cherry fruit fly should be completed by June 1, according to C. B. Cordy, county extension agent in charge of horticulture.

Orchardists should apply three pounds of methoxychlor in 100 gallons of water in a thorough spraying of all cherry trees, he said, including sweet, sour and seedling trees.

Small sprayers would be ineffective on large trees, according to Cordy, but on small trees may be used with two heaping tablespoons of methoxychlor in three gallons of water.

For aphid control, malathion should be added at a rate of two pounds per 100 gallons or two two tablespoons in three gallons.
