

Billy Loes keeps Up Comeback Stride in Verdict Over Sox

Centric Bill Loes, the Baltimore right hander turned loose ball pitcher, was rapidly moving toward the title of "comeback pitcher of the year."

American league batters point out Loes has the good fast ball back again and if added control is needed, there's his glistering 3.57 earned run average and the fact he already has pitched five victories.

Only last Tuesday, manager Paul Richards, understandably disgusted with a series of Orioles losses, labeled most of his players as a "bunch of clowns," but it's obvious he wasn't including the 27-year-old Loes.

Loes, who came to the Orioles from the Dodgers on waivers in May of last year, beat the Red Sox, 3-1, with a six-hit effort Wednesday. With one out in the ninth inning, however, he was ejected from the game by umpire Bill Summers for protesting a called ball too vigorously. George Zuverink retired the last two batters, Dick Williams, another ex-Dodger, drove in two of the Orioles' runs off loser George Sussie Jr., while George Kell knocked in the other.

Sox Lose To Tribe

The Cleveland Indians defeated the first-place Chicago White Sox, 8-4, in 10 innings, while Detroit beat Kansas City, 4-3, and the Washington Senators beat the New York Yankees, 6-2.

Brooklyn closed in to within a game and a half of the National League lead with a 1-0 victory over Pittsburgh; Milwaukee defeated the Chicago Cubs, 6-2, and the Phillies had to go 10 innings to beat the Giants, 7-5. Cincinnati and St. Louis were idle.

Vic Wertz tied the game for the Indians with a two-run homer and the Tribe then scored four runs in the 10th, with Hal Naragon's triple driving in the tie-breaking run. Dixie Howell, who relieved starter Jack Harshman, was the loser while reliever Cal McLox was the winner. The White Sox now lead the Indians and Yankees by two games.

Bunning Five-hits A's

J. W. Porter's pinch double scored Harvey Kuenn from first base in the ninth inning with the winning run in Detroit's triumph.

Jim Bunning went the distance for the Tigers, giving up only five hits, including homers by Hal Smith and Bob Cerv. Reliever Rip Coleman suffered his fifth consecutive loss.

Pedro Ramos of Washington got a two-run jump on the Yankees when Roy Sievers hit his 10th homer with one on in the first inning and the Senators routed Tom Sturdivant with a four-run burst in the seventh. Ramos, credited with his fourth victory and first ever over the Yankees, held them scoreless until the eighth when Hank Bauer homered. Mickey Mantle clouted his 10th homer in the ninth.

Left-hander Johnny Podres never permitted a Pirate runner to advance as far as second base.

Major League Clubs Face Threat of Damage Suits If They Move To LA, SF

Seattle—The Brooklyn Dodgers and New York Giants will face damage suits totaling at least \$4,700,000 before they can move into Pacific Coast league territory, a spokesman for the Seattle Rainiers said.

Dewey Soriano, general manager of the Seattle PCL club, said at least two PCL outfits, Seattle and Sacramento, would take the National league clubs to court if the move is attempted.

Seattle will sue for three million dollars while Sacramento probably will ask for \$7,700,000, Soriano said.

"This will be a fight to the finish," he added.

National league directors Tuesday authorized the Dodgers to move to Los Angeles and the Giants to San Francisco.

"Invasion"

Soriano said that San Diego, Portland, Hollywood and Vancouver probably would join Seattle and Sacramento in fighting the "invasion." The Rainiers and the only clubs on the coast which own their own parks.

Emil Sick, president of the Seattle club, was out of the city, but he said previously the Rainiers would demand reimbursement for any loss of revenue caused by the invasion of major league teams into the PCL area.

Soriano was bitter in his criticism of the National league owners. "At least they could have waited until the current season ended."

Portland—Joe Ziegler, general manager of the Portland Beavers of the Pacific Coast league, said he had just two questions to ask about any moves of the New York Giants and the Brooklyn Dodgers to the West Coast.

"Are they going to come? Can they afford to?"

Ziegler was asked to comment upon permission given the two National League teams to move to San Francisco and Los Angeles in 1958 if they wish.

"As I understand it," Ziegler said, "all that has transpired is that the two clubs were granted the right to move if and when they want to."

He declined to discuss further just how much it would cost the Giants and Dodgers to move into the West Coast. But he indicated that if they did the Portland club would seek indemnity in court including the \$300,000 spent in remodeling Multnomah stadium should such a move doom the PCL.

PERKINS, McLAUGHLIN PACE MH BASEBALLERS

Larry Perkins was the top hitter and Dick McLaughlin was the No. 1 pitcher and compiled the best defensive average for the Medford high baseball club during the 1957 season.

Perkins hit at a .333 clip for the season and Dennis Kink was the club's other .300 hitter with .318. Gordon Owsley followed with .290.

McLaughlin had a 5-2 win-loss record pitching and had a fielding average of .977 as a pitcher and catcher. His earned run average was 2.00. Dennis Barr with fewer innings pitched compiled a 1.75 ERA. After McLaughlin in fielding were Bob Pond, catcher and outfielder, with .958. Dennis King, first baseman with .956 and Perkins, second baseman, with .924 among those who played the most.

Medford hit .234 as a team and fielded with a .921 average. King headed Coach John Kovens' club with 15 runs batted in and he and McLaughlin led in doubles with four each. King had four triples and Owsley, Barr and King each knocked a home run.

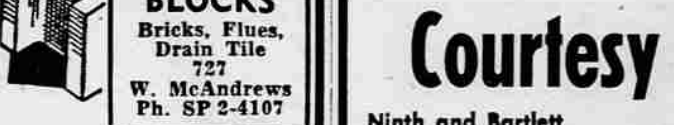
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Yanks Map Rental Plan For Redlegs

New York—The New York Yankees, world champions at finance as well as baseball, already have a \$600,000 rental plan mapped out for the incoming Cincinnati Redlegs once the Brooklyn Dodgers and New York Giants pull out for the West Coast.

Latest developments in the franchise shift situation all pointed to the growing possibility that the Dodgers will play their 1958 home games at mammoth Memorial coliseum in Los Angeles, the Giants will play theirs at Seals stadium in San Francisco and the Redlegs will share Yankee stadium with the Yankees.

President Dan Topping of the Yankees already is on record as saying "we would not be adverse to a co-tenant, so long as the incoming club would not encroach on the Yankees' attendance. Such a club, however, would have to meet several terms, Topping added.

"Those terms," one baseball official said, "will make the Redlegs think there's no paying off the mortgage on the House that Ruth built."

The Yankees are now paying an annual rental fee of approximately \$600,000 for Yankee stadium. They pay another \$250,000 for maintenance of the ball park plus about \$150,000 in taxes. That makes a total of a million dollars, a portion of which they got back by allowing the New York football Giants to use the stadium during the fall.

"When the Redlegs come into Yankee stadium they will have to sign a long-term lease," the same official told the United Press. "The Yankees have this thing all worked out and it will cost Cincinnati at least \$600,000 to move in with them. In addition, the Yankees will insist on dictating television and radio policy."

Topping verified at least part of that overall plan when he commented recently that any incoming club "would have to match the thinking of the Yankees on such subject as radio and television policy, number of night games and the operation of the stadium club."

The Redlegs, however, must wait until both the Dodgers and Giants move out, leaving New York open for a National league franchise.

In Cincinnati, President Powell Crosley Jr. of the Redlegs said he has no intention of "moving the ball club at this time" but admitted he may be "tempted under other circumstances."

Ump Group In Process Of Forming

A Southern Oregon Umpires association is being formed and a charter has arrived from the National Baseball Congress of America, according to Erie L. Kline, Ashland.

Kline is first president of the umpires' organization and is temporary secretary and treasurer. Virgil Swanson, Medford, is vice-president.

Organization, so far, has proceeded on an informal basis. A meeting of arbiters is contemplated later this summer.

Kline said that the association is to include umpires in seven southern Oregon and three northern California counties. Rogue Valley and a Northern California semi-pro league officials are cooperating, he reported.

To Improve Umpiring

Aim is to improve umpiring in the area thereby improving baseball, the Ashland man indicated. Members of the association would meet NBA qualifications. Prospective umpires would be checked on rules and mechanics of officiating. A school for arbiters may be run.

According to the plan, Southern Oregon association umpires would qualify also for certification as Oregon School Activities association officials.

Oregon counties included are Curry, Josephine, Coos, Douglas, Jackson, Klamath and Lake. The California counties are Siskiyou, Modoc and Shasta.

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Harold Ridgeley Lone Hope of America in British Amateur Golf

Formby, England—Harold Ridgeley, Haverford, Pa., the lone remaining American in the British Amateur Golf championship, reached the tournament semifinals today with a 7 and 5 victory over Leslie McClue of Scotland.

The 43-year-old Air Force master sergeant next plays Arthur Walker of South Africa in Friday's 36-hole semifinals. Walker, winner of the English amateur championship last month, scored a 4 and 3 quarterfinal victory over W. J. Giradet of England.

Reid Jack the Scottish champion, and Allan Bussell of Scotland will meet in the other semifinal. Jack trounced W. A. Slark of England and Bussell beat John Taylor and England, both by 8 and 6 scores.

Formby, England—America's title hopes in the British Amateur golf championship today rested squarely on the shoulders of Harold Ridgeley of Haverford, Pa., a 43-year-old master sergeant in the United States Air Force.

The lone survivor of a 26-man Yankee contingent, Ridgeley was pitted against Leslie McClue of Scotland in the quarter-final round.

The other pairings for today's 36-hole matches were Arthur Walker of South Africa vs. W. J. Giradet of England, Alan Russell of Scotland vs. John Taylor of England, and W. A. Slark of England vs. Scottish champion Reid Jack.

Two Impressive Victories

Ridgeley, who is better known in British golf circles than in his native country, posted two more impressive victories Wednesday to gain the quarterfinals. He ousted Dr. F. W. Vukovich.

Bill Vukovich set the speed record when he won the race in 1954 with an average of 130.84 m.p.h. He was killed in the 1955 race—one of 11 former Indianapolis winners who have died at the steering wheels of their fleet, trim racing cars.

Auto Race Considered Wide Open

Indianapolis—Thirty-three dare devil drivers risked their lives today for a probable \$100,000 in America's most grueling sports event—the 500-mile Indianapolis Speedway race.

This 41st renewal of the Memorial Day automobile classic was considered the most wide-open race in years with only one former champion, Troy Ruttman, in the starting field.

Ruttman, who won the grind back in 1952, was among those favored in today's race. It loomed as a record-breaking field—both in the amount of prize money and average speed. The latter, however, depends on weather and the number of accidents.

Bob Tiffenauer Relief Stopper For Maple Leafs

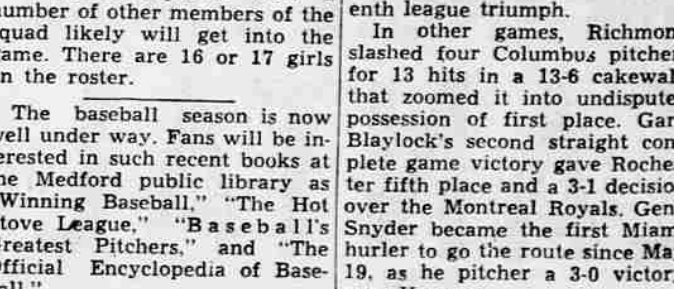

It's almost a baseball axiom that a team in quest of a pennant needs a relief stopper. And the Toronto Maple Leafs, now battling for a second straight International league flag, appear to have the right man in knuck-leballing Bobby Tiffenauer.

The 6-foot, 3-inch, 187-pounder made his 20th appearance of the season for the Leafs Wednesday and stopped the rallying Buffalo Bisons cold in the bottom of the ninth to preserve a 6-3 Toronto victory—the Leafs' first of the season over Buffalo, and Humberto Robinson's seventh league triumph.

In other games, Richmond slashed four Columbus pitchers for 13 hits in a 13-6 cakewalk that zoomed it into undisputed possession of first place. Gary Blaylock's second straight complete game victory gave Rochester fifth place and a 3-1 decision over the Montreal Royals. Gene Snyder became the first Miami hurler to go the route since May 19, as he pitched a 3-0 victory over Havana.

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
