Pads Continue Firing Blanks; Beat Angels

The trigger-happy San Diego Padres are shooting their way into the Pacific Coast league's first division by firing blanks at the opposition.

The Pads, pre-season fling choice but an early flop, climbed back up to the 500 percentage mark Wednesday night by blanking Los Angeles 3-0.

It was the third straight shut-out for San Diego pitchers, who have not been scored on for 33 innings. It was also the second straight 3-0 shutout of the Los Angeles team and left San Diego only one game in arrears of the Angels.

The other games were close also and tightened up the first division. Hollywood edged the league-leading Vancouver 3-2 while San Francisco downed Sacramento 4-3 in 10 innings to stay in second place. Seattle bopped Portland 6-4.

Aguirre Hurls Two-Hitter

Hank Aguirre, en route back to the Cleveland Indians, held the Angels to two singles in notching the shutout. He was helped along by solo home runs from the bats of Earl Averill and Dave Pope.

Spook Jacobs drove in two of the runs Bob Garber needed to beat Vancouver, including the tally that broke a 2-2 tie in the fifth. Ed Erault took the loss.

The Mounties outthrew their third place visitors 10-7.

San Francisco had to struggle to stay in the second slot. A 10th inning single by Albie Pearson with the bases loaded gave the Seals the run that beat Sacramento and moved the Seals to within a game and a half of the top — a half game closer than Hollywood.

Tie Broken, Retied

Frank Keller had broken a 2-2 tie in the sixth with his fourth home run of the season, but the Solon Jim Greengrass retied it with a long homer in the eighth.

John McCall went the route for the win, giving up 11 hits, while Carl Greene, who gave up only seven, was the loser.

Seattle broke out of a 4-4 tie with two unearned runs in the top of the ninth inning against Portland. Losing pitcher Dick Fiedler, fourth Beaver hurler, committed an error and George Freese made another at third.

Judge May Call For IBC Dissolution

New York—Government attorneys, fighting to force Jim Norris and Arthur Wirtz to sell their stock in the Madison Square Garden Corp., will put a Garden minority stockholder on the stand Monday, when the federal monopoly hearing is resumed.

The U.S. attorney identified him merely as Hyman B. Cantor, and did not indicate the nature of his testimony.

At Wednesday's session in federal court, Judge Sylvester Ryan said, "I am heading toward a decision I was reluctant to take—that both International Boxing clubs of New York and Illinois be dissolved."

Judge Ryan, who on March 8 found the Jim Norris boxing enterprise guilty of monopoly in the conduct of title fights, is now listening to suggested break-up decrees that may be included in his final judgment. Government attorneys are proposing drastic decrees; defense lawyers, lenient ones.

Ortiz Victor Over Chiocca

Chicago—Puerto Rican lightweight Carlos Ortiz sported a win streak of 24 today but he was the first to admit the thing he needs most now is more experience.

"I don't plan to fight again until September," he said, "but I figure on maybe five, six more bouts before I start calling for a crack at the title."

Ortiz, only 20, won a unanimous 10-round decision over Parisian Felix Chiocca in a nationally-televised bout at the Chicago Stadium Wednesday night.

Ortiz said he found Chiocca, who has won 27 of his 34 bouts, "an easy boy to hit." Ortiz explained that he didn't try for a knockout because he "wanted the experience of going 10 rounds with Chiocca."

Judge Frank McAdams scored heaviest for Ortiz, giving him a 48-43 margin in accordance with the Illinois five-point "must" system. Judge Howard Walsh had it 48-44 and referee Bill Doty called it 47-43. The United Press called it 48-45, Ortiz, giving the Puerto Rican five rounds and calling three others even.

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Hunting and Fishing Southern Oregon

Opening day concentration of people, boats and trailers at Diamond Lake can only be likened to the early days of the gold rush. No doubt this aggregation of anglers set a new high for Oregon and with the exception of Crowley Lake in California, for the entire Pacific Coast.

The season wasn't too many hours old before it was evident that this fiasco wouldn't measure up to the meat-in-the-pot affair that was so widely publicized and many of the more than 10,000 headed for other more productive lakes.

The poor luck which was experienced has been blamed on everyone except the real culprit—the poor fish—and who could blame them for heading for the deepest spot in the lake when up to 3,000 boats started chugging around dragging roughly 6,000 fenders, spoons and assorted flashers.

Success was better on Sunday but by this time the big crowd had departed in disappointment.

MAY BE MORE WARY

In checking the success rate of the Kamloops trout in Lake Pend Oreille in northern Idaho a couple of years ago, this writer learned that it is estimated that it takes 1,200 man hours of fishing to catch each fish. With this in mind it could be highly possible that these trout in Diamond Lake will become increasingly wary as they grow larger—after all they all had the same great grandparents!

Generally it is believed that after the excitement dies down and the fish are through spawning and whatever else is keeping them occupied at present, the fishing should be pretty fair. As the summer progresses it might be almost as good as most people thought it would be—maybe.

Four Mile Lake—After a slack off, the lake is paying of in limits again. F-5 silver Flatfish, Knobby wobblers, either trolled along or behind a flasher, and single egg fishing are on the menu now. This isn't the heaven it over and haul 'em in that it was near the first of the season but the fish are there and they can be caught—it is up to the angler now.

Salmon fishing in the Rogue has picked up materially in the Grants Pass area. Each day this past week from two to five fish have been taken near Savage Rapids Dam and besides this number many more have been lost. It is reported that there was a large bunch of wire etc in the Merrill section which was blocking their progress. This has been removed and the fish are showing in many sections of the river now.

Trout fishing on the Apple-gate and the Rogue is very poor and is likely to remain so for the remainder of the season unless some late season spot plants produces a little flurry. Unless something drastic is done for these streams in the near future they will no doubt pass into that oblivion of neglected waters.

Fish lake—Lloyd Morris of the Fish Lake Resort reports that fishing at the present time is excellent. Many excellent catches of fish from 8-10 inches with a number of larger fish up to 21 inches have been taken. The best method is still fishing with eggs and worms. One party from Grants Pass trolling Doc Shelton with worms limited in less than two hours. This should be one of the really hot spots this week end.

Klamath lake—A phone call to Harriman's Lodge at Rocky Point glows with the good fishing there now. Bob Sloan says that the big board which lists the trout which weigh four lbs. and over is
