

CENTRAL POINT 1,000 Attend Graduation

Central Point—Approximate-ly 1,000 people attended the junior high school graduation ceremonies which took place in the junior high gymnasium, last Tuesday evening. There were 131 students graduating.

Grange closed at 8:15 p.m. and refreshments of assorted glazed donuts and coffee were served by the refreshment committee.

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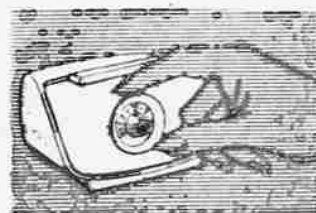


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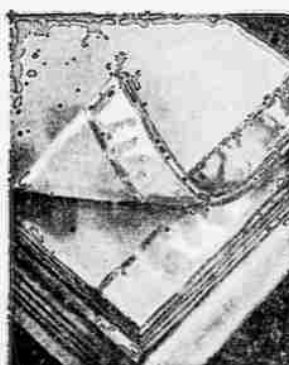


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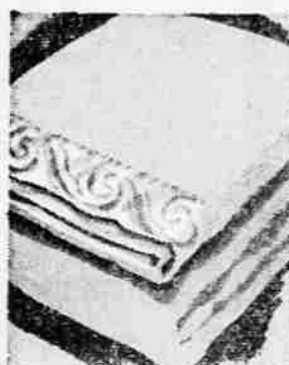
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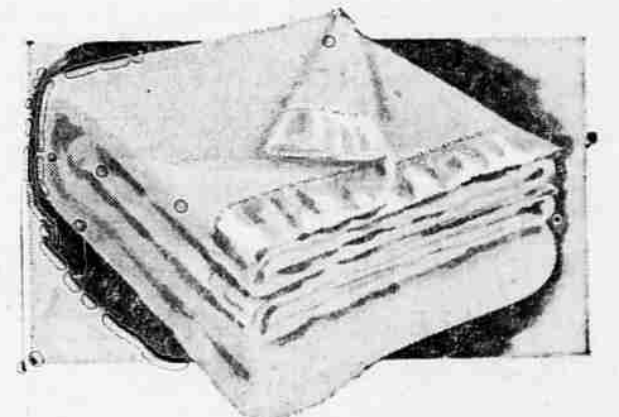
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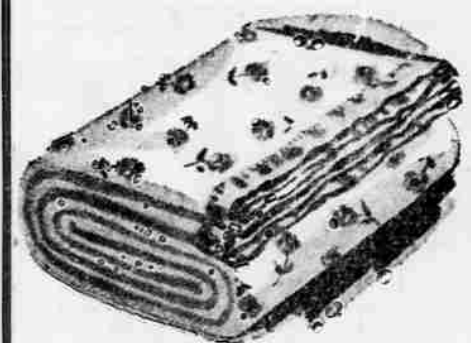
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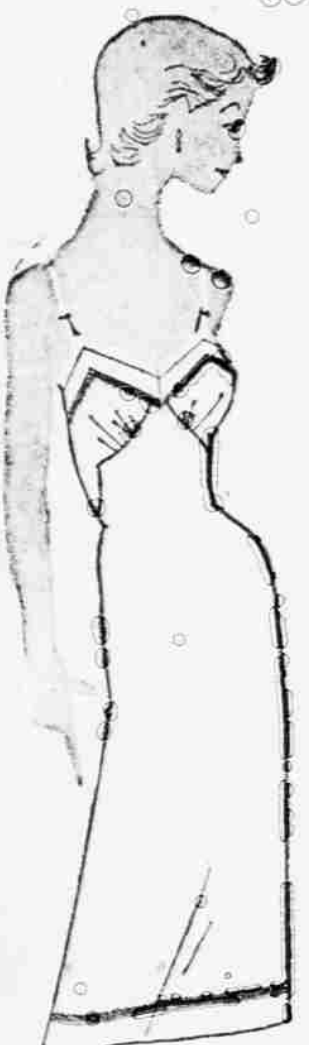
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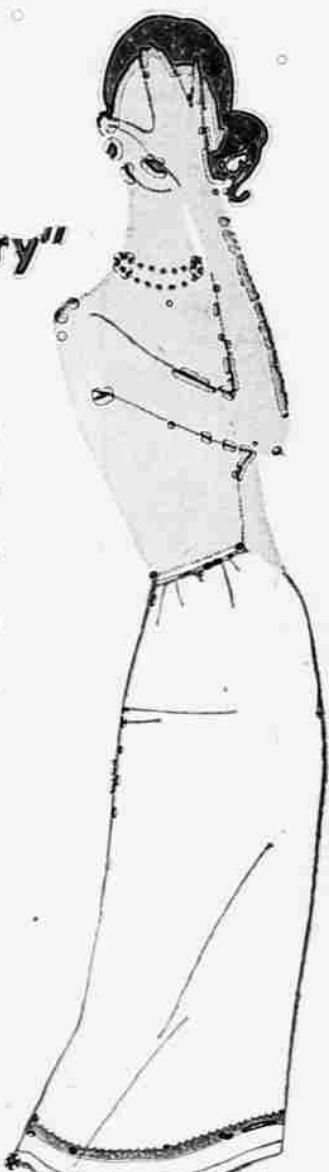


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
