Another Long-Time Farm Tradition May Be on Way Out

Kansas City, Mo. — Like the old gray mare, the Missouri mule, the old bucket and walking plow, another long-standing farm tradition may be on the way out.

This is the bushel, a standard of measure used by farmers for centuries and possibly dating back to Biblical times.

Modern technology is forcing the bushel to give way to measuring by weight. The reason — no one quite agrees just what a bushel is.

You might say that a bushel is the amount of something that can be put in a bushel basket, such as apples at the supermarket. But in some states, the

basket is filled to overflowing — in others to a line level with the top of the container.

And again, contents of the bushel usually vary in weight. No two bushels of apples weigh the same, and no two bushels of wheat do either. This variation has brought on the common practice of selling by the bushel-pound method, and causes considerable mathematics.

Roy Freeland, secretary of the Kansas board, admitted there would be difficulties to the changeover but said they would be only temporary.

The hardest thing, as Freeland visualized it, would be getting farmers to speak of yields in terms of "hundred-weight per acre" instead of the common "bushel per acre." And of sentimental value only would be the passage of a long-standing tradition, one that served well through centuries before scales came along to make measurement by weight more practical.
