## Baghdad Group Joined by U.S.

Karachi, Pakistan—The United States formally joined the Baghdad Pact Military committee today and promised to "carry its full share of responsibilities" in defense of the pact's Middle East nations.

Former U.S. Ambassador to India Loy Henderson spoke for the United States at the opening of the third session of the pact's Council of Ministers. Henderson headed a strong American delegation. Although the United States is not formally a member of the pact, its representatives sit on all key committees.

The presence of Gen. Nathan Twining, designated to become chairman of the U.S. Joint Chiefs of Staff on retirement of Adm. Arthur Radford, indicated the importance that the United States attached to this hitherto "psychological" pact.

## Britain May Continue Atomic Bomb Tests

Christmas Island—Britain may continue its Pacific H-bomb tests for some weeks and explode a device even more powerful than the megaton bomb set off last Friday, informed sources said today.

Friday's bomb, second exploded in the test series, equalled one million tons of TNT and was the largest ever detonated by Britain.

Experts said that Sir William Penney, British atom research chief who is in charge of the tests, may decide to explode a weapon of even greater power.

## Court Ruling Gives Lift To Stock Market

New York—The Supreme court of the United States gave the stock market a lift today when it ruled that DuPont had violated anti-trust laws in its acquisition 40 years ago of 22.6 per cent of General Motors Corp. common stock.

Traders assumed that meant the giant chemical company would be forced to distribute its holdings of General Motors stocks—63 million shares—to its stockholders. DuPont stock ran up six points to 202 1/2 from an early low of 193 1/2. Toward closing, however, nearly all the gain was wiped out. General Motors did nothing price-wise.
