Santa Monica, Calif. — The Federal Bureau of Investigation today probed the firing of two Douglas Aircraft company purchasing agents accused of accepting favors from subcontractors.

Douglas officials revealed Sunday that the unnamed purchasing agents were fired several weeks ago and that the case was turned over to the FBI to determine whether or not the government might not have been defrauded on federal contracts.

The accused, former employees at the Douglas plant in Torrance, were charged with accepting trips to resort areas for themselves and their families.

Port Oxford — Wayne Clark, 13, who graduated last week from the 8th grade, drowned Sunday while swimming in Garrison lake near Port Oxford.

The Clark boy was swimming with Phil Paris, a friend and classmate, close to shore. Paris said Wayne coughed, went down and did not come up. He said he tried to locate his companion by diving several times, but was unable to find him.

Fallout Increase Reported at Portland

Portland — An increase in the radiation fallout over Portland up to about four times normal was reported Saturday and Sunday but it was still far short of what is considered dangerous.

Richard Hatchard, director of the air pollution control section of the State Board of Health, said the radiation increase probably was the result of nuclear testing somewhere. Fallout is checked daily at a state office building station in downtown Portland.

Hatchard said that the normal level of radiation falling onto Portland is about one-thousandth of the amount established as allowable.

Sir Anthony Eden Sails for Britain

London — Sir Anthony Eden sailed home to Britain today for the first time since ill health and the failure of his Suez policy combined last Jan. 9 to force him out of office as the nation's premier.

Eden, still ailing despite a five-month vacation and a prolonged course of medical treatment for bile duct trouble in Boston, was due to arrive from Canada aboard the liner Empress of Britain, docking at Liverpool this afternoon.

Queen Elizabeth II ordered one of her own planes to the northern airport to fly Eden to Rose Bower, his country cottage at Broad Chalk, Wiltshire.



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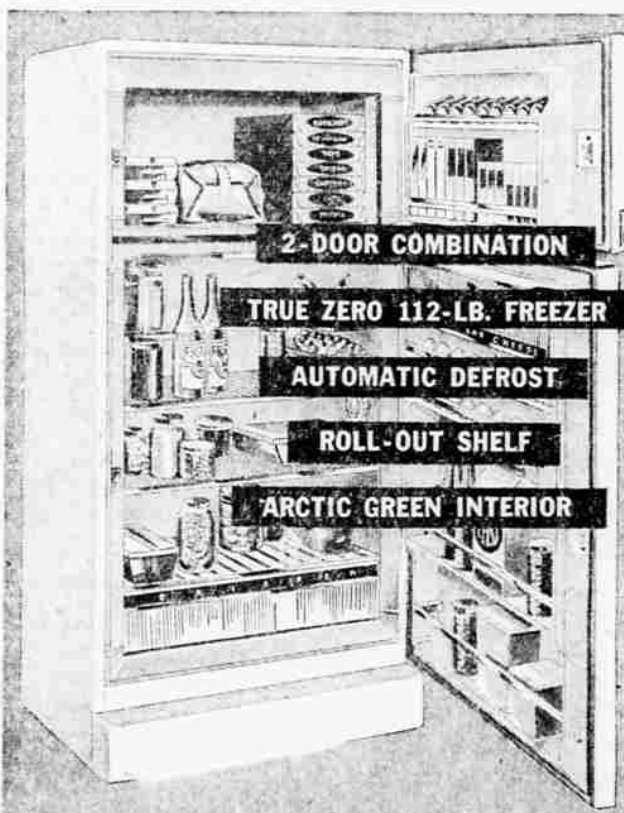
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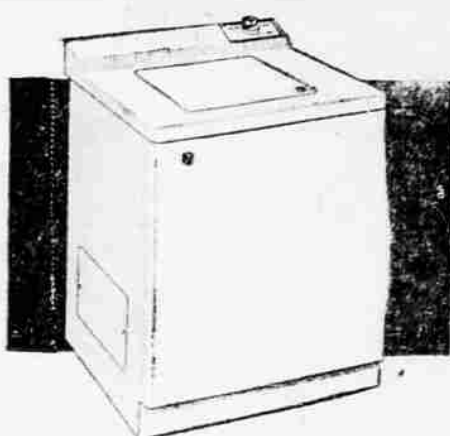
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
