

Dick Farrell Pitches 5-3 Triumph As Phillies Snip Redleg's Lead

Add Dick Farrell to Jack Sanford and Don Cardwell, and the dark-horse Philadelphia Phillies are getting the best rookie pitching the National League has ever seen since Jim Turner and Lou Fette each won 20 games for the Boston Braves back in 1937.

Farrell, a 6-foot, 175-pounder from Brookline, Mass., picked up his third victory of the season Sunday when the Phillies beat the Brooklyn Dodgers, 5-3, and moved to within two games of the first-place Cincinnati Redlegs. It was the Phillies' third straight over the Dodgers and their 11th victory in their last 15 games.

The Redlegs clobbered the Chicago Cubs, 6-4, for their seventh straight win over the Braves but then lost the nightcap, 4-2, to the three-hit pitching of Bob Rush and Don Elston. The third-place Milwaukee Braves downed the St. Louis Cardinals, 3-1, and the Pittsburgh Pirates swept the New York Giants, 3-2, and 2-0, in the other National League games.

Chicago, Yanks Split
The Chicago White Sox split their double-header with the Detroit Tigers, winning, 4-1, after a 3-1 defeat to retain their five-game lead in the American League. The second place New York Yankees bounced back from a 2-2 loss to down the Baltimore Orioles, 4-1. The Kansas City Athletics whipped the Cleveland Indians, 8-2, and the Boston Red Sox scored a 5-3 victory over the Washington Senators in their other AL activity.

Farrell, who yielded only three hits in the last five innings after taking over for Bob Miller, now has a 3-1 record. He, Sanford and Cardwell have combined for a 12-3 mark so far this year and have transformed a team that the experts said was headed for the second division into a dangerous pennant threat. Farrell and Stan Lopata homered for the Phillies' key blows as Don Newcombe suffered his fifth loss compared to four wins.

Bob Thurman hit a grand slam homer and George Crowe also homered as the Redlegs rallied in their opener to give Hershel Freeman his third win. In the second game, Elston took over when Rush suffered a pulled muscle in his right leg in the sixth inning. The win was Rush's first after six straight losses.

Bob Buhl, aided by Ernie Johnson's ninth-inning relief work, won his fourth game as the Braves took their third place and dropped the Dodgers to fourth.

Ronnie Kline won his first game in the opener and Bob Purkey hurled a four-hitter in the nightcap as the Pirates swept their first double-header of the season. Willie Mays stretched his hitting streak to 21 games in the opener but was stopped in four at-bats by Purkey in the second game.

Kaline Plays Brilliantly
Jack Harshman's four-hitter enabled the White Sox to split their double-header after Al Kaline staged a one-man offensive for Detroit in the opener. Walt Droppo homered for the White Sox in the second game after Kaline smashed three singles and a double and scored all Detroit's runs in the first game.

Ralph Terry turned in a three-hitter and Mickey Mantle, Yogi Berra and Elston Howard homered for the Yankees after ex-Yankee Bill Wight flipped a three-hitter in the opener. Terry struck out four and walked three to post his first big league shut-out.

The A's tagged relief ace Ray Narleski with his first defeat when they scored six runs in the eighth inning. Bob Cerv's three-run triple was the big blow of the frame which brought ex-Yankee Mickey McDermott his first victory of the season.

Ted Williams blasted his 12th homer of the year with two on in the eighth inning to provide the Red Sox with a come-from-behind victory.

The Mounties took the Stars 3-0 and 2-1 in eight innings to regain their top spot as Sacramento beat San Francisco 5-4. The Seals came back to win the nightcap 13-0.

The other clubs also divided Sunday's games, Seattle beating Portland 7-3 and the Beavers winning 3-1. It was Los Angeles 7-6 over San Diego and then the Padres by 3-1 in the second.

Palica Tosses Shutout
Erv Palica manufactured the Vancouver shutout with a six-hitter to beat Fred Waters. The Mounties made the most of seven hits.

In the second one Spider Jorgensen singled home the winning tally in the first overtime inning after the game had been 1-1 since the second. R. C. Stevens homered for the Stars and Joe Frazier for the Mounties in that frame.

The win went to Don Ferrarese and the loss was tacked on the record of Ben Daniels. Sacramento came from behind with three runs in the top of the ninth inning to taste victory over San Francisco for the only time in an eight-game series.
