Restaurant Owners Now Dabbling in Diner Psychology

New York — Restaurant owners are now dabbling in diner analysis. They don't get the customer on a couch—they just take notes as their customers sit and eat.

A restaurant magazine (Restaurant Management) recently concluded a survey of 4,000 American restaurant owners and managers to get the low-down on high tension during mealtime. This tension is described as "that rushed, nervous feeling at meals."

Fifty-six per cent of the restaurant owners questioned believe men suffer more from mealtime tension than women, but the latter are more demonstrative.

The survey found that men show more impatience and irritability while waiting for service. But women will complain more about the service and the food. Men apparently try to drown their impatience and irritability in coffee. Women, besides complaining, burn up irritation by smoking cigarettes.

Most restaurant owners said more men than women are bothered by indigestion or upset stomachs after a meal.

Soft Music, Please

The questionnaire also asked about ways to cut down on mealtime tension. Eighty-five per cent of the owners said good service and friendly personnel would do the trick. Fifty-two per cent replied that comfortable surroundings—air conditioning, background music, soundproofing and good lighting—help ease tension.

Science apparently goes along with them. Experiments have shown that soft music affects the thalamus, the part of the brain which controls emotional responses and regulates breathing pulse, blood pressure and metabolism as well as appetite.

One restaurant owner complained that working women ought to ease up.

"They try to do too many things like shopping and eating during a lunch break," he pointed out.

Another said women come into his place irritable from previous encounters with store clerks and "create more confusion by not knowing what they want to eat."

Some owners said they try to strike up conversations with women customers who show signs of mealtime tension. They believe small talk between the owner and the diner helps relieve tension. But that would depend on what they're talking about.

Uncle Jack Club Pledge to Support Korean Youngster

The Uncle Jack club of the California Oregon Power company in Medford has financially "adopted" Kim Bu Ja, seven-year-old Korean girl.

The group will contribute \$15 a month toward the child's support for at least one year. Arrangements for the support project were made through Foster Parents Plan, Inc., New York City. "Adoption" through this plan is financial rather than a transaction of law.

Bu Ja was the daughter of a primary school teacher, who was killed while the family was fleeing from home when war broke out in Korea. Her mother died in 1953 of an unknown disease. Bu Ja and her brother, Kim Song Nam, now 18, became wanderers. Finally, a soldier found them and asked that they be admitted to the orphanage where they are now living.

Foster Parents Plan, Inc., in a statement to the Uncle Jack club, wrote, "Through your kind 'adoption,' you can assure Bu Ja of her material needs and of your warm-hearted interest, so important to the security of any child."

Of the \$15 a month the club is contributing, \$9 is received by the child as an outright gift and the remainder is made up of periodic food and new clothing packages.
