

Nuclear Tests Increase Number Of Unborn Children Who Will Be Handicapped, Geneticists Claim

Washington — Two geneticists told Congress today that every time a nuclear test is held it increases the number of unborn children whose lives will be shortened or marred.

Dr. Herman J. Muller of the University of Indiana said the number of lives that will be seriously curtailed or injured throughout the world in future generations as a result of the tests already held is in all probability in the hundreds of thousands or millions.

Diseased or Deformed

Dr. James F. Crow of the University of Wisconsin said "we can be sure several hundreds or thousands or tens of thousands or perhaps more persons will be diseased or deformed or will die prematurely or be otherwise impaired as a consequence of fallout if the present rates of testing continue."

Both stressed in their prepared statements before the House-Senate Atomic Radiation Subcommittee that compared to other causes of death and injury including natural mutation the number is relatively small.

However, Muller called continuation of test explosions by East and West a "monstrous mistake of policy."

He said any nuclear war "even with present techniques would result in the cataclysmic ruination of humanity in general."

"The means of destruction are now so advanced on both sides that further advances by one side alone could not prevent this outcome," he said.

Radiation Going Up

Crow said the nuclear tests are steadily increasing the amount of radiation to which the world is exposed.

"The total harm to the population as measured by effect on future generations is strictly proportional to the total amount of radiation received by the reproductive cells of the population," he said. "This means there is no such thing as a 'safe' dose of radiation to the population."

"No increase in radiation for any reason should occur unless it offers some compensating benefit for mankind."

The Atomic Energy Commission has maintained that the amount of radiation resulting

from fallout is far below the danger level.

Berkeley, Calif. — Two prominent University of California scientists have rejected the appeal of Dr. Linus Pauling for a world agreement to end atomic bomb tests.

The scientists are Dr. K. S. Pitzer, dean of the College of Chemistry, and Dr. Joel H. Hildebrand, professor emeritus of chemistry.

Pitzer declared Pauling's appeal was a "most unfortunate

action and one which I cannot support."

Hildebrand declared that scientists "should be sure of their ground before claiming scientific authority for alarmist assertions."

Pauling, head of the division of chemistry and chemical engineering at the California Institute of Technology, released Monday an "appeal" bearing the signatures of 2,000 scientists. The appeal asked for a world ban on nuclear testing.

Could Handle Thousands

When Graham takes his revival into the open air he could preach to 52,000 persons at once in the Polo grounds, home of the New York Giants, and to 87,000 in the home grounds of the champion Yankees.

The crusade's executive committee had planned originally to run the revival 6 1/2 weeks, at a cost of nearly \$900,000. Committee chairman Roger Hull said Monday night the extension will cost at least \$55,000 a week and could run total expenses for the crusade over \$1 million.

The crusade is being paid for by subscriptions of member churches of the Protestant Council of New York and hundreds of individuals and businesses, as well as nightly offerings in the Garden.

May Be Extended

Hull indicated the committee may extend the revival even beyond July 21, depending on finances and on whether New Yorkers continue to fill Madison Square Garden to near-capacity, as has been the case so far.

An estimated 357,000 persons have attended Graham's sermons since they started 20 days ago. As of Monday night, when 501 persons made "decisions for Christ," 12,145 "decisions" have been recorded.

Four Escape Injury In Crash Landing

Kelso, Wash. — A small plane carrying four persons crash-landed about eight miles east of here Monday but all aboard escaped serious injury.

Bill Workman of Ashland, the pilot, said the motor went out at about 4000 feet and he was forced to crash land in a farmer's field. Workman and one of the passengers were taken to a Kelso hospital but both were released with only minor cuts and bruises.

Damage to the plane was extensive as one wing and the undercarriage were torn off.

Others aboard included Dick Cobb of Portland and Gary Carter and William Antis of the Fish and Wildlife Survey in Sand Point, Alaska.

The plane was from Wicks Air service in Hillsboro, Ore. The flight plan called for the plane to go to Seattle.

Chiloquin Man Gets 15 Years in Prison

Klamath Falls — Bonnie Raymond Belgrade, 25, Chiloquin, Monday was sentenced to 15 years in prison and fined \$1000 for the slaying of his wife.

Belgrade was convicted by an all-woman jury May 28 of voluntary manslaughter in connection with the fatal shooting of his wife, Maxine Walker Belgrade, 20, on March 23. Sentence was pronounced by Circuit Judge David R. Vandenberg.

Japan To Try U.S. Soldier for Slaying

Washington — The United States today agreed to let Japan try Army Specialist 3rd Class William S. Girard for the slaying of a Japanese woman.

The decision was announced in a joint statement by Secretary of State John Foster Dulles and Secretary of Defense Charles E. Wilson.

The case has aroused a furor in Japan and the United States.

Specialist Girard of Ottawa, Ill., is accused of killing Mrs. Naha Sakai on an American firing range in Japan last January. The woman, one of a group scavenging for spent cartridge shells on the firing range, was mortally wounded when struck by an empty cartridge shell fired by Girard from a grenade launcher.

Korean Wife Speeds To Soldier's Bedside

Travis AFB, Calif. — Weary and worried Mrs. Tae Moon Cherry, 20, Korean war bride, arrived here aboard a Flying Tiger airliner at 6:15 a.m. today with her year-old baby, both bound for the bedside of her husband who lies between life and death in Arkansas.

"I have everybody and everything," an obviously tired Mrs. Cherry told newsmen and photographers through an interpreter.

Her husband, Army Sp-3C Havis V. Cherry, is near death in a Hot Springs hospital from injuries suffered in an auto accident. His physicians hoped that the sight of his young wife would spark his will to live.

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Brig Irregularities Uncovered at Moffett

Moffett Nas, Calif. — The Navy has announced that "certain irregularities" have been uncovered during a preliminary investigation into charges of misconduct by Marine guards at the Naval air station brig.

The charges were brought to light by Robert G. Smith, Menlo Park, Calif., whose son, Airman Robert D. Smith, 20, and a fellow Air Force enlisted man, Fred S. Fisher, 18, of San Jose, were recently held at Moffett as being AWOL.

Smith said his son complained of being beaten by two Marines, forced to fight with other prisoners, sprayed with a fire extinguisher, and forced to jump from a table, crying "Geronimo"—the traditional cry of Marine paratroopers.
