Stock Trading Off; Prices Move Widely

New York — Trading in stocks fell off today to the lightest level in seven weeks. Prices, however, moved widely in many instances and some issues registered gains ranging to four points.

The market retreated early in the day and came back from the lows with some of the railroad shares showing a firmer trend, an encouraging factor for the bullish element.

Louisville & Nashville ran up nearly two points to help lift the rail average a little. Minor gains were noted in a number of others in the list used to calculate the average. Outside that group, Nashville, Chattanooga & St. Louis ran up nearly seven points and Central of Georgia gained two points.

Montana Physician Speaks at Institute

Epidemiology of virus diseases was discussed by Dr. Carl Eklund, Hamilton, Mont., this morning at the four-day institute on the principles of epidemiology.

Over 71 persons interested in public health, including all staff members of the Jackson county health department, are attending.

Dr. Eklund, who is medical director of the U.S. Rocky Mountain laboratory, explained virus properties believed to be of importance in epidemiologic studies. He included a discussion of poliomyelitis and infectious hepatitis problems.

A number of public health authorities are taking part in the Southern Oregon institute, and will also work with similar conferences in Portland, Multnomah county and Eugene.

Snake Farm Opens At Cave Junction

Cave Junction—A snake farm, formerly known as the Gold Hill Cobra farm, has been brought to Rough and Ready flats by Mr. and Mrs. Richard L. Cummings, who also run the "Whale," a museum near Red Bluff.

Mr. and Mrs. Cummings have rented the Elwood Hussey building near the airport and are now showing their poisonous and non-poisonous snakes, including the deadly cobra, the cotton mouth water moccasin and the Florida timber rattler.

Managing the business is William Robinson, who was associated with the Cummings at Gold Hill. The owners will return Friday from a California trip.

Future plans include a curio shop, a small zoo and a soft drink counter. The building was previously the '49'er Cafe.

Highway Commission Will Receive Bids

Salem — Bids will be received by the State Highway Commission here Friday on \$2 million in highway, bridge, building and rock production projects.

The projects include 11.51 miles of grading, 32.35 miles of stone base and shoulders, 15.17 miles of asphaltic concrete pavement, 31.78 miles of oil mat surfacing, construction of three bridges, one maintenance building and furnishing 12,000 cubic yards of crushed material in stock piles.
