

## Library Patrons May Return Books Through Mail Now

A brand-new service is being offered to library patrons who find it inconvenient to make a trip downtown to return books.

Patrons of the Medford Public Library are invited to return books by mail, officials reported.

**Envelopes Offered**  
The library is offering addressed, reinforced envelopes for this purpose. Each envelope will hold one or two books, or a number of pamphlets, and is ready for mailing back to the library. The price per envelope, to cover their cost to the library, is 15 cents.

According to Miss Helen Webster, librarian, the service was instituted especially to help vacationers who wish to take library books with them and mail them back when they have been read. It is hoped that the envelopes may also be useful to persons obtaining books for shut-ins.

**Mail Order Service**  
It is regretted, the librarian said, that present resources of the library do not permit giving complete mail order service to the many readers who would enjoy it. Such a service would require a postage fund many times greater than that which is allotted as well as additional staff members to wrap and mail the quantity of books that might be requested each week by Jackson county's 35,000 rural readers.

## 3,508 People Visit Museum

A total of 3,508 visitors from 20 states, the District of Columbia, Alaska, Canada, Australia, New Zealand, and Costa Rica were registered at the Jacksonville museum during May.

This is 424 more visitors than during the same month last year, and 249,686 have visited the museum since July 10, 1950.

Since January 1, a total of 2,122 students from 53 schools in Douglas, Josephine, Jackson, and Siskiyou counties have visited the museum. In addition, groups of Scouts, civic and social organization groups, and members of night classes have toured the museum.

Several gifts and loans were made to the museum during the month, according to museum officials. These include such items as old photographs, lamps, letters, documents, dolls and other miscellaneous items.

## Science Department Chairman Honored Sunday Afternoon

Ashland — Dr. Wayne Wells, retiring chairman of the Southern Oregon college science department, was honored following SOC commencement exercises Sunday afternoon.

Dr. Bill Sampson, professor of education, made an informal presentation of a wristwatch to Dr. Wells on behalf of the faculty and staff of the college.

Dr. Wells, who is retiring after 31 years on the teaching staff, addressed the 31st graduating class, summarizing the history of the school since 1926.

Frank Van Dyke, Medford attorney and president of the Western Interstate commission of higher education, also spoke to the nearly 170 students. His topic was "Higher Education in the Critical Decade Ahead," predicting an ever-increasing training.

## Auto Fumes Threat Worse Than Bombs

Chicago—The head of the Argonne National laboratory criticized fellow scientists seeking a halt in nuclear bomb tests and said fumes from cars and buses are more dangerous than radioactive fallout.

Dr. Norman Hilberry, director of the Atomic Energy commission installation operated by the University of Chicago, spoke Friday at a meeting of the Chicago Council on Foreign Relations.

He said a petition by 2,000 geneticists, biologists, chemists and physicists urging an end to H-bomb tests shows that "sometimes scientists get off the beaten track."

"Frankly I'm more concerned about the tetraethyl lead being tossed from the auto exhausts than I am about the present rate of fallout in the United States," Hilberry said.

He charged that the danger of radiation is being emphasized out of proportion to its actual threat.

## Girl, 18, Refused Right To Marry Boy Friend, 52

Plymouth, England—A local court has ruled that Wendy Ward, 18, must not marry Thomas Johnstone, a 52-year-old truck driver and grandfather, because the age difference is too great.

Said Wendy's father, "He (Johnstone) has only 13 years of working life left, then she would have to support him."

## Southern Oregon College Summer Classes Announced

Ashland — Southern Oregon college summer session offerings, in addition to regular courses, include a wide variety of workshop activities and a newly-instituted Siskiyou band camp, according to Dr. Bill Sampson, director of the sessions.

Registration for the regular session is scheduled for June 10. The Siskiyou band camp, with Glenn T. Matthews, assistant professor of music as director and founder, embodies a music clinic and camp set-up with special emphasis placed on section rehearsals, group of private lessons, formal and informal programs and recitals, and such related matters as marching, harmony, ear training, and music appreciation.

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An audio-visual aids workshop will be conducted June 10-21 for graduate credit and will feature a survey of the development and use of classroom techniques.

During the same two week period, a workshop in language arts methods and materials for teaching Spanish in the grades will be conducted. No knowledge of Spanish is required although those possessing such a background will be given extra reading and individual conferences in place of some of the class hours.

On June 24-July 5, workshops in methods and research materials; art, and in diagnostic and remedial instruction in reading, both for graduate credit will be held.

Methods and research materials workshops offered July 8-19 give graduate credit.

**Other Workshops**  
Dr. Sampson explained workshops in language arts and science are scheduled July 22-August 2, and for the post session, August 5-16 or August 5-23. The latter session will be methods and research materials workshops in social science, science, language arts, reading and arithmetic.

Those wishing to earn college credit while studying with the Institute of Renaissance Studies in cooperation with the college may do so through joint registration. Those interested are

asked to contact the Oregon Shakespearean Festival association for further details.

Courses offered under this arrangement are reading and conference in renaissance studies, seminar in renaissance studies, and advanced Shakespeare.

A 60-day congressional waiting period is required by law before such long-term concession contracts may be executed on behalf of the federal government.

Washington — A proposed 15-year concession contract authorizing the Oregon Caves company to continue to operate lodgings, meal service, transportation facilities and cave guide service in Oregon Caves National monument, has been submitted to Congress, Secretary of the Interior Fred A. Seaton has announced.

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
