Warsaw — Russia will repatriate 120,000 Poles this year, the official Polish news agency PAP reported today. The number of Poles in Russia is not known, but Russia has promised to complete repatriation by 1958.

Gains in Oil Shares Lead Market Higher

New York — Oil shares, especially those with vast stores of natural gas, led the stock market higher today.

Gains in the oils, which also featured in volume, ranged to more than three points. The best performers were Amerasia, Standard (Ind) Cities Service, and General American Oil.

There was nothing new in the news to bring the demand for the oils and gas issues, and it was recalled that traders had about written off prospects for passage of the natural gas bill this year. Institutional investors were said to be buying the oils on the prospect of good gains in net income this year.
