Eagle Point Man Dies in Logging Truck Thursday

Marvin Gerald Sharp, 41, Eagle Point, died of an apparent heart attack Thursday while driving a logging truck near Sweet Home.

D. W. Glenn Houston, Linn county coroner, said Sharp was found dead about 1:30 p.m. alongside the road in the cab of his logging truck a half mile east of the Cascade ranger station on Highway 20. The coroner said the man apparently suffered a slight heart attack while driving on the road and pulled off onto the shoulder.

Second Attack—Sharp was believed to have suffered a more severe attack later and died. He was driving a logging truck for Ed Barton for the first time and was on his first run of the day.

Houston said an autopsy would be held to determine the exact cause of death.

Born in South Dakota—Sharp was born June 9, 1915, in South Dakota, and married LaVelle Wilkinson in 1936. Survivors in addition to the widow are one daughter, Mrs. Wilma Peters, Central Point; three sons, Delbert, Gordon and Gerald, all at home; parents, Mr. and Mrs. Del Sharp, Prineville; three sisters, Mrs. Edna Berglund, Prineville; Mrs. Connie Campbell and Mrs. Dorothy Wilson, both of Virginia; and six brothers, Otis of Virginia, Clayton, Grand Rapids, Minn., Mel of Bonneville, Garret, Crescent City, Calif., Lester, Ellensburg, Wash., and Gilbert, Prineville. He was preceded in death three years ago by a sister, Mrs. Edith Bennett of Minnesota.

Funeral services will be held at 2:30 p.m. Monday, June 10, at Newwinger and Winslow Funeral home in Bend.
