## "Pep Pill" Charge to be Investigated

New York — The American College of Sports Medicine voted Saturday to investigate "rumors" that amateur and professional athletes have been using tranquilizers and stimulant drugs to improve their performances.

The college, at a special session during its two-day fourth annual meeting, decided to set up a committee to investigate the problem.

The action was taken as a result of charges made at the American Medical association meeting here this week that athletes, both professional and amateur, and including school children, have used "pep pills" to win sports events.

It was hinted at an AMA meeting that the four-minute mile was achieved by runners pepped up with Ampethamine, known also as Benzedrine or "benny."

The AMA ordered an investigation of the charges, but the College of Sports Medicine said its members thought they were best qualified to make such an inquiry.

## Cary Fires 70 Golf Day

Toledo, Ohio — Cary Middlecoff defending U.S. open champion, gave thousands of golfers a run for their money Saturday by carding an even par 70 at the Inverness Country club in the sixth annual National Golf day tournament.

Male golfers throughout the country, given their full club or established handicaps, played against Middlecoff at the local course for "I Beat the Open Champ" medals.

The event, sponsored annually by the Professional Golfers Association, has raised close to \$350,000 for golf charities in the past five years.

Middlecoff shot one birdie, one bogie and 16 pars in the cool and windy weather to better his Friday practice round by five strokes. A short chip shot spoiled another birdie on the 18th green.

Noordwijk, The Netherlands. — Hugh Stewart of Pasadena, Calif., and Sid Schwartz of New York gained the men's singles semi-finals Saturday at Noordwijk's International tennis championships with five-set triumphs over Australian opponents.

Stewart defeated Mervin Rose, 2-6, 6-3, 3-6, 6-4, 6-3, while Schwartz ousted Don Candy, 7-5, 4-3, 3-6, 7-9, 6-5.

Darlene Hard of Montebello, Calif., and Rose won the mixed doubles crown by defeating Dorothy Head Knode of Forest Hills, N.Y., and Stewart, 4-6, 6-3, 6-2.

## Stablemate of Swaps Wins Argonaut Mile

Inglewood, Calif. — Terrang, who on his best days can challenge any horse, staged a wire-to-wire win Saturday in the \$53,100 Argonaut mile at Hollywood park in the blazing time of 1:33 4/5.

Terrang, a former stablemate of Swaps, thus raced the mile within three-fifths of a second of the world's record set in this same race last year by Swaps. It was the fastest mile time this year in the nation.

Milan, Italy — The Monza 500-mile car race, the European version of the Indianapolis 500-mile speed classic, will count toward the United States Auto Club's absolute championships, it was announced Saturday.

In an official communique, Italy's Automobile Club also announced the final list of the U.S. entries—but postponed the announcement of the list of the reluctant European drivers who were supposed to stage a mass duel against their American rivals on the 4.250 KM (2.640-mile) high-banked Monza track.

## Commercial Fish Nets Are Banned

Sacramento — Gov. Goodwin J. Knight Saturday signed into law a bill banning commercial fishing nets upstream from the Carquinez Bridge on the Sacramento River after Sept. 27.

Passage of the measure by Sen. Louis P. Sutton (R-Maxwell) was hailed by sportsmen's groups as a major victory.

This bill was passed by an overwhelming vote of the legislature responding to the request of many thousands of sportsmen as well as commercial fishermen that commercial nets be banned from Suisun Bay, the governor said.

"It is hoped this will result in a greater production cycle which will make more fish available to commercial fishermen in the ocean. At the same time we are assured that there will be greater sports catch in the Delta and in the Sacramento and San Joaquin Rivers."

As amended by the assembly, the Sutton Bill will permit commercial fishermen, most of whom live in Contra Costa county, to use gill nets for the duration of the current season. But they must be off the river and bays for keeps after Sept. 27.
