Howard School Voters OK Additional Levy

Seventy-seven voters in the Howard school district last week approved by a wide margin a special \$3,968 levy that will add 1.6 mills onto the district's 63.4 mill tax for its rural school levy.

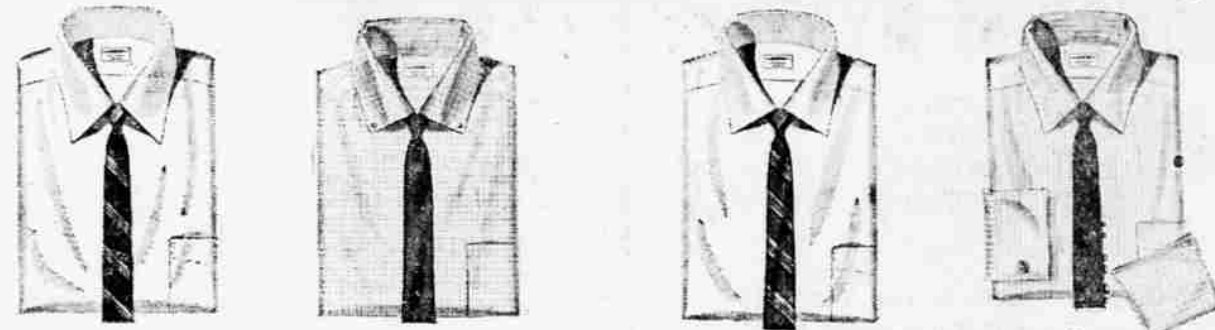
The vote was 57 "yes" and 20 "no." The district's rural school levy will be \$134,409.93, all ready approved by voters.

The additional levy was necessary to offset expenses for new playground equipment and the increase in the pay schedule for school personnel, according to county school officials. The school's pay schedule now is the same as Medford schools.

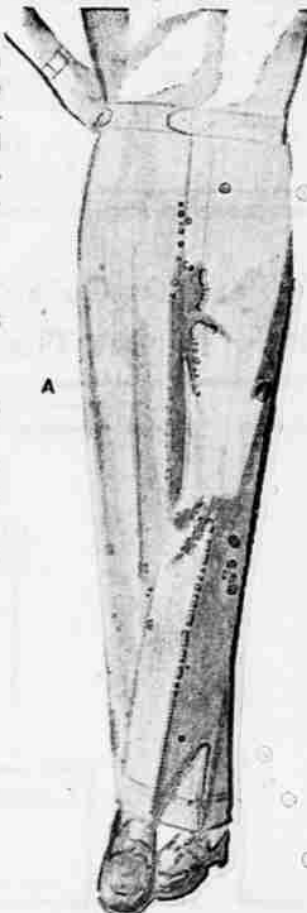
