People-to-People Plan Draws Interest of Many

The President's "People-to-People Partnership," now rounding out its first year of existence, has sparked the imagination of individual Americans and business firms.

This is the program, suggested last fall by President Eisenhower as a way of turning the citizens of the United States into personal ambassadors for this country.

"If we are going to take advantage of the assumption that all people want peace, then the problem is for all people to get together and to learn governments — if necessary to evade governments — to work out not one method but thousands of methods by which people can gradually learn a little bit more of each other," the President said.

The People-to-People Partnership, perhaps more than anything else recently, has been responsible for a special campaign for letter-writing to foreign countries, for newspaper and magazine articles acquainting Americans with the idea behind "People-to-People."

The objectives of the new program fit right in with many of the activities of the nation's volunteer groups — women's and men's clubs, service clubs, professional associations and others, which have been quietly working hand in hand with their foreign counterparts for many years. In fact, the President's program is bound to encourage and give additional strength to the international activities of America's volunteer organizations.

Federation Helps

As an example, the General Federation of Women's Clubs, whose members are primarily homemakers, are affiliated with similar groups throughout the world. Representatives of foreign groups attend the General Federation biennial conventions in this country; and a delegation of about 50 clubwomen goes from here to the international conventions held in other countries. Thus homemaking women from many countries get to know each other, visit each other's homes and exchange ideas and experiences on home and community life.

Another example: The American Association of University Women sponsors international graduate fellowships, bringing women scholars from foreign countries to study in the United States. When members of counterpart associations from other countries visit here, AAUW members extend a warm greeting and cordial hospitality, and usually plan tours of our country, with a special hostess group in each city visited.

The National Federation of Business and Professional Women's Clubs similarly offers visiting foreigners the social welcome that is so characteristic of American women everywhere.

In another area, the International Farm Youth Exchange, administered by the Cooperative Extension Service of the Department of Agriculture and the National 4-H Club Foundation, brings boys and girls to the United States from foreign countries to live for a while on farms or in rural areas. Members of 4-H clubs similarly go to other countries to enjoy the same experience.

Women's service groups — such as Altruists, Pilot, Quota, Soroptimist and Zonta — have international organizations, and when women executives from other countries visit the U.S., they receive a red-carpet welcome from sister clubmembers this side of the Atlantic. As with businessmen, there is a great coming and going of businesswomen between the United States and other lands.

Among the business groups that have embarked upon the People-to-People Partnership is the insurance business. Just a few days ago a unique meeting, the first of its magnitude, took place in Philadelphia, when upward of 100 couples from 35 foreign countries this side of the Iron Curtain gathered with Americans to exchange ideas about insurance. In acting as host to the International Insurance Conference, American insurance men and women gave their foreign friends more than a glimpse of the American way of life — a prime example of People-to-People Partnership in action.

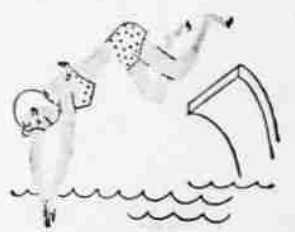

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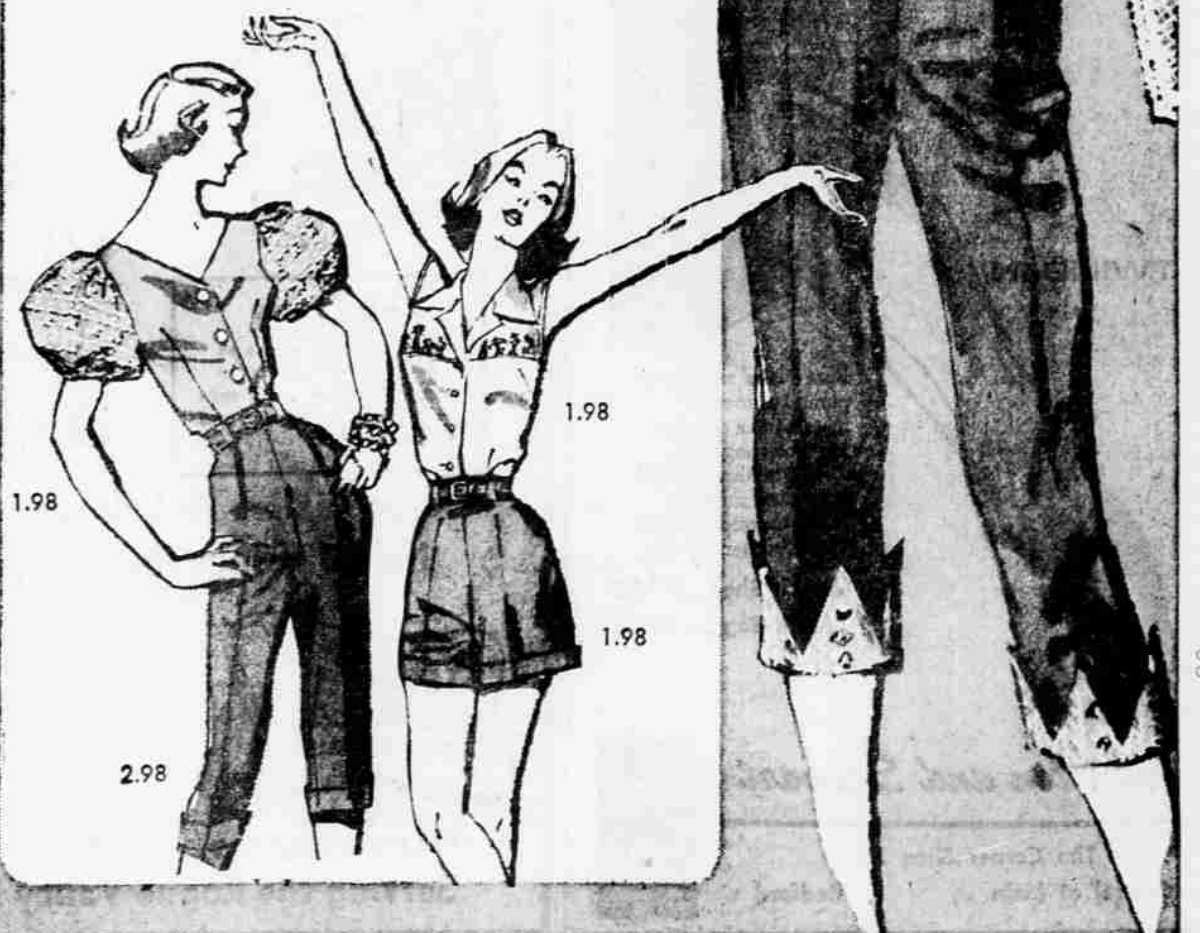
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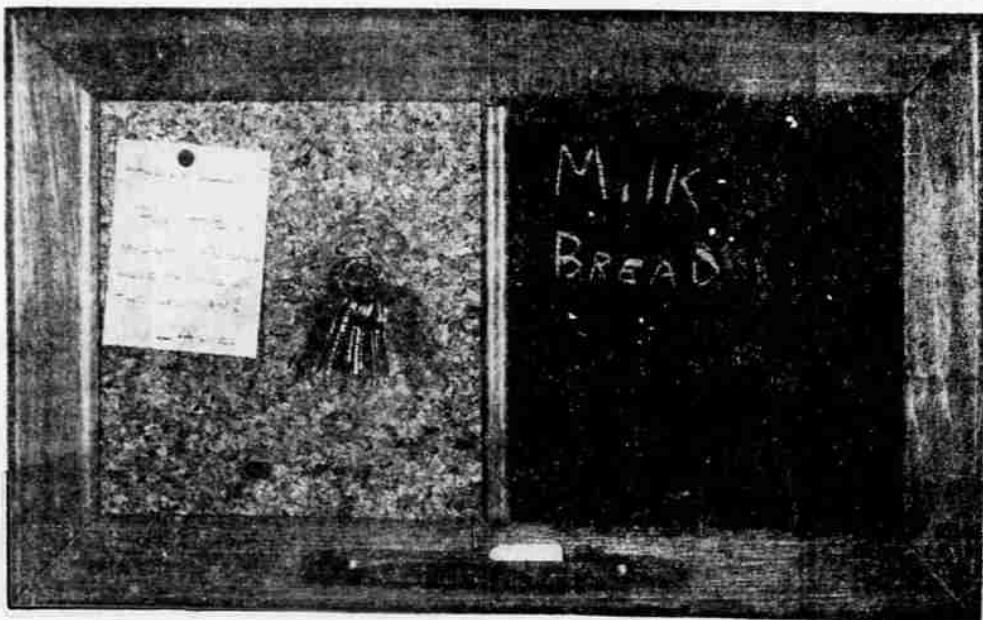


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
