

Tentative Draft of Flood Control Bill Completed

Congressman Charles O. Porter of Oregon's fourth district has completed a tentative draft of a bill to provide flood control and other benefits in the Rogue basin.

Before it is introduced, he said last week, he hopes citizens of the basin will read it, and offer their comments regarding it to him. The bill, to be introduced "by request," will make it possible for additional studies to be completed by governmental agencies on various phases of the proposal, and their findings would be incorporated in the bill before final passage.

Text of the tentative draft of the bill follows:

A BILL

To authorize the construction by the Secretary of the Army of certain projects in the Rogue River Basin in the State of Oregon for protection and development of the Rogue River Basin; to provide flood control on the Rogue River; to promote agricultural and industrial development; to provide for the national defense and welfare by advancing the integrated comprehensive development of water resources; and for related purposes.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the United States of America in Congress assembled, That in order to further the development of the land and water resources of the Rogue River Basin, State of Oregon, and to provide for the control of destructive floods, the Secretary of the Army is authorized to construct, operate and maintain in the Rogue River Basin the Lewis Creek dam, reservoir, and power plant, trail diversion dam and power plant, Peace Bridge, Meadows, Ruch, Slate Creek, Indian Hill, and Deer Creek dams and reservoirs, and Cascade Gorge dam and power plant, or reasonable substitutes therefor, in accordance with Bureau of Reclamation Rogue River Basin Project Planning Report No. 1-1001-6 of February 1950, and related diversion works, tunnels, canals, distribution and drainage systems, pumping facilities, transmission lines, works for the preservation and propagation of fish and wildlife, and basic recreational facilities, and related works, including straightening and clearing stream channels, necessary development works, works for the preservation and propagation of fish and wildlife, appurtenant hydroelectric facilities, and works necessary to provide basic recreational facilities.

Section 2. The Secretary of the Army shall allocate the cost of constructing, operating, and maintaining the projects authorized by the first section of this Act (1) to flood control, the preservation and propagation of fish and wildlife, and recreation pur-

poses, and shall evaluate such benefits over a 75 year economic service life for the project, and (2) to irrigation, municipal and domestic water supply, and commercial power projects. The costs allocated to the functions specified in category (1) of the first sentence shall be non-reimbursable and nonreturnable, and costs allocated to the functions specified in category (2) of the first sentence shall be reimbursable and returnable.

Section 3. Notwithstanding any other provision of law, net revenues from the commercial power and the municipal and domestic water supply operations of the projects authorized in the first section of this Act shall be applied, first to payment of the costs allocated to said functions over a 50 year period including interest on the unamortized balances thereof at the same rate (which rate shall be certified by the Secretary of the Treasury) as that being paid by the United States of its marketable long-term obligations outstanding on the date of this Act and, thereafter, to payment of that portion of the construction cost allocated to irrigation but beyond the ability of the users to pay therefor.

Section 4. (a) There is hereby created the position of Rogue River Development Fund Administrator, hereinafter referred to as the "Administrator." The Administrator shall be appointed by the President by and with the advice and consent of the Senate. He shall receive compensation at the rate of \$15,000 per annum and shall be reimbursed for actual expenses (including travel and subsistence when operating other than at his office) incurred in the performance of his duties under this Act.

(b) The Administrator shall maintain his principal office near the projects authorized by the first section of this Act. He shall cooperate to the fullest possible extent with all agencies of the United States concerned with such project, the Governor of the State of Oregon, and with any other political subdivision of such State affected by such project.

(c) There is hereby created the Rogue River Development Fund Planning Board to consist of the Administrator, who shall be chairman and administrative officer of the Board; the Regional Director of the Bureau of Reclamation (Region 1); the Division Engineer of the Corps of Engineers (North Pacific Division); and, if they so elect, the Governor of the State of Oregon, and a representative of the Oregon State Board of Water Resources; and one person outstanding in the field of conservation to be chosen by other members of the Board at their first meeting. Members of the Board shall receive no compensation other than subsistence at the rate of \$18 per diem for time actually spent in performing their duties, and reimbursement of actual transportation expenses, including allowance for use of privately-owned automobiles at the rate of 9 cents per mile. The Board shall cease to exist two years after date of completion of all the projects authorized by the first section of this Act. Meetings of the Board shall be at the call of the Administrator or such other times and places as may be determined by the Board.

(d) There is hereby established the Rogue River Development

Fund, hereinafter referred to as the "Fund," and there is authorized to be appropriated to such fund the sum of \$1,000,000. The Secretary of the Army and the Board, acting jointly, shall use the Fund to promote the readjustment and development of the areas in the Rogue River Basin directly affected by the projects authorized by the first section of this Act, for the maximum benefit and enjoyment of

the people of the United States, including but not limited to, the creation of facilities to aid in the conservation and reestablishment of fish and wildlife resources in the Rogue River Basin, the establishment of park facilities, fish hatcheries, wildlife refuges, and any similar developments which the Secretary of the Army and the Board agree to be necessary and desirable to implement the enjoyment,

utility, and beautification of the areas directly affected by such projects. The Comptroller General of the United States shall audit the Fund with personnel of his selection, at such times as he shall determine, but at least once each fiscal year of the United States. The Administrator shall make an annual report of the operations of the Board to Congress at the conclusion of each fiscal year.

(e) Compensation and expenses of the Board, Administrator, and such other personnel as may be appointed by the Board in an amount not to exceed \$150,000 in any fiscal year, may be paid out of the Fund.

Section 5. There is hereby authorized the sum of \$65,500,000 for the construction of the projects authorized by the first section of this Act.

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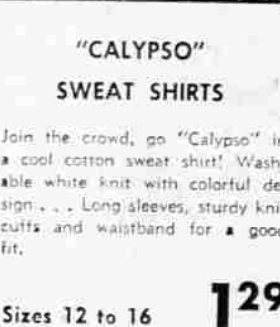
