Cherry Fruit Fly Spraying Advised

The second spray for control of cherry fruit fly should be completed on June 15, according to C. B. Cordy, county horticulture agent.

He recommends use of 3 pounds methoxychlor per 100 gallons or 2 heaping tablespoons in 3 gallons. Apply to sweet, sour and seedling cherry trees. This will control for 14 days, Cordy said.

When cherries are to be shipped and a residue is undesirable, use 1/4 pint of 20 per cent TEPP per 100 gallons. This must be repeated at 5 day intervals until harvest is complete. Use precautions in handling TEPP, he urged.
