Drain Woman Freed On Shooting Charge

Roseburg — Mrs. Irma Myrtle Miller, 57, Drain, the woman who had been accused of shooting Garrett A. Maupin, 62, Drain, May 26, and charged with first degree murder, walked out of district court here at 3:10 p.m. yesterday a free woman. District Judge Warren Woodruff said there was no evidence to link Mrs. Miller with Maupin's death.

Investigating officers testified at Mrs. Miller's hearing—originally set for June 10—in details of the shooting. Maupin was shot in his bed with a rifle the morning of the 26th.

The woman apparently shot herself in the chest, reportedly attempting suicide, with a 22 caliber pistol, and was returned from a Eugene hospital to Douglas county jail last Wednesday.

Portland E-R Suit Thrown Out by Judge

Portland — The latest ex-position-recreation center stumbling block here was thrown out by Circuit Judge James W. Crawford yesterday on the basis there was "nothing new" in it for the court.

The judge — in two separate pronouncements — refused to enjoin the E-R commission, and then dismissed the Mack Johnson-Joe Dobbins suit about alleged unlawful spending. The suit was based on an allegation that the commission was illegally spending money.

Crawford's ruling could solve

a problem that faced the Multnomah County Tax Supervising and Conservation commission, and which earlier this week caused them to defer approval of the 1957-58 E-R budget.

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
