

12 Migrant Farm Workers Killed in Truck-Train Crash

Vremont, Colo. — Twelve migrant farm workers were killed when a pickup truck taking them to southeastern Colorado sugar beet fields was struck by a Santa Fe Railway freight train on a crossing here early today. The dead, all from the Rocky Ford, Colo., area, included men, women and children. Authorities said it would be "some time" before they were identified.

Bodies were reported scattered for at least 400 feet.

The truck was reported turning off U.S. Highway 50 to go to a farm when it was hit by the train.

Driver Killed
Sylvester Licarno of Rocky Ford was driving the truck. He was killed.

The Colorado State Patrol said Licarno apparently was blinded by the sun and failed to see the approaching train.

None of the train crew was injured.

Engineer W. S. Inskeep was too "upset" to talk, authorities said. The state patrol said the truck was a mass of twisted steel. Most of the victims were women clear by the impact.

Several of the survivors, taken to the Rocky Ford and La Junta hospitals, were not expected to live.

Eugene — James Douglas McDowell, 5, of Eugene, drowned Sunday, after he had climbed over a neighbor's fence and fell into a swimming pool.

The McDowell boy and another little boy, who was not identified, climbed over the fence surrounding the swimming pool of Paul Snellstrom. McDowell fell into the pool and the other little boy ran for help. The boy was pulled from the pool about 15 minutes later by his father, Howard.

An hour of artificial respiration by the Eugene fire department failed to revive the boy and he was pronounced dead by a doctor.

The drowning accident was the second in Lane county over the week end.

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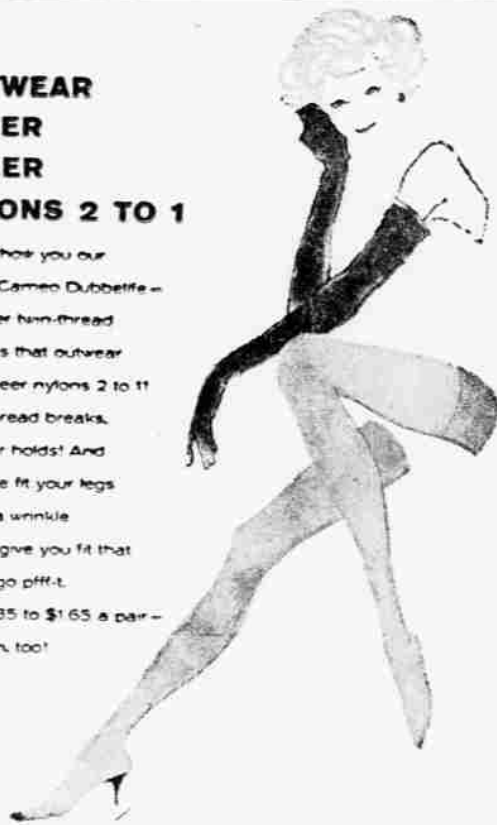
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
