Chamber Continues Tourist Information Program in County

The Jackson County Chamber of Commerce is continuing a new tourist program, inaugurated last summer, intended to hold visitors in the Jackson county area as long as possible.

The plan, being launched by the chamber's tourist committee with the cooperation of the Oil Industry Information center, involves display of weekly bulletins in more than 160 county service stations.

Coming events, picnic suggestions, camp sites, scenic trips and fishing information are listed in the bulletin, published by the chamber.

Put Into Effect

The idea was put into effect last summer under the direction of Mrs. Bert Pree, chairman of the chamber tourist committee. She was assisted in the distribution of the guides to service stations by Hal Edwards, representing Standard Oil company, and Howard Lage, representing Tidewater Oil company. Other chamber of commerce literature also was displayed at the stations.

Because of the success of the program last year, according to Don McNeil, chamber manager, its scope will be expanded for the 1957 tourist season. Distribution will include motels as well as service stations, he said.

An innovation in the program is the use of a display board, which serves as a frame for the weekly Visitors Guide.

Another New Feature

Another new feature, McNeil said, is the use of a picture-of-the-week mounted on the display board. The third feature is the change of colored stock on which the guides are published to aid in keeping bulletin displays current.

Distribution of the weekly guide and picture will be handled through the cooperation of the 12 Jackson county oil distributors.

McNeil noted a program similar to the one in Jackson county has been launched by the Portland Chamber of Commerce Visitors Information center. He said it is anticipated other Oregon areas will follow Jackson county's lead in designing such a tourist program.

Teamsters Forced To Sell Bonds at 10 Per Cent Loss

Chicago — A union spokesman has revealed that the International Brotherhood of Teamsters will have to sell a million dollars worth of bonds at a 10 per cent loss due to the manipulations of funds by union president Dave Beck.

William A. Lee, Chicago, seventh vice president of the Teamsters, made the disclosure Tuesday at a meeting of Chicago Joint Council 25.

Lee said John English, general secretary-treasurer of the union, informed him by telephone that the move was necessary because Beck's operations had dwindled cash reserves of the Teamsters to a point where there were not enough to meet current operating expenses.

Lee told the delegates that Beck, who has announced he was not a candidate for reelection as president of the union, "must be removed immediately and an interim appointee chosen for the job."

Lee also predicted the Teamsters' Executive Board might force Beck out at its July 1 meeting in Los Angeles.

The delegates of the 44 locals, representing the largest single council of the union with 134,000 members, voted unanimously for Beck's resignation and endorsed Vice President John T. Sandy O'Brien, 60, of Chicago, for the post. Lee was endorsed for the vice president post.

In an acceptance speech, O'Brien told the council he wants the job "only if I can handle the work according to my own way of thinking."

Jacksonville Boy Beaver State Mayor

Corvallis, Ore. — Mayors have been elected in the annual Beavers Bays State being held here this week.

Eugene led with four boys from that city elected mayors. Elected from Eugene were: John Hiatt, Stewart Miller, Tom Jones and Louis Haller. Others elected were Jim Packer and John Damus both of Portland, Dean McWilliams Springfield; Dennis Caird, Jacksonville; and Red Ramsey, Vida.

In the other city elections Neil Goldschmidt, Eugene, and Tom Brauckmiller, Portland, tied and a second mayor election will be required.

County officials will be elected tonight and state officials on Thursday.

The voting is part of the training in government given boys at the annual camp. Daily classes are held in history, government, and international politics.

The American Legion sponsors the annual event to acquaint high school boys with government and voting procedures.

Holmes Signs Bill For Meat Inspection

Salem — Gov. Robert D. Holmes late yesterday signed the compulsory meat inspection bill climaxing a busy day in which he signed about 50 bills.

The meat inspection bill appropriates \$400,000 to carry on state inspection of meat in Oregon for the next two years. 20 per cent of the cost will be borne by the meat industry.

Witnessing the signing were Oregon's new agriculture director, Robert Stewart, and other interested agriculture overseers.

Under the meat inspection program almost all meat not now inspected by cities or the federal government will be checked by the state.

Petrillo Unopposed For Musician Post

Denver — James G. Petrillo was the only candidate for presidency of the American Federation of Musicians in today's elections.

The veteran union leader will begin his 18th consecutive term.

The musicians convention in Denver also approved renomination without opposition of all present international officers and executive board members. The only contest will be for seats on the union's seven-man delegation to the AFL-CIO convention.
