Langley Opens Office For Private Practice

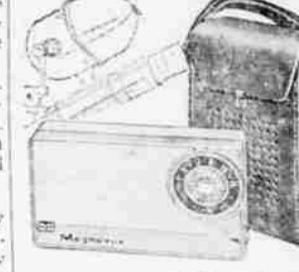
